Awards Night was held recently at Clarendon College. The awards were given as a result of a student body election.

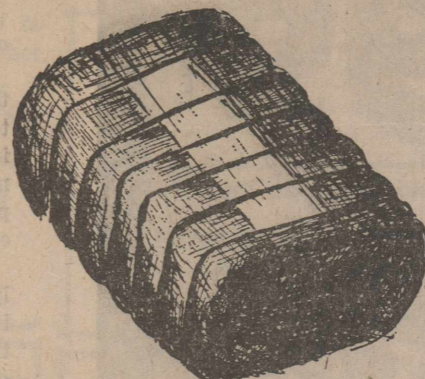
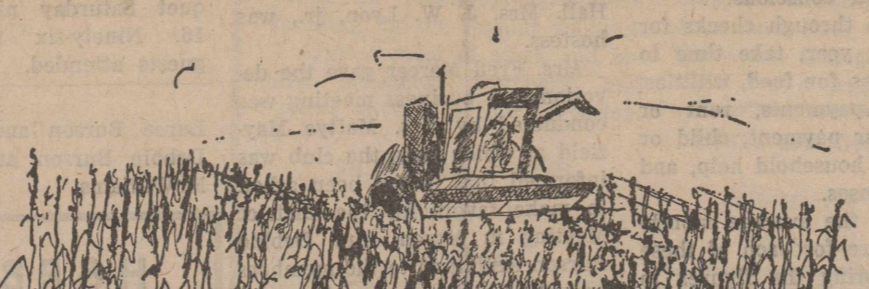

Snow Blankets Silverton Area

Once again the Silverton vicinity was blanketed by a snow cover over the weekend. This time, the measurement was in excess of six inches, which melted out of .51 of an inch of moisture, according to the official calculations of Silverton's weather recorder Fred A. Strange.

A total of .80 of an inch had been recorded in the earlier snow and ice storm, giving Silverton a total for February of 1.31 inches, a little above the seasonal normal.

Another .48 of an inch of mois-

ture was recorded in January, bringing the total to date to 1.79 inches.

According to James Cathey of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, the cold weather this month has caused the gas bills to climb again, up from the same period last year and up from last month. He added that he expects all of the gas bills to be lower next month.

Snow-mobilers who traveled to Colorado for the weekend found the snow there unsuitable for skiing or snow-mobiling, while the snow-mobilers who remained at home found the snow just perfect here. There was one snow mobile accident reported.

Several young people tried their hand at snow skiing at Lake Mackenzie.

Unseasonably high temperatures which remained in the 50's Monday night and climbed into the 70's Tuesday quickly melted the snow.

"Super Student" To Be Named By Muscular Dystrophy Chapter

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Dollar Watch Program Planned For February 29

Tax time is here, and everyone is "dollar conscious." As you go through checks for the previous year, take time to total expenses for food, utilities, installment payments, rent or mortgage, car payment, child or parent care, household help, and college expenses.

Determine the average monthly expenditure for each of these items and bring the figures to the Dollar Watch Computer program February 29, sponsored by the Briscoe County Family Living Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This information will be fed into a computer and a printout received estimating your expenditures in some twelve other areas—clothing, insurance, recreation, etc.

The Family Resource Management specialist from College Station and a neighboring County Extension Agent will be available to go over the printout with you.

If your budget is "overweight" with expenses, you will receive suggestions for putting it "on a diet."

Participants will be able to take the printout home and study the expenses which are compared to a family similar to theirs.

Free publications will be available to help participants better manage their money. Also available will be a series on "Getting the Most From What You Have," which includes sheets to record income and expenses.

Money management skills are necessary for all levels of income. Many times the less money a family has the better they are at "getting the most from what they have."

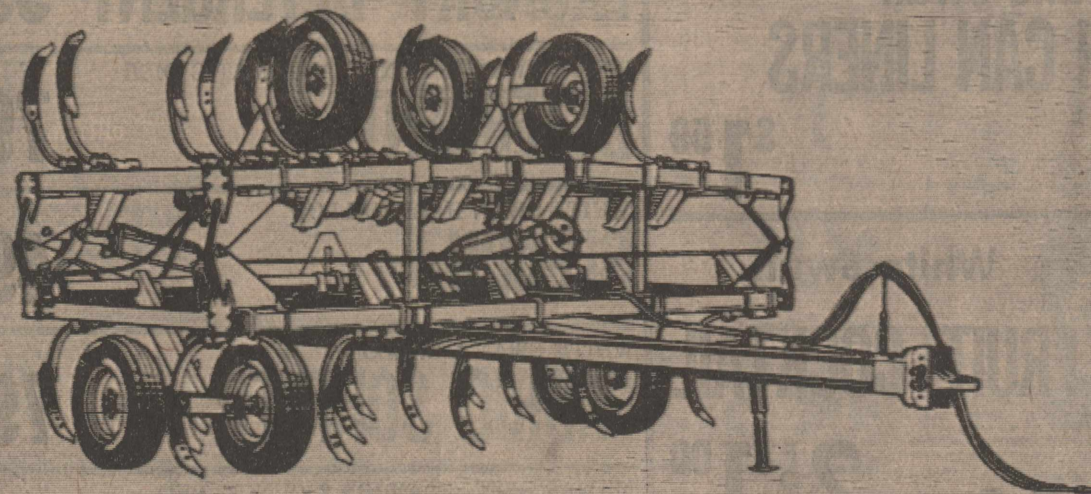
