### **COPING WITH** FINANCIAL CRISIS

Texas farmers and ranchers continue to be caught in a severe cost-price squeeze.

They have had to deal with sharp increases in the cost of energy, interest and other production inputs while farm prices have continued under pressure. To add to their misery, the state is now in the grips of a severe drouth.

To cope with this crisis situation of economic survival, producers need to take a close look at possible adjustments in the areas of financing, marketing and production economics.

To curb rampaging inflation, the Federal Reserve Board and the federal government launched programs early this year to tighten money supplies and restrict credit. Resulting skyrocketing interest rates and tightening credit hit farmers and ranchers hard.

However, interest rates have started down recently, with a prime rate of 11-12 percent forecast by November. But interest rates on farm loans will likely fall more slowly than the prime rate, just as they lagged behind the prime rate when interest rates were increasing.

While producers have generally been able to obtain loans to cover operating costs, loans to finance capital expenditures have been hard to come by. Now, through the Economic Emergency Loan Program, \$1 billion has been made available to states (\$31,859,000 to Texas) to help farmers and ranchers pay installments on existing debts, refinance existing farm debts, reorganize farms to make them more viable, or pay farm operating expenses. Where drouth has severely reduced farm income, emergency loan funds are being expanded for use by eligible producers.

Bergland said wheat supplies are expected to be adequate, but not excessive in 1981 and major uncertainties remain over grain and oilseed production this year. Even greater uncertainties exist over production prospects for the 1981 season.

"If conditions change by spring and it becomes evident by next spring that our wheat supplies will be excessive in 1981, a paid diversion program will be offered to wheat producers," Bergland said. The final decision on a haying and grazing program will also be made before the spring grazing period begins.

"While wheat producers can market wheat from the farmerowner reserve without penalty through August 31, I do not expect large quantities will be sold," Bergland said. "This means the supply of wheat available to the market at the current farm price is limited. I also expect farmers' will place a sufficient quantity of 1980 crop wheat into the reserve so the farm price will have to rise above the \$4.20 reserve release price to satisfy 1980-81 market requirements.

"A farm price above \$4.20 a bushel would tend to encourage a high proportion of our wheat producers to stay out of a setaside program if one were offered. 


