The Texas High School Coaches Association has announced the All-State Academic Football Team for the 2016 season, and that list includes five senior Indians.

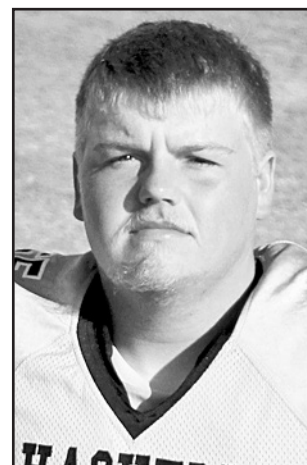

The Haskell Maidens used tough man to man

defense and good shooting offensively on the road last Tuesday night, Jan. 10 in a convincing 71-21 victory

"Offensively, I thought our tempo was good and the girls did a nice job reading the defense and taking what they were giving us. Any time you have four players in double figure scoring and everyone else scoring as well it is a great night," head coach Blake Eddleman said.

The Maiden defense made it extremely tough on the Plowgirl offense forcing them to shoot 25% from the field and holding their two best players to zero points. "Defensively, I was very proud of the girls' effort and mental concentration. They played hard and they

were focused on taking away their offensive strengths," Eddleman said.

Haskell controlled the rebounds over Roscoe 43-18. Manske had a team high 10 rebounds followed by Whitt with 8, C. Taylor 7, Hanson 5, M. Garvin 5 and Hadaway 4. Leading the team in steals were M. Garvin with 4, Manske 3, J. Garvin 3 and Hanson 3.

"Overall, I really liked how we played on both ends of the floor throughout the entire game. We got off to a strong start and that is so important when you are playing on the road against a young team. You do not want to give them any confidence or let their crowd get into it," Eddleman added.

The Haskell Maidens used a well-balanced scoring attack and solid defensive play last Friday night, Jan. 13 at home to get the convincing 67-14 district win over the Albany Lady Lions. Haskell outscored Albany 30-5 the first half and 37-9 the second half to get the win. Haskell moves to 21-5 overall and

6-0 after the first round of District 8-2A action. The Maidens are currently ranked 25th in the state in class 2A by TABC and TGCA.

Three Maidens helped lead the way offensively against the Lady Lions. Freshman Landry Hanson had 18 points, sophomore Taylor Manske had 13 points and sophomore C'Era Taylor got her second double-double of the year finishing with 11 points and 11 rebounds. Once again, Haskell had a lot of players score the ball. Jordan Garvin had 9 points, Courtney Whitt 9, Ashlyn Bevel 5 and Ariel Martinez 2. Haskell was (23-66) for 34% from the field, (3-17) for 17% from three point land, and (18-27) for 66% from the free throw line. "Offensively, the girls did a good job pushing the ball and scoring in transition. Pretty much all our kids can rebound the ball and bring it up immediately and that can put a lot of pressure on our opponents defense," head coach Blake Eddleman said.

The Maidens forced the Lady Lions to shoot (3-26) for 11% from the field. "Defensively, I thought the girls did a good job keeping the ball out of the paint and not letting their best guard get too many offensive touches. The girls do a great job switching in our man to man defense and helping one another," Eddleman said.

Haskell won the rebound battle 47-21. C'Era Taylor led the team in rebounds with 11 followed by Hanson with 9, Manske 8, Whitt 8 and Bevel 4. Leading the team in steals were Hollyn Hadaway with 5, Hanson 3, Manske 3 and Martinez 3.

"Overall, we played at a pretty high level on both ends of the floor. We did not shoot the ball as well as we normally do at home but we made up for it with fast break points.

"We feel good about where we are at after the first round of district, but we understand that there is a lot of basketball left to be played in district play. We just need to keep the same approach that we have been doing and take it one game at a time. It takes a lot of discipline, but I think our team understands what we need to do mentally, physically, and emotionally moving forward," Eddleman added.

Have you ever contemplated serving on the city council or school board? If so, time is drawing near to throw your hat into the ring.

The date for city elections, as well as school board elections has been set for Saturday, May 6, 2017. The first date to apply for a place on the ballot was Wednesday, January 18. The final day to add your name to the ballot is Friday, February 17 by 5 p.m. Applications to file may be obtained from the respective city hall or school administration offices.

In the city of Haskell, voters will elect three aldermen to two year terms. Positions currently held by Randy Bowers, Jason Isbell and Johnny Fuentes are up for election.

On the Haskell CISD

school board, places #2 and #3, currently held by Debbie Earles and Joey Thomas, will be voted on. Both are three year terms.

The city of Rule will vote on four council seats. Serving the city presently are David Parr, Bob Clark and Kenny Tanner. These are two year terms. Voters will also elect someone to fill the one year unexpired term of Jim Kowalski.

The Rule ISD school board has two spots up for election. Incumbents are Shane LeFevre and Jeffrey Murray.

In the Weinert city government, places held by Stanley Hager, Bill Walker and Caron Yates will be on the ballot, as well as the office of mayor, now served by Ed Murphy. These seats are for two year terms.

If you have not registered to vote, you may want to do so as soon as possible. Early voting by personal appearance, runs from April 24 through May 2. Early voting will take place during regular business hours at the city hall of each city, as well as the respective school administration office for the school elections.

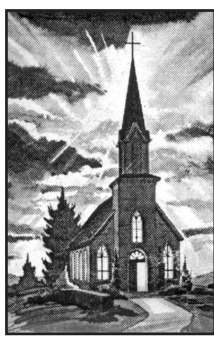

Indians beat Plowboys 36-31

The Indians traveled to the unfriendly confines of Roscoe for a match-up with the Plowboys Tues., Jan. 10.

The Indians took control of the opening tip and looked poised to pull away early with a 13-4 run to begin the game. Rocky Haggard would jump start the Indians with 4 first

quarter points. However, Roscoe would respond in the second quarter by outscoring the Indians 10-7 and Haskell would take a 20-16 advantage into the half.

The Plowboys inched even closer to the Indians in the third quarter as Haskell struggled to find their rhythm on offense. Coach Tully Brown was quick to give the Roscoe defense high praise, "I felt like they did a great job of keeping us off balance. They dictated the tempo and the pace of the game from start to finish. Their press was good enough to make us work the ball up the floor and their half court defense forced us to make extra passes. I was very impressed."

The Plowboys would use their defense to take a two point advantage into the final period, but the Indians would regain their composure. The Indian defense, led by Alec Roewe (3 steals) Kellen Parks (3 steals), Lane Burson (5 rebounds) and Kyler Hoover (5 rebounds) would hold the Plowboys to just 3 points in the final period. The Indian offense would make enough plays down the stretch to seal the victory for Haskell. The final score was Haskell 36, Roscoe 31.

The Indians were led in scoring by Kellen Parks (12), Aaron Skiles (10), Rocky Haggard (4), Lane Burson (4), Alec Roewe (3), Caleb Wheat (2) and Tanner Thomas (1).

Indians fall to Albany 33-23

The matchup between the Haskell Indians and the Albany Lions was, in at least one way, record-setting. Both teams recorded a season low in points in a single game. The combined score (56) was

also the lowest total for either team to date.

The Albany offense drew first blood. They opened the first quarter with an 8-0 run, but the Indians would respond with 6 points of their own and would trail by 2 after the first quarter.

The Indian offense would live at the free-throw line in the second quarter. All seven of the Indians second quarter points came by way of free throws. The Indians were 7-8 from the line in the second and would trail the Lions by three going into halftime.

If anyone thought either team would relax defensively after the halftime break, they would have been wrong. Albany would outscore the Indians 7-3 in the third quarter.

The Indians would cut the Lions lead to 26-23 with three minutes to go in the ball game, but they just couldn't get the ball to fall. Albany would go on to win by a final of 33-23.

Coach Tully Brown was pleased with the 'fight' his team showed in this game, "I thought we battled from beginning to end. We couldn't get it done offensively, but I give Albany a lot of credit for that. Those guys (Albany) defend as well as anybody we will play all year. We knew that points were going to be at a premium before this game started. I thought our guys realized that points were going to be hard to come by and they sold out to playing defense and rebounding."

Vegetables A to Z: Asparagus

Did you know? Asparagus is available all year round! Asparagus is an excellent source of Vitamin C.

Asparagus is also a good source of Vitamin A and potassium.

A fun fact is "Martha Washington" is one of the most popular varieties of asparagus.

What am I looking for?

Look for asparagus with close, compact tips. Select asparagus with a rich green color over most of the spear. Wash asparagus well before use. Avoid asparagus with

moldy or decayed tips as well as spears that are not rounded.

Scrumptious Grilled Vegetables

Cooking spray
1/2 red pepper, cut in strips
8 medium asparagus spears
8-10 fresh string beans
1 medium-large zucchini, sliced lengthwise
Clean vegetables, cut into strips or squares, and lay on grill pan. (You may lightly spray your nonstick pan with canned olive oil, but very lightly.)

Cook vegetables over medium heat. Turn them (with plastic clamps or turners) about four times during cooking. Cooking time varies. Start with beans, asparagus, and pepper; after five minutes, add the zucchini. If you want to add and cook eggplant, it takes a bit longer and will get limp.

Cook time: 10-15 minutes
Serves: 4

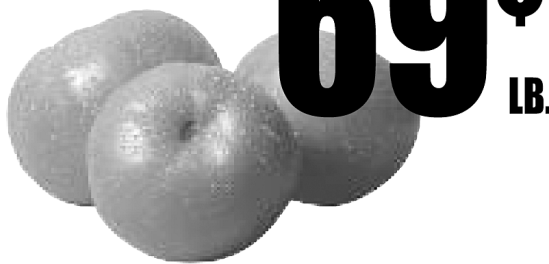

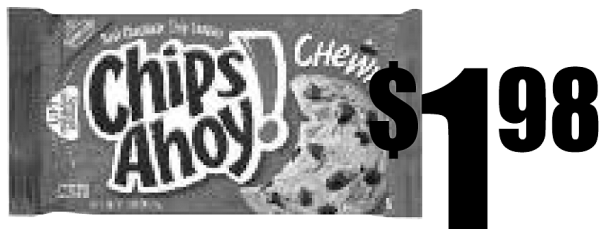
