James Race of Tulia is president of the Lockney Ex-Student Association which is coordinating homecoming activities.

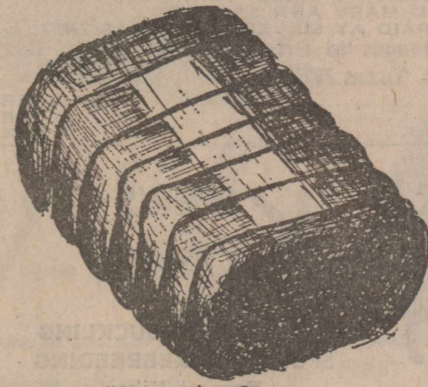
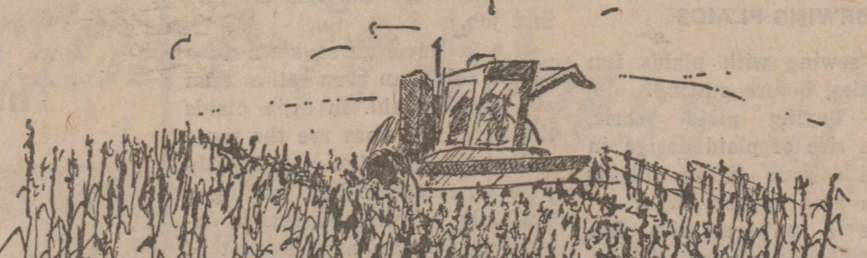
## Senior Citizens To Have Exercises

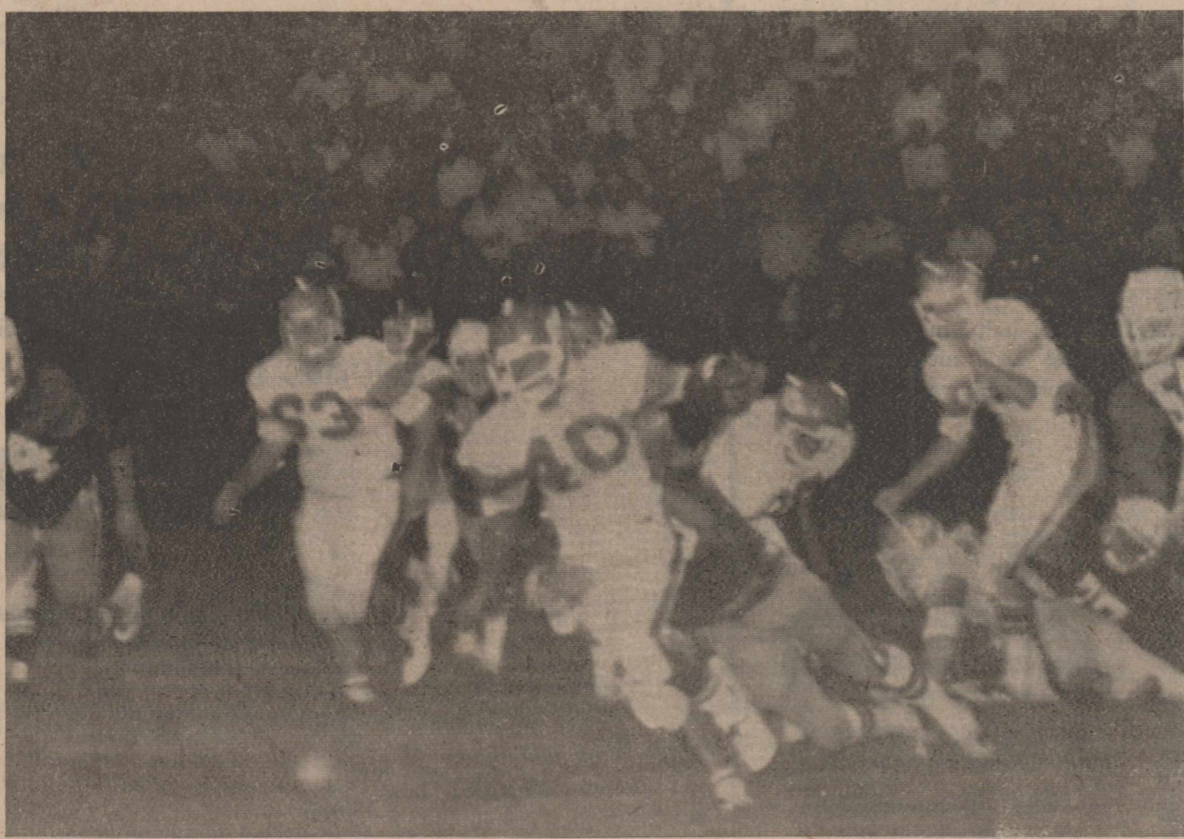

## Owls To Open Home Season Friday Night With Ralls

Silverton's Owls will host the Ralls Jackrabbits in their first home game of the season at 8:00 p.m. Friday.

The "Rabbits, who are playing in District 4-AA this year, are coming off a 2-8 losing season and are expected to field a better team this year. They have taken part in an extensive weight and off-season program which is expected to make their athletes stronger and quicker. They are returning five offensive and two defensive starters from last fall's team.

"Ralls is big and has a pretty good team," said Coach Joe Stubblefield. "They beat AAA Lubbock Cooper 7-0 last week and look pretty good in their film."

The Harris Rating System rates Ralls 26 points better than Silverton.

The Owls, of District 2-A, graduated most of their starters last spring, and have only about seven or eight players returning who played on the varsity team at all last season. These, coupled with those who have moved up from the junior varsity team and some who are out for football for the first year, make up the team during this re-building year.

Last Friday night's game at Claude was a heart-breaker for the Owls, who see how close they came to winning it.

For a time it looked like a fourth-quarter touchdown, for which the Owls worked very hard, would put them in the scoring column. Then the effort of the offensive players in getting into the endzone was wiped out by a 15-yard penalty. Even then, the Owls made up for the penalty and moved into scoring position again where Claude intercepted an aerial for a touchback to take away their opportunity with a little over five minutes remaining in the game.

Claude's score came when the

Mustangs returned a Silverton punt 45 yards with 13 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

The Owls made 10 first downs in the game, as compared with 12 for Claude. Gary Juarez rushed for 85 yards and was listed in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal among the area's top Class A offensive players; Mark Patton picked up 16 and Ernest Rodriguez ran for 40 yards. In addition to this, Casey Bean passed to Mark Patton for 17 yards and Shane Reagan passed to Russell Couch for 15 yards.

Defensively, Mark Patton intercepted a pass, Eric Patton recovered a fumble and Gary Juarez caused the fumble. Shane Reagan was the leading tackler with 11, followed by Juarez, with 10. The coaches graded the game film, and Casey Bean received the highest grade among the backs and Roger Cantwell was the highest-scoring lineman.

Mark Patton injured his elbow in the game at Claude, but other than this there were no injuries. The elbow is swollen and sore, but Patton is expected to be able to play Friday night.

The seniors will be serving an enchilada supper in the school cafeteria Friday night. Plan now to attend the supper and game. The Owls will be doing their best to move into the win column. They deserve your support!

The board of directors for the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority met at Lake Mackenzie Tuesday night and set November 22, 1980 as the date for a bond election.

The complete cost of the raw water line and treatment plant is now \$4,405,000. The Authority has \$1,255,000 in unissued bonds and a grant of \$1,000,000. The amount proposed to be issued in new bonds is \$2,150,000.

This bond issue will be one of the most important steps to citizens of Lockney, Floydada, Silverton and Tulia to provide a dependable future municipal water supply. Underground water is declining all over the area, and it now appears that in just a few years towns which haven't laid the groundwork to receive surface water will be without water. Towns which aren't involved in any surface water projects eye the Mackenzie water hungrily, and if the four towns involved don't take steps to make use of the water they have caused to be impounded, it is possible that other towns will be asking for the water rights.

Further postponement of this phase of the water project is not possible due to rising costs due to inflation. The people of the towns involved in this project will have to pay the price to guarantee themselves and future generations a water supply, but this is of vital importance to those who are interested in continuing to live in this area and to all who are interested in their long-range property value.

In other business, the Mackenzie directors purchased a new International tractor with front-end loader, blade and shredder.

A \$36,400 grant was received from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and to this the Mackenzie Authority will add \$14,600 for the purpose of extending the north boat ramp 20 feet into the lake, concreting both boat ramps to their tops, and asphaltting a 200x200 parking lot at the top of each boat ramp.

## First Bale Of New Cotton Ginned

The first bale of 1980-crop cotton was ginned in Silverton Tuesday by Silverton Gin, Inc. The cotton was delivered to the gin Monday by Clifton Stodghill.

The cotton was stripped on a dryland field which had not been defoliated north of Lake Mackenzie. The 3,000 pounds of cotton produced 554 pounds of lint and 950 pounds of seed. The turnout was 18½%, due to there being green leaves in it.

The Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair opens a three-day run Thursday, September 11, with a parade at 3:30 p.m. Dignitaries expected for the parade include State Representatives James (Pete) Laney of Hale Center and Foster Whaley of Pampa, and State Senator E. L. Short of Tahoka.

Residents of Floyd, Hale, Swisher, Crosby, Briscoe and Motley counties are invited to participate in the fair with entries in canned goods, culinary, craft, art, youth, agricultural and community exhibits. Entries are to be made by noon Thursday with judging scheduled in the afternoon.

## KIKER'S KORNER

ONCE DAILY SUCKLING SPEEDS UP REBREEDING

Beef cattle producers who have difficulty maintaining a 12-month calving interval with first-calf heifers might consider the "once daily suckling" technique.

Once daily suckling means that calves are allowed to nurse only once a day. This eliminates a lot of the stress on first-calf heifers, allowing them to start cycling earlier so that they can be rebred.

This practice has been demonstrated on the Sartwell Brahman Ranch at Sealy and has proved highly successful in reducing the interval between calving and first post-calving heat.

The demonstration was based on research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station which showed that once daily suckling when calves were 21 to 30 days of age dramatically decreased the interval between calving and first post-calving heat in first-calf heifers.

The practice includes separating first-calf heifers from their offspring and then allowing once daily suckling exposure for about an hour from 30 days after calving until the heifers show heat. After first heat, heifers are allowed to rear their calves with

Make sewing with plaids fun by planning before cutting.

When buying plaid fabric, keep the size of plaid design in scale with your figure. Plaids make an area appear larger.

Choose a pattern with few seamlines and design details, such as pockets, to minimize

normal suckling until weaned. In the demonstration on the Sartwell Ranch, the usual re-breeding problems with first-calf heifers were reduced by using the once daily suckling method. In addition to getting the test heifers back in heat rapidly, (73 days for first-calf heifers and 67 days for second-calf heifers), the conception rate shot up to 91 percent compared to 3 percent for the rest of the cow herd.

Extended intervals from calving to first post-calving heat are responsible for large increases in production costs. This is due to increased costs of cow maintenance, increased length of calving season, and increased numbers of open cows at the end of the breeding season.

The biggest problem in re-breeding comes with first-calf heifers. This is largely due to nutrition, so the once daily suckling technique allows first-calf heifers to "get back on their feet" more quickly and get ready for re-breeding.

Once daily suckling not only shortens the interval from calving to first heat as effectively as early weaning but also reduces the major management problems associated with early weaned calves.

In addition, the technique during an artificial insemination breeding season can actually save labor as the animals to be checked for heat and penned for breeding readily come in to suckle their calves each day.

Although once daily suckling can improve re-breeding performance in heifers and young cows, it is no substitute for a sound management program of herd health and nutrition.

matching. Several years ago I let my husband pick out a plaid for a sport coat he insisted I make. It took three hours to cut out because of the matching. When I got it made, all the plaids matched well, but that was the last time I let him talk me into that job.

If you have never sewn with plaids, select an even rather than an uneven plaid. In even plaids the bars or stripes are the same on both sides of the main lengthwise or crosswise bar, making a perfectly balanced repeat. In uneven plaids, the arrangement of bars is different on either side of the main lengthwise and/or crosswise stripe. Even plaids are much easier to match.

Pre-shrink a plaid fabric before cutting (as you should all fabrics) because shrinking can affect matching.

Cut out plaids using the "with nap" pattern layout—meaning turn all pattern pieces the same direction. When laying out the pattern, match the design at the stitching line, not the cutting line. Match the sleeve to the bodice front not the bodice back. Plaids will not match at shoulder seams, princess seams, darts, above bustline dart on seam side, at the back armhole seamline or in a gathered or eased area.

Use the plaid lines to help position the grainline arrow. When cutting a double layer of plaid fabric, be sure the plaids on the bottom layer are in line with the same design on the top layer. Pin, baste, or tape the fabric to keep it from shifting the design.

## Additional Extension Agronomist Named For South Plains

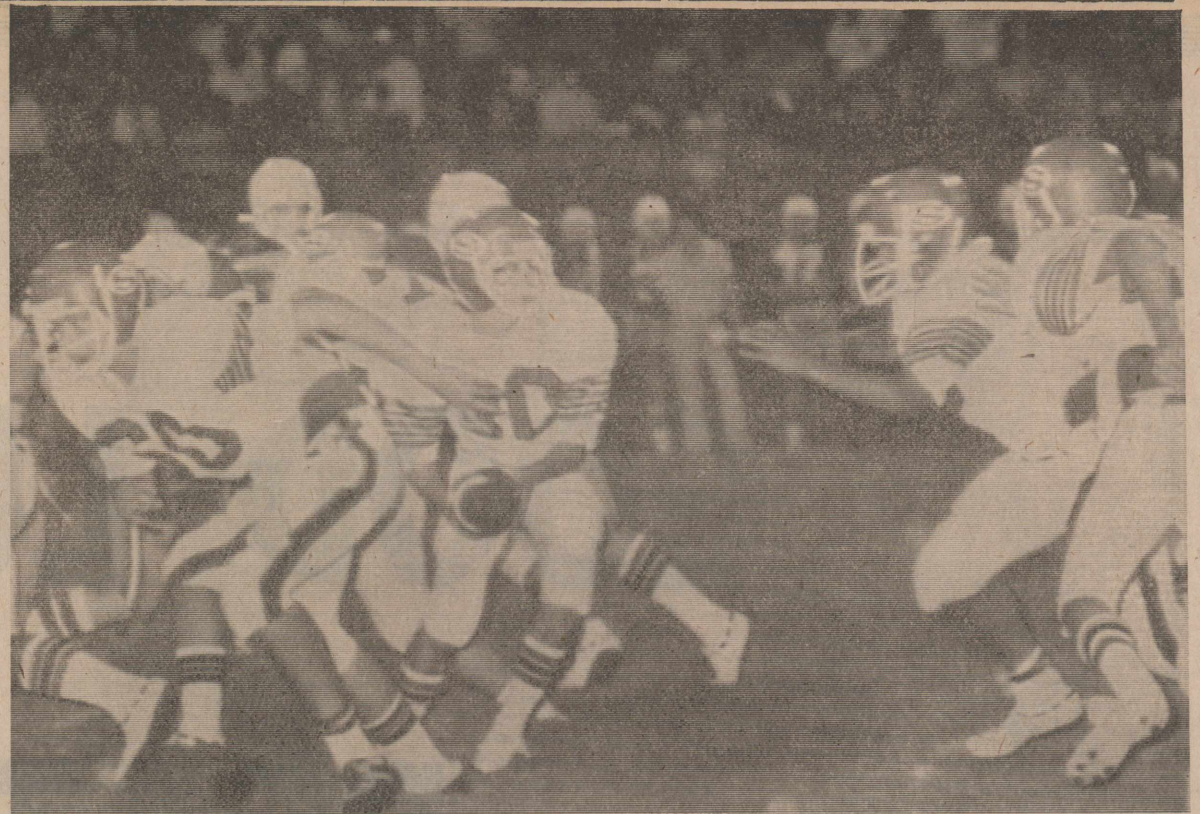

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

### PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #97 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que conceda al Estado y al acusado el derecho de una apelación interlocutoria en los siguientes fallos de la corte en causas criminales: los fallos antes del juicio sobre la constitucionalidad de una ley; sobre la petición para anular, destituir, o desear una acusación; y sobre una petición para suprimir la evidencia.

### PROPOSICION NO. 4 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #86 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que permita a la Legislatura autorizar al Gobernador para que ejerza control fiscal de los gastos de ciertos fondos financieros previamente asignados, sujeto a las condiciones y

revisar avalúos dentro de cada condado. ### PROPOSICION NO. 7 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #121 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a los condados con una población de 5000 o menos, que construyan y mantengan caminos privados cobrando razonablemente por el trabajo. Por ley, la Legislatura puede limitar esta autoridad. Los ingresos recibidos por trabajo en caminos privados se pueden usar solamente para construcción, para adquisición de derecho de paso, o para el mantenimiento de caminos públicos.

Las parejas que están por casarse o los que ya están casados, y sin la intención de defraudar a sus acreedores preexistentes, pueden repartirse de vez en cuando, entre sí y por escrito, toda o parte de su propiedad. Resolución Conjunta #36

**A LOOK AT THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS**

The following proposed constitutional amendments will be presented to voters soon. Here are a few of the pros and cons which have been discussed in connection with the proposals.

**Amendment No. 1 UNMANNED BANK TELLER MACHINES**

The amendment would permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines

within the county or city in which they are located on a shared basis to serve public convenience.

**FOR:**  
1. Unmanned teller machines allow customers to transact business at convenient locations and at any time.

2. Because each bank has the right to share in the use of the machines, a bank will be able to serve a larger area than it currently serves. Competition among banks will increase.

3. The use of unmanned teller machines allow banks to better compete with savings and loan associations, which currently may have more than one business location while banks are restricted to a single location.

**AGAINST:**  
1. The cost of installing a network of unmanned teller machines would be passed on to the consumer.

2. The amendment circumvents the long standing prohibition on branch banking in Texas.

3. The use of unmanned teller machines will let large banks serve the entire community and force smaller banks out of operation.

**Amendment No. 2 STATE'S RIGHT OF APPEAL**

A constitutional amendment to grant the state the right of appeal in criminal cases from certain rulings of the trial court.

**FOR:**  
1. Granting the state this limited right of appeal provides the only effective way of testing the constitutionality of certain statutes and the legality of certain pretrial practices.

2. The amendment will provide a criminal defendant with a method of ending criminal action at an early stage if appeal is worthy.

3. Granting the state a right of appeal will eliminate to some extent the tendency of some judges, when in doubt, to rule in favor of the defense to avoid appellate review of their rulings.

**AGAINST:**  
1. The duration of a criminal trial will be substantially lengthened when the state takes an appeal.

2. The caseload for the court of criminal appeals will be significantly increased.

**Amendment No. 3 EQUALIZATION BOARD FOR AD VALOREM TAX**

Proposing a constitutional amendment to require a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

**FOR:**  
1. Single appraisal districts and boards of equalization are needed to fulfill legislative intent in the passage of the Property Tax Code.

2. The creation of single appraisal districts eliminates duplication of property tax administration.

3. Such districts would prevent conflicts in appraisals, thus promoting uniformity and equality.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Preventing county commissioners from direct involvement in property tax administration will vest too much tax authority within one non-elected board.

2. Property taxes will probably increase at the county level.

**Amendment No. 4 LOCAL CHARITABLE BINGO GAMES**

Proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option basis.

**FOR:**  
1. The charitable purposes for which churches, synagogues, religious societies, and many other organizations engage in bingo are of great benefit to society.

2. The proposed amendment would allow each community to decide whether to permit bingo games.

3. Bingo games provide an opportunity for entertainment, social gatherings and relaxation.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Fraud in bingo games would not be easy to prevent by local law enforcement.

2. Organized crime would become involved in bingo games since profit margins would be as great as in criminal activities.

**Amendment No. 5 BUDGET EXECUTION**

A constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution committee.

**FOR:**  
1. Since the Legislature meets every two years in regular session, there is a need for more budget execution authority vested in an elective office.

2. With the approval of a budget execution committee, the chief executive could closely monitor agency expenditures and insure accountability of tax dollars.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Additional controls on spending are not needed in Texas as the citizens' tax burden is among the lowest in the country.

2. Such authority would allow a free-spending governor the ability to increase expenditures, just as a frugal one could decrease them.

3. Agencies are managed by appointed or elected boards that are accountable to the people now; there is no need to change a system that is considered one of the best in the country.

**Amendment No. 6 REMOVAL OF CERTAIN APPOINTED OFFICIALS**

Proposing a constitutional am-

endment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officials with the advice and consent of the senate; and allowing the governor to call a special session of the senate for this.

**FOR:**  
1. Allowing the governor to remove appointed officers of the State gives the governor the ability to insure the promotion of his/her policies.

2. This ability would make board members and other appointees more accountable to the needs of an elected official.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Appointees should have the ability to make independent judgments concerning the operations of their agencies, boards, and offices.

2. Such an added governing power would be a move away from control by the Legislature, which represents citizens at a district level.

3. The governor has no need for day-to-day control over appointed officers of the State.

**Amendment No. 7 COUNTY ROAD WORK ON PRIVATE ROADS**

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the authority of a county to perform private road work.

**FOR:**  
1. It is unfeasible to hire a private firm to perform private road work in many remote areas of Texas when the county can do the same at a reasonable charge.

2. Small counties must maintain expensive road construction and maintenance equipment even though not required on a full-time basis. Part of their investment could be regained with the revenue received from private road work.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Provisions of the Texas Constitution prohibit the use of public funds for private purposes and public funds would be squandered by this amendment.

2. Counties would be in direct competition with private construction.

**Amendment No. 8 JURISDICTION AND AUTHORITY OF THE COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS**

A constitutional amendment to change the names of the courts of civil appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the supreme court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate court.

**FOR:**  
1. It is unrealistic to expect only one criminal appellate court in Texas to administer criminal justice that is needed speedily and is a deterrent to crime.

2. The heavy workload of appeals in criminal cases that is presently handled by one court of criminal appeals would be shared by the 14 regional courts of appeal.

3. Appellate courts with jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters may attract and develop better judges that have benefitted from experience with a variety

of legal problems.

4. This amendment could clarify such questions as qualifications of a justice of the supreme court and a vacancy in the office of chief justice.

**AGAINST:**  
1. Our present system is the most efficient system to achieve criminal justice.

2. The addition of a large number of criminal cases to the civil caseload of the civil appeals courts will create another case-load problem.

**Amendment No. 9 CONVERSION OF MARITAL COMMUNITY PROPERTY INTO SEPARATE PROPERTY**

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

**FOR:**  
1. A system for marital property should provide general rules for determining rights and allow for persons to make alternative property arrangements in their best interest.

2. Benefits derived from property should be owned by the spouse who owns the property.

3. The amendment would reduce the complexity of the process of converting community property to separate property.

**AGAINST:**  
1. The present community property system has served the best interest of the citizens of Texas.

2. The community property system, as permitted by the amendment, could foster the crea-

tion of an entirely different way of settling property matters.

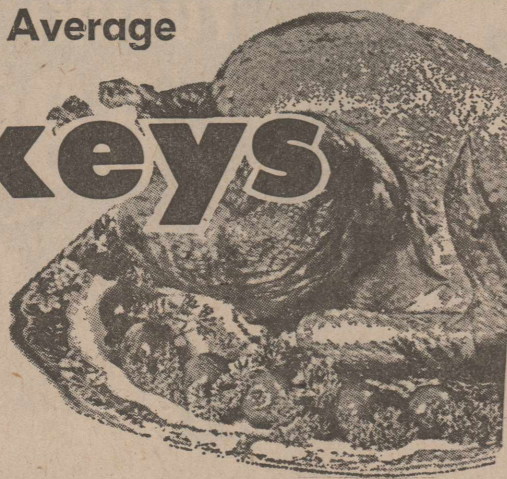

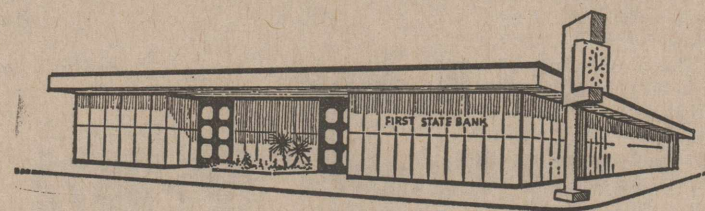

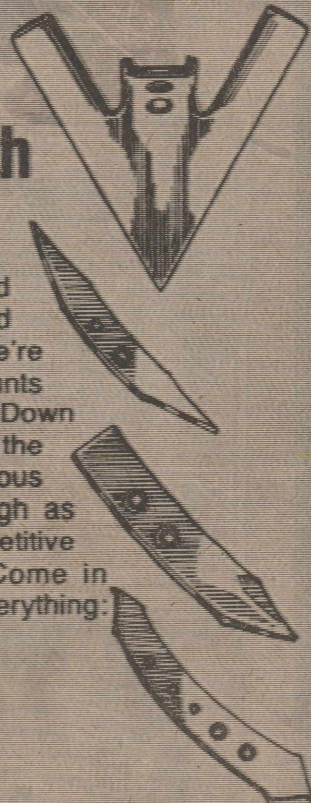
