## Fire Department Receives Check

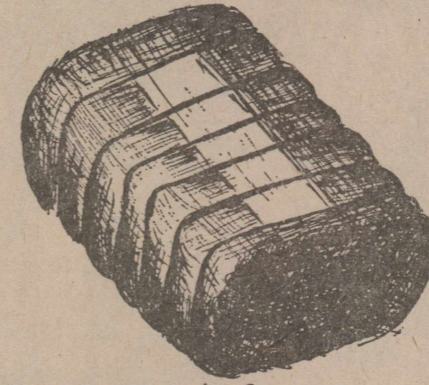
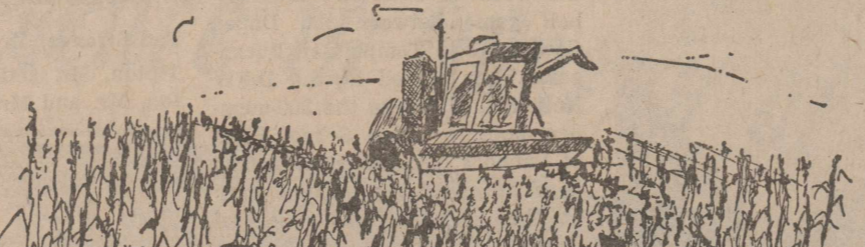

## Owls To Host Groom Friday Night

Silverton's Owls will be host to the Groom Tigers Friday night at 7:30 o'clock. The locals will be trying to contain the running-back that Coach Joe Stubblefield considers the best all-around back that the Owls will face this year.

"Groom is traditionally a strong team," the coach said. "They aren't too big this year, but I think Dwain Weller is the best back we will see. He earned a lot of honors for himself the past two seasons, and should be a candidate for all-state honors this year. I haven't seen Valley's McNary, but I really think Weller is best."

Weller gained 2,072 yards rushing for Groom last season.

Heaviest man on the Groom roster is junior guard Kenneth Weller who tips the scales at 210. They have 190-pound Thomas Bridges, senior tackle, and also a starting end that weighs 98 pounds.

The Owls need the support of the fans to keep their spirits up while they are trying to even their 1-2 season record.

In the 39-0 loss to McLean, for the third week in a row, Quarterback Casey Bean graded highest on the game film among the backs. Michael Hill was the highest-scoring offensive lineman. Gary Juarez was the leading tackler with 12. Mark Patton rushed for 60 yards, Eric Patton recovered a fumble and Russell Couch came up with an interception.

"The momentum went against us from the very first at McLean," Coach Stubblefield said. "We won the toss and took the wind at the start of the game, but we were unable to use this to our advantage as we had hoped we would be able to do."

McLean made a first down on the Owl 21 on the first play of the game, and made a touchdown on the third play with 10:40 still showing on the scoreboard clock. The kick into the wind failed and the Tigers held an early 6-0 lead.

The Owls made only one first down on their next series of plays, and then were forced to kick the ball away. After holding McLean on their next series, and turning the ball over at the 20,

the Owls fumbled and lost possession on first down. The Tigers made a first down on the Silverton 6, and on the second play of the second quarter passed for another score. The kick failed again, and the Tigers held a 12-0 lead with 11:45 remaining in the first half.

On Silverton's third down play, the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route, and McLean was back in business on Silverton's 44. They made a couple of first downs enroute to paydirt, and scored their third touchdown with 6:59 still showing in the second period. The extra point kick was good, and the Tigers led 19-0.

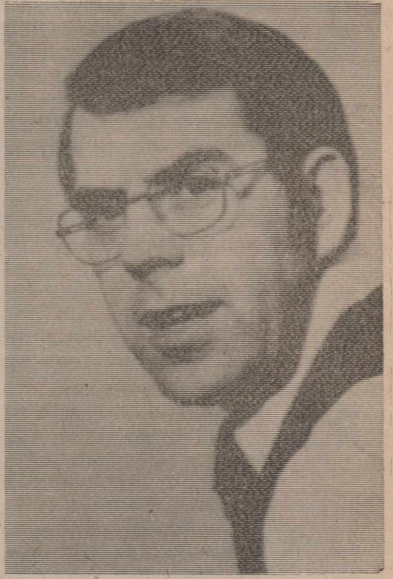
Silverton's offense was unable to move again on the next series, and the punt into the wind was short. This time the defense held and forced a McLean punt. The Owls picked up another first down on a run by Mark Patton, and Bean completed a pass to Russell Couch, but the Owls also picked up a couple of penalties on successive downs and ended up punting to midfield.

The Tigers picked up one first down. On third down, Shane Reagan almost intercepted a McLean pass, and on third down's replay (due to a holding call against the Tigers) Russell Couch did intercept with three seconds remaining to be played in the first half. Bean completed a pass to Ernest Rodriguez for a first down on the Silverton 48 before time expired.

The Owls received the opening kick in the third quarter, but were unable to gain yardage. On fourth down, punter Russell Couch was unable to get the handle on a bad snap from center, and the Tigers recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. The run for extra points failed, and McLean led 25-0.

Next touchdown for the Tigers came on a sustained drive from their own 35. The score came with 3:31 remaining in the third period. The run for extra points failed, and the Tigers led 31-0.

The Owls once again lost the ball via the fumble route, and McLean set up operations on the Silverton 30. The Tigers picked up first downs on the 18 and eight yard lines, and moved to about the one-foot mark before

## "Pony Express" To Ride Again For Local Church

"The Pony Express rides again" soon will be the enthusiastic cry heard at First United Methodist Church in Silverton.

The Rev. John Decker, pastor, said the church's past success with the Pony Express stewardship program prompted the return visit.

Almost 100 members of the church became saddle-bag-carrying "trail bosses" and "route riders" a year ago.

"We found last year that this unique approach turned the stewardship campaign into an exciting and pleasurable experience,"

he said.

The program, he said, is based on the same concept as the Pony Express of more than a century ago—teamwork.

Church leaders are designated as trail bosses, to supervise the relaying of saddlebags to each church family on Pony Express "run" routes.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 10 church families on the run route. A family fills in an "estimate of giving" card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag, which then is hand-carried to another family on

the route.

Jerry Millhollon, general manager of the campaign, said many dedicated members of the church are hesitant to solicit pledges from their friends and neighbors.

"However, there are no solicitations and no pledges with the Pony Express program," he said.

The Rev. Decker explained that each member is asked simply to estimate the amount he or she will be able to give to the church during the coming year.

"Each family makes that decision in the privacy of their home, without any over-the-shoulder 'supervision' of someone from the church," he said.

He said the program's success last year was due to the personal commitment and ability of church members to work as a team.

"Like the highly dedicated riders of the original Pony Express, each of our riders was dependent on the other to make the relay system work and speed the mail on to its final destination," he said.

"We have found church families will act responsibly in deciding about the support they will give their church during the coming year," he added.

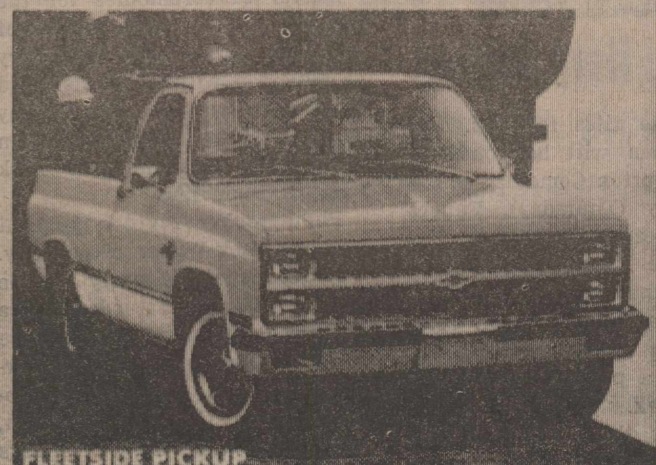

### Social Security in Briscoe County

BY JANICE ULMER

In 1977, Congress enacted several amendments to the Social Security Act. One of the most controversial of these amendments concerns government pension off-set. This could effect anyone who receives a Federal, State or local pension based on his or her government employment, which is not covered by Social Security.

The Social Security Act requires that under specific conditions a social security benefit based on his or her spouse's earnings record will be reduced dollar-for-dollar by the amount of the government pension. The important word here is SPOUSE. This offset provision does not apply to social security benefits received as the result of work on one's own record. Furthermore, Congress included an exception in this amendment. If a person is eligible for (whether or not a pension is received), or receiving a government pension any month from December, 1977 through November, 1982, and this person meets the entitlement factors for a spouse's benefit as they were interpreted in January, 1977, the offset does not apply.

For example, Mary Jones is a teacher who qualifies for a teacher retirement benefit in October, 1982. Mrs. Jones doesn't retire until 1989 when she is 62 years old and her husband, Harry, decides to retire and draw his social security. Mary's social security wife's benefit will not be offset by the amount of her teacher retirement pension because she was eligible for that pension between December, 1977 and November, 1982, even though she did not take it. She also meets the social security requirements for wife's benefits as they were in January, 1977.

One final note: If Mary had not been eligible for teacher's retirement until January, 1983, the offset would apply regardless of when she applies for benefits. However, even if her wife's benefits are totally offset, she is still eligible for Medicare.

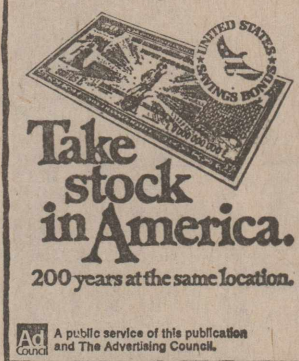

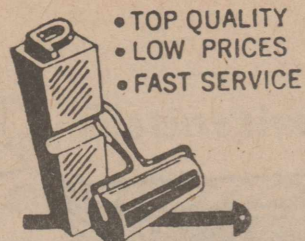

## USDA Calls For Comments On '81 Feed Grains, Soybeans Programs

Deputy Secretary Jim Williams has asked the public to comment by October 27 on proposals for the 1981 feed grain and soybean programs.

By November 15, a decision must be made on whether to offer a set-aside program or to permit farmers to be eligible for program benefits—including the reserve program—without setting aside acreage.

In particular, Williams said, USDA is seeking comments on reserve release and call prices which are based on production costs and adjusted either by increasing the national average loan price or increasing the gap between loan and reserve prices.

Under new authorities granted under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980, the current cost of production estimates may be considered in determining 1981 target prices. In the past, changes in target prices were based upon a formula considering only prior year's costs.

Because of these new authorities USDA is asking for comments on how 1981 target prices should be adjusted from 1980 levels and whether producers should be required to comply with established farm normal crop acreages to be eligible for full program benefits.

Williams said USDA also is asking whether barley and oats should be included in the 1981 feed grain program, and appropriate loan and purchase prices for corn, sorghum, barley, oats and rye.

In addition, public comment is requested on whether there should be a land diversion program, and if so, the size of the diversion and level of payment. Comments also are requested on limitations on planted acreage.

If a set-aside program is implemented, USDA has discretion-

ary authority to adjust the target price to compensate producers for participating in such a program. Comments are requested on whether this authority should be used and the magnitude on any adjustment.

"Because of the relationship between soybeans and feed grains, we are also seeking public comments on appropriate loan price and purchase price levels for 1981 crop soybeans. Other determinations affecting soybeans include commodity eligibility, storage requirements and premiums and discounts," said Williams.

Related to these program decisions are determinations on the amount of the national program acreage and recommended reductions from 1980 harvested acreage for full target price protection.

While USDA is required by law to announce set-aside, national program acreage and recommended reductions in plantings decisions by November 15, the department may announce program decisions before that time.

Before reaching any decisions, all recommendations and views will be considered along with the best data available on world and U. S. crop conditions, production and consumption prospects.

Written comments will be received until October 27 by the Director, Production Adjustment Division, ASCS, USDA, Room 3630-S, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. All comments will be available for public inspection during regular business hours in the Director's office.

The notice of the October 27 comment period will appear in next week's "Federal Register." The original notice calling for comments on the program was published in the September 9 "Federal Register."

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), George H. James, jr., FmHA county supervisor, said today.

James asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 219 N.W. Second Street in Tulia.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until June 18, 1981 for physical losses and until December 31, 1983 for production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other

er loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming operation. Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs, James said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for actual losses is five percent (5%). Annual production loans are being made at an interest rate of 13½%.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

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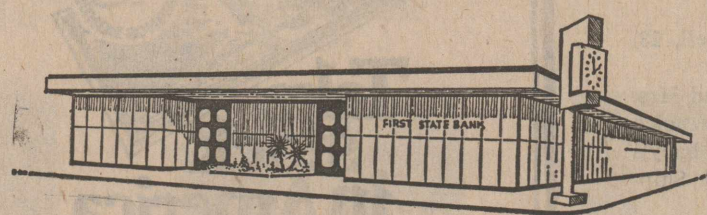

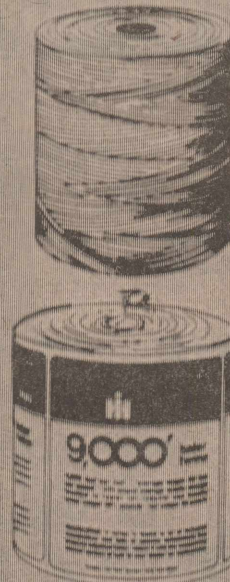
