Because of these ities USDA is asking for comments on how 1981 target prices should be adjusted from 1980 levels and whether producers

with established farm normal crop acreages to be eligible for full program benefits.
Williams said USDA also is asking whether barley and oats should be included in the 1981
feed grain program, and approfeed grain program, and appro-
priate loan and purchase price for corn, sorghum, barley, oats and rye.
