Residents May Apply For Energy Assistance

Briscoe County residents who qualify under Federal Poverty Guidelines may apply June 3 for help with their energy bills through the Energy Crisis Assistance Program.

The program, administered by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, makes as much as \$400 available to families for the payment of overdue energy bills or for prepayment.

Briscoe County residents will have an opportunity to fill out applications and questionnaires at the courthouse from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on June 3.

Those who wish to qualify for funding must provide proof of income eligibility. That proof could include a food stamp authorization card, social security income certification letter or any other document that provides proof of income eligibility. The documentation should cover the six months prior to application.

Families in the eligible income class range from a single occupant in the non-farm category making \$4250 or less annually to a six-member farm family making less than \$9450. Those guidelines are not absolute and decisions are made on a case-by-case basis.

Payment will be made directly to the fuel supplier or utility or to the landlord in the renter's case. The renter should supply a letter from the landlord stating the amount of the monthly bill that goes toward utility payments.

The program will eventually involve all 25 counties of the Panhandle. A quarter million dollars in federal funds is available for the program that runs through June 30.

Since the railroad was 60 miles from this sparsely populated prairie, the establishment of Reeves Post Office opened a communication link for the early pioneers. Begun July 13, 1899, in the front room of Postmaster Joseph H. Reeves' two - story frame home, the post office served 110 settlers. James U. Strickland bought the house and took over as Postmaster August 24, 1905. He served until the facility closed on March 30, 1907, and mail was delivered to Silverton (eight miles north). After Strickland sold the home to Forrest Leonard Weast in 1909, it was destroyed by fire.



The Reeves Post Office, Briscoe ton, Briscoe County, Texas. County, Texas, was established Reeves serving as Pastmaster. It was situated in the southwest pied by the Joseph Harvey quarter of Section 2 in the Coun-

ty of Briscoe, State of Texas. Joseph Harvey Reeves served as Postmaster from July 13, 1899 until August 24, 1905, when James U. Strickland was appointed

The post office was housed in the front room of the large twostory wood frame home of the J. H. Reeves family. The population served by the Reeves Post Office

This post office was one of the early-day post offices established in Briscoe County, which was created from Bexar District in 1876 and organized in 1892.

Some of the early Briscoe County pioneers served by this post office were the families of Jobe Bryant, Mack Watters, Ben Stephens, Thomas R. Wilson, D. G. Montague, Joe F. Kitchens, Dr. Vermellion, and the Pope, Fleming and Archer families.

At the time the Reeves Post Office was operated, the nearest railroad was the Fort Worth & Denver-60 miles away. Therefore the Post Office was a vital link to friends and relatives the early-day Briscoe County pioneers left so far away to settle in their new community.

It is of great historical significance to the few pioneers who are still living, and also to the many descendants of these hearty people who came to the plains of Texas and endured drought, cold, poverty and loneliness to settle and develop Briscoe Coun-




