Pallbearers will be O. C. Rampley, James Davis, Louie Kitchens, Don Marble, Keith Marble and Fred Marble.

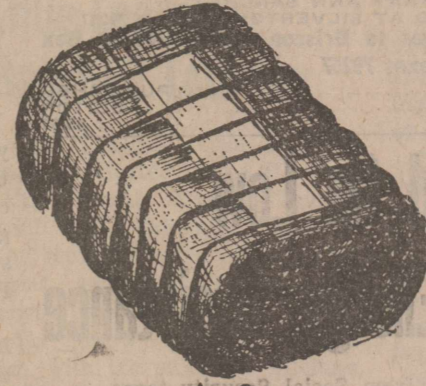
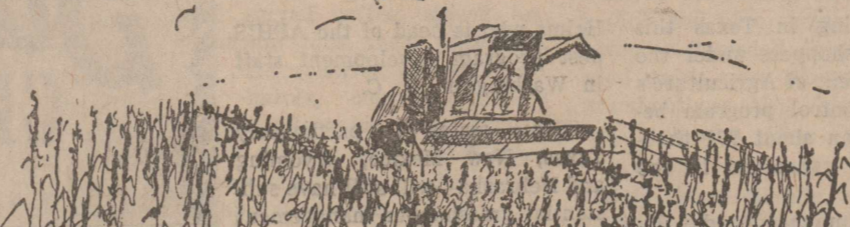
Pete Cowart Dies In California

Survivors include his wife and three children: one son, Jim Cowart of New York City; two daughters,

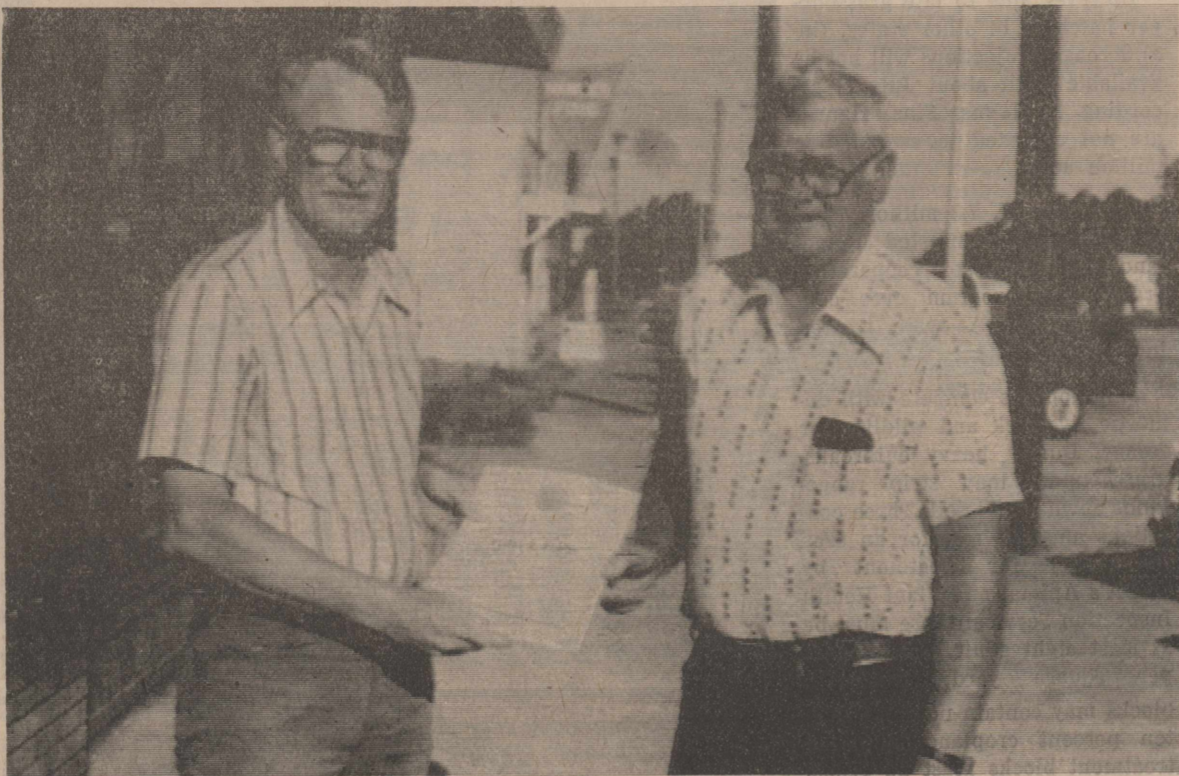

Knutsons Dominate Lake Mackenzie's First Carp Rodeo

Thirteen-year-old Heath Knutson of Tulia didn't even need to wet a hook on Sunday, June 15, at the First Lake Mackenzie Carp Rodeo. The young man, who will be an eighth grader in Tulia next school term, brought in 19 1/2 pounds of carp on Saturday to take the first day lead in this unique event staged at beautiful Lake Mackenzie.

His first day lead wasn't satisfactory with the young man, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Knutson. He wanted to catch more carp, and he did.

On Sunday, young Knutson was out near the break of day, once again trying to catch those cagey old carp. He weighed in 33 pounds of carp to bring his two-day total of rough fish to 52 1/2 pounds, easily taking first place in the event.

The boy says he loves to fish. Every weekend he and his family fish at Lake Mackenzie. "I've never seen anyone who loves to fish as much as my son. He will stay from dawn until dark and probably all night if possible," Don Knutson said.

Young Knutson took home the first place trophy, a trophy for the largest carp in the junior division, which weighed five pounds, besides the nice cash payoff.

On Sunday morning, the Tulia youngster thought he was doomed. Early that morning, he was having a roll and drink. He left his corn-baited rig sitting on the back of the boat. A carp came along and took a bite. Over went his Zebco 202 reel and rod. And that rig was what he had been catching his carp with on Saturday. But not a youngster to panic, he rigged up another fishing outfit and proceeded to catch 33 pounds of carp. He said, "The money I won from the carp rodeo is going to be spent on a new rod and reel."

A Plainview man took second in the carp fish-off by catching 9 1/2 pounds of carp. John Chain had hard luck, although he didn't fish very long. Just about every big carp he hooked either broke his line near the net or straight-

ened out his hook. Chain said, "I imagine I lost about 40 pounds of carp simply because my tackle was not stout enough to handle the strong fish." Chain carried home a nice runner-up trophy, plus a nice second-place cash payoff.

Betty Knutson, boat partner of the winner and his mother, couldn't quite get all her fish in the boat, but she managed to catch one carp weighing six pounds, qualifying her for the third place payoff, allowing her to win the largest tourney carp and largest carp in the women's division. Mrs. Knutson said, "I've fished quite a lot, but this carp was the biggest fish I've ever caught in my life. You can bet I'll enter this carp rodeo next year. I had the best time of my life."

Two Injured When Spray Plane Strikes Car

A Kress woman and her son were injured Wednesday afternoon of last week when a spray plane flying low over FM 145 struck the windshield of their car and left one of its wheels in the front seat.

Mrs. Larry (Margaret Elaine) Wakefield, 36, and Ross Morgan Wakefield, 10, were in satisfactory condition after being admitted to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock suffering from lacerations, abrasions and concussions received in the accident.

They were taken by Barrett's Ambulance of Plainview to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview and transferred from there to Methodist Hospital.

Pilot of the plane, Ray Hart of Silverton, reportedly was not injured. After striking the Wakefields' eight-month-old Cadillac, he traveled about three miles farther and landed in a field.

Hart had been spraying a field at the Wakefield farm 7 1/2 miles east of Kress on FM 145. The mishap occurred at 5:45 p.m. about 300 yards from the Wakefield driveway. Mrs. Wakefield, who was traveling east, drove her car into the driveway after she was hit. The windshield and top of the car were damaged.

Gilbert Morris, Texas Highway Patrolman of Tulia, investigated the mishap.

High Temperatures Being Recorded Here

The temperature in Silverton, as recorded by Fred Strange, climbed to a blazing 105° Tuesday. The temperature officially was 102° Monday.

The high temperatures have been coupled with higher-than-usual humidity, to give Briscoe County residents a taste of down-state conditions. The only rainfall during the past week was a shower early Friday morning of last week that dropped .84 of an inch on Silverton. This was accompanied by high winds and a brilliant lightning display, and brought the June rainfall measurement to 3.24 inches. Rainfall recorded so far in 1980 has amounted to 11.15 inches, these figures also furnished by Fred Strange.

Some had feared that the rains would not permit development of the cotton root system, but Leo Comer told the Briscoe County News that he does not find this to be true. He believes the cotton crop to be progressing very well, and it is obvious that if hail or some other disaster does not befall the county's cotton crop, the country will turn to cotton again this fall. It is expected that some of the earlier-planted cotton will be squaring by the Fourth of July, and this has long been considered a yardstick for success by some farmers.

Corn crops are also looking very good in the area, with Bill Strange having about the prettiest corn to be found anywhere just west of Silverton on Highway 86. It looks like it should begin tasseling soon.

Probably the unseasonably high temperatures are as bad for the corn and milo as they are good for the cotton, and the irrigation wells are going day and night in these fields.

Crop prospects seem bright for county farmers, who suffered devastating hails in June and October last year and lost much of their cotton. If the rains will continue at reasonable intervals, bumper crops should be harvested from both irrigated and dry-land fields in the fall.

The wheat harvest is continuing at a rapid pace, and should be finished soon. Most of the wheat is yielding better than had been expected, with much of the dry-land crop harvesting around 20 bushels to the acre. There has been some shriveling of the wheat grains reported in the past few days, this somewhat reducing the yields.

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Comments Needed On Low Income Energy Assistance

The U. S. Department of Health and Human Services is seeking comments from any interest group or individual on the 1980-81 Home Energy Assistance Program before adopting final regulations. According to Ray Purcell, manager of the Plainview Social Security Office, the Energy Assistance Program provides block grants to states to help low income households meet the rising cost of heating their homes. Written comments received by June 30, 1980 will be considered, Purcell said. Comments should be sent to the Commissioner of Social Security, Department of Health and Human Services, P. O. Box 1585, Baltimore, Maryland 21203.

Mr. Purcell said that the Office of Family Assistance of the Social Security Administration administers the Low Income Energy Assistance Program, although grant monies come from General Federal Revenues, not

from Social Security taxes. The regulations reflect significant policy changes from last year's Low Income Energy Assistance Program:

—States will be required to screen out households not affected by rising heating costs to avoid payment to persons who do not need emergency assistance.
 —Households that receive direct energy assistance payments cannot be required to turn them over to other persons.

—Funds not used by a state will be re-allocated to other states that need additional funds.

The new regulations require states to give priority to households with lowest incomes and households with elderly or handicapped members.

If they wish, states may elect to have the Social Security Administration make direct payments to supplemental security income households. However, payments will not be made to

USDA Begins Spraying Hoppers In Texas Panhandle

First spraying in Texas this year for grasshoppers under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's cooperative control program began June 24 on about 771 thousand acres of rangeland in the Panhandle.

This was announced today by Bill Stagner, who is in charge of the program for USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service in San Antonio.

The rangeland is located in Armstrong, Briscoe, Deaf Smith, Donley, Hartley, Oldham, Farmer and Randall counties.

Stagner estimates that more than 900,000 acres of Texas rangeland will be sprayed under USDA's cooperative program before the summer ends.

The grasshopper infestation does not cover as many acres of western rangeland as originally expected because weather has been unfavorable for hatching grasshoppers, Stagner explained. He handles the USDA cooperative program in Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska as well as in Texas.

Estimates made last fall, based on the number of adult grasshoppers laying eggs, indicated that if conditions this spring were perfect for grasshoppers there was a potential for 32 million infested rangeland acres in 17 western states, according to William

Helms who is head of the APHIS pest program development staff in Washington, D. C.

"Some states — particularly Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming and Nebraska—will still have substantial grasshopper management programs, but nowhere near our original estimates," Helms said.

In Oklahoma, Nebraska, Wyoming and Arizona the cooperative rangeland grasshopper management program treatments are already underway.

However, due to late grasshopper hatching in other states, final acreage projections will not be available until about July 1, according to Helms. Final figures are not expected to exceed five million acres.

Last summer, 7.2 million acres of grasshopper infested rangeland—the largest cooperative grasshopper program ever conducted by USDA—were treated in 17 states.

Grasshoppers compete with domestic livestock and wildlife for forage. During heavy outbreaks, grasshoppers may strip rangelands down to the soil. Three conditions must be met for an area to qualify for treatment by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service: there must be at least eight adult grasshoppers per square yard; treatment blocks may contain no more than ten percent cropland, and the treatment blocks must be 10,000 acres or completely encompass an infestation.

Persons with grasslands infested with grasshoppers may get help by contacting local, state or federal Plant Protection officials.
