His current goal is to run in a 26.2 mile marathon at Fort Davis in December. He has participated in several "short runs" locally, and has participated in both of the Lake Mackenzie mar-'athons.

"I just try to keep up with my mileage and try to beat it each month," he said, sitting on a couch in his apartment.

Despite considerable prior planning in regard to his birthday marathon, McWilliams noted he had doubts as to whether he could get beyond the 20-mile mark. He cut back his speed and walked two or three miles, but even then, "I don't know what kept me going."

His first mile-per-year trek may not be his last. In fact, said McWilliams, he plans to do it every year.

"If I make it to 70, I'll run 70 miles. Guys over 50 are running 100 miles," he said, shaking his head. "Boy, I don't know how they do it.
