

General Rain Falls On This Area Of Texas

After enduring one of the hottest and driest summers on record, and seeing crops starve for water during the growing season, Mother Nature finally saw fit to send Silverton 2.07 inches of rain that fell without much runoff.

This rain came at a time when farmers in the area are trying to harvest cotton, soybeans and milo. These commodities were being hauled to market this year at the same time as the corn, creating a very unusual situation. Even though the rain was too late to help the cotton and some of the feed crops, it is in plenty of time to get the wheat off to a good start. It may be in time to help the parched pasture land recover from the three-month drought also.

In all, 3.30 inches of rain was measured in Silverton during September by Fred Strange, who keeps the official weather records. This brought the rainfall for 1980 to 17.08 inches to date.

Some dry weather is needed now, in order to get the crops harvested and to prevent a total financial disaster.

The 30-day outlook calls for above normal temperatures and below normal rainfall.

Mrs. Hester died at 12:30 p.m. Sunday at Lockney General Hospital. She and her husband had resided at the Lockney Care Center for the past several months.

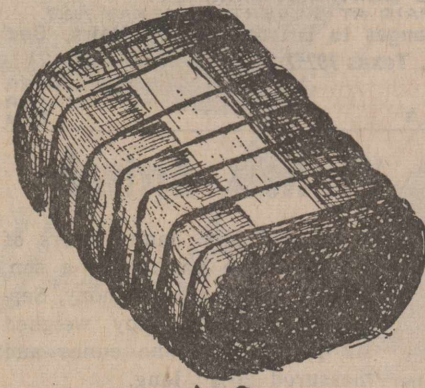
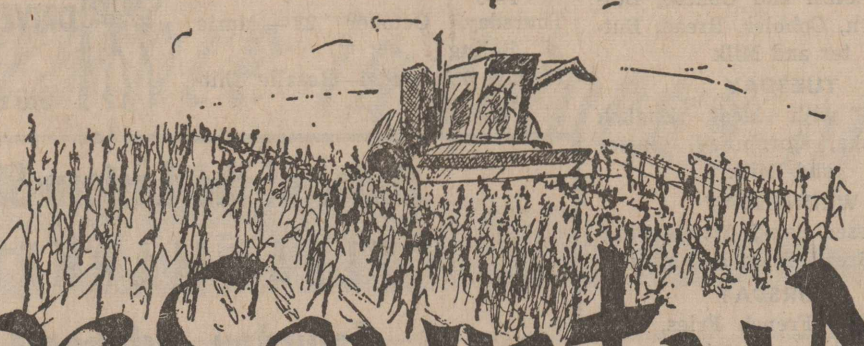
Mrs. Hester was a member of the Baptist Church and had been a resident of Briscoe County since 1937.

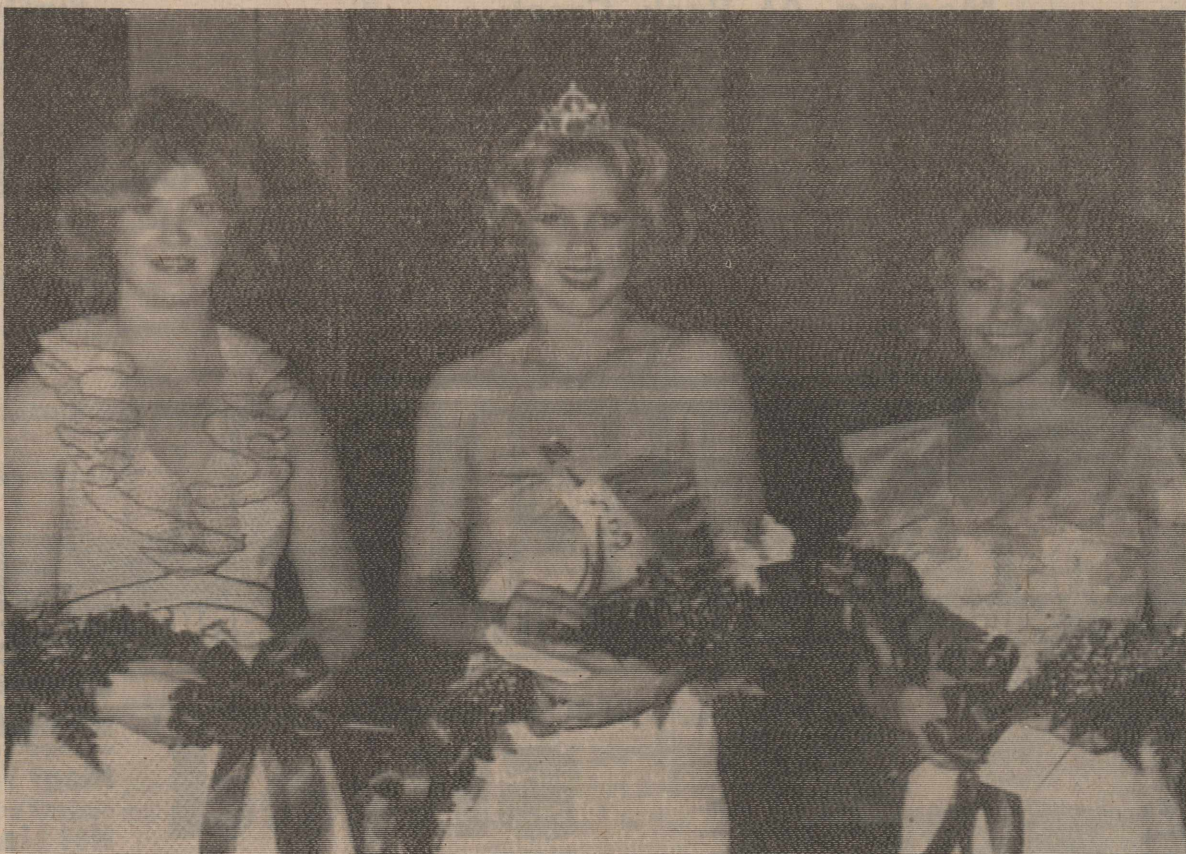

Owls On Road To Kress This Week

Silverton's Owls will be traveling to Kress Friday night to meet the Kangaroos at 8:00 p.m. The 'Roos are the defending champions of their 3-AA District.

"Kress has a lot of potential," said Coach Joe Stubblefield. "They have nine players back from their district championship team of last year. So far this year, they really haven't lived up to their expectations."

The Owls will be coming off a 12-6 loss to Groom last Friday night, and will be trying to improve their won-loss record. They didn't have a very large cheering section last Friday due to the rain, but will be expecting more noise from their side of the field this week.

Mark Patton was the back who graded highest on the game film. Roger Cantwell was the highest scoring lineman. Gary Juarez got 22 tackles, and Mitchel Martin and Brandon Jarrett each recovered one Groom miscue. Russell Couch came up with an interception in the game.

Fumbles really killed the Owls, who were playing in a steady rain throughout the game. "The Groom backs were starting their 22nd and 28th consecutive games," said Coach Stubblefield. "They probably have played lots of games in the rain, and this seemed to spell the difference."

The Owl defense held after kicking off to Groom to open the game, and the Tigers punted on fourth down to the Silverton, 40. On first down the Owls lost the ball on a fumble and Groom recovered on the Silverton 45.

The Tigers made three first downs, arriving on the Owl 5, at which point five tries failed to gain against the stubborn Owl defense, and the ball went over to Silverton on the five or six yard line. The Owls fumbled on first down and Groom recovered on the three. From there they scored the first touchdown of the game with 4:40 remaining on the first-quarter clock. The run for conversion points failed, and the Tigers led 6-0.

Silverton took the opening kickoff on their own 35, and picked up a first down on runs by Gary Juarez and Mark Patton. Kelly McMurtry carried a couple of times, before the Owls were forced to punt. The punt carried to the Groom 22.

The teams traded a couple of punts as the second quarter began. The Owls picked up another first down before a Silverton pass was intercepted and carried to near midfield. Groom made three first downs and unsuccessfully tried a field goal on fourth down from the Silverton 12 with 2:57 remaining in the first half.

Groom fumbled a Silverton punt and Silverton recovered on the Groom 48. Groom intercepted an Owl aerial on the last play of the first half.

The Owls took the kickoff which opened the third period, and Casey Bean completed a pass to Russell Couch for a first down on the Tiger 21. Runs by McMurtry and Juarez inched the ball nearer the goal, and Juarez carried the score with 9:47 remaining in the quarter. Juarez' PAT kick was blocked, and the score

was knotted at 6-6.

Groom got a good kickoff return, but fumbled the snap on fourth down, and Silverton recovered on the Groom 13 with 8:06 still showing on the third quarter clock. However, the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route on the Groom 20. Silverton was penalized and lost the down on a roughing the kicker call, which was very similar to an earlier infraction against the Owls which the referees didn't call, and gave the Tigers new life when the Owls would normally have had possession. Dwain Weller ran 70 yards for another Groom score with 6:02 still showing on the third quarter clock. The conversion pass failed, and the Tigers led 12-6.

Silverton lost the ball on another fumble before McMurtry intercepted a Groom pass on the Owl 23. The Owls turned it over this time on a punt.

In the fourth quarter, the Owls made a first down on runs by Juarez and another on a pass from Bean to Couch, but on the next play the Owls lost a fumble with 7:27 still to be played.

Groom picked up four first downs before the Owls stopped them on fourth down on the Silverton 17. A series of incomplete Owl passes followed before the Tigers intercepted on fourth down with 1:36 to be played.

The ball went back to the Owls again on downs but Groom intercepted yet another Silverton pass with 11 seconds remaining on the clock.

In all, the Owls were dogged by nine turnovers, including six lost fumbles, which spelled doom for them in this game.

The Pony Express Rides again Sunday

A second "run" of the Pony Express will get under way Sunday at the First United Methodist Church with a "trail boss" breakfast and worship service.

An estimated 10 church members acting as trail bosses are expected for the breakfast briefing. The Rev. John Decker, pastor, said church families on the Pony Express "run" will again relay stewardship saddlebags to gather "estimate of giving" cards.

Saddlebags and run route lists will be handed out at the breakfast by Jerry Millhollen, general manager of the stewardship campaign.

The relay of saddlebags among church members will begin immediately after the morning worship service, he said.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 10 church families. Each family fills in a giving estimate card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag pouch and then hand-carries the saddlebag to another of the families on the route.

"We're excited because of the enthusiastic reception the Pony Express received at our church last year," he said.

He said the program develops a spirit of teamwork, as well as one of competition.

The competition, he said, comes in the eagerness of the trail bosses to see that their run is completed before another is finished.

"It's good, healthy competition for a good cause," he said.

He said the teamwork is similar to that of the Pony Express riders of a century ago, knowing they can count on the next rider to relay the mail to its next destination.

Each trail boss is responsible for supervision of the relaying of one saddlebag to 10 families. The trail bosses report periodically to the general manager.

Trail bosses are Frank Hunt, Max Weaver, Terry Bomar, Lem Weaver, Earnest Kiker, Harold Edwards, Wayne Nance, Bill Strange and Mike Mercer.

Rev. Decker says he has been in churches that have participated in Pony Express campaigns before, but none have started with the authenticity of actual mounted riders carrying the first leg of the run.

This Sunday's service will include resource material from the 1905 Methodist Hymnal and the 1891 "Ritual of the Methodist Church."

All members and guests are asked to participate with western attire this Sunday.

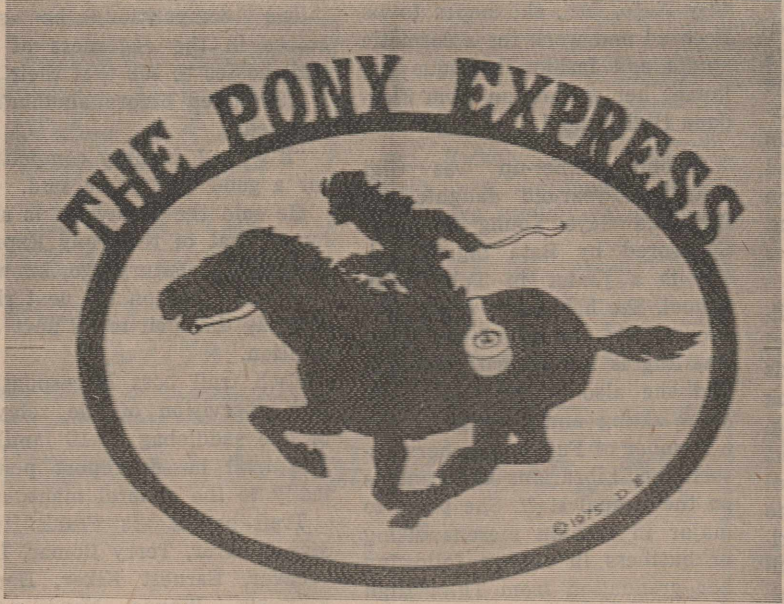

Social Security in Briscoe County

Are you considering retiring at the end of 1980? If so, you should start making serious plans including social security now.

First, if you are under 65 considering retirement, you should remember that Social Security benefits will be permanently re-

duced if received before 65. The amount of the reduction depends on the number of months you get benefits before 65. The reduction rate is 20% at 62, 13 1/3% at 63 and 6 2/3% at 64. It is figured by the number of months a person is under 65.

Other factors can influence your decision to retire. Availability of a company pension could be a factor. So could one's ability to continue working. At any rate, you should apply for social security retirement checks two or three months before you reach 65, even though you have no re-

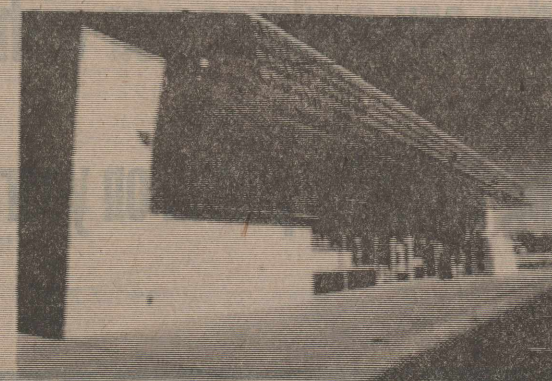

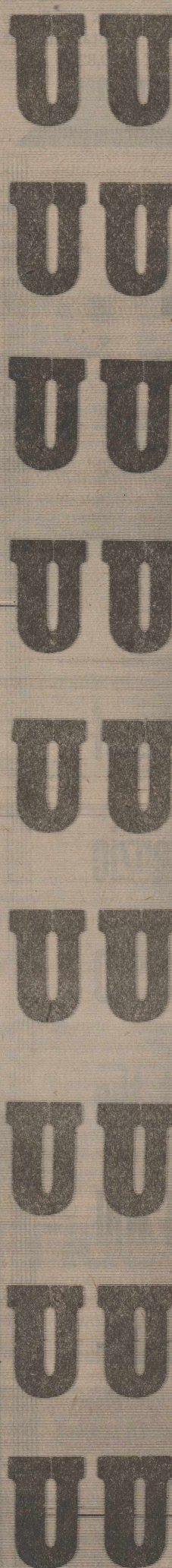

First Quarter Sales In Texas UP \$12.4 Billion

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reported that gross sales in Texas during the first quarter of 1980 totaled \$60.9 billion.

He said first quarter sales this year passed 1979 first quarter sales by \$12.4 billion.

Bullock said the sales tax analysis of gross sales for January, February and March show that 250,681 outlets reported gross sales.

The Comptroller's office also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's 25 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

First quarter sales in 1980 for Harris County were \$15.9 billion as recorded by 40,987 reporting outlets compared to \$12.4 billion reported in the first quarter of 1979 by 41,727 outlets.

Gross sales reported in the state's other major urban areas included:

—Dallas County, \$9.2 billion, up \$1.7 billion over the first quarter of 1979.

—Bexar County, \$2.9 billion, up more than \$800 million over the 1979 first quarter totals.

—Tarrant County, \$3.7 billion, an increase of more than \$500 million over the first quarter of last year.

In Briscoe County, there were 58 reporting outlets. The 1980 first quarter gross sales were \$5,213,735, with deductions of \$4,584,223 and use tax purchases of \$31,312, for a total amount subject to tax of \$660,824.

Enlarged Package Delivery Service Granted By ICC

Enlarged package delivery service has been granted to more than 25 million Americans in nine south-central states by a decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC).

United Parcel Service announced today that it would commence serving the affected area on September 29.

UPS has been restricted against interstate transportation of packages within an area that included southern Nebraska, Kansas, western Missouri, Oklahoma, western Arkansas and Texas.

In addition, the company had been prohibited from moving packages between Memphis on the one hand and Arkansas and northern Mississippi on the other, as well as between Denver from and to Kansas and southern Nebraska.

Kent Nelson, Customer Service manager for United Parcel Service, characterized the ICC decision as another milestone in the road to improving parcel transportation service in the nation.

"For almost a decade," said Nelson, "we have had to refuse repeated requests for service to customers who could not understand why we could carry packages from Texas and Oklahoma across the country, yet not move

them across the Texas-Oklahoma border.

"The ICC decision removes the last interstate barrier to the free flow of packages from and to any address in the 48 states," he said.

"The removal of these artificial transportation restraints will have a beneficial effect on the economy of the area," he concluded, "since it will make available to residents of these areas a service alternative to the parcel post system."

The ICC granted United Parcel Service temporary authority to operate in the area pending a final ICC decision on a UPS application for permanent removal of the restrictions.

United Parcel Service still is hampered by restrictions in Oklahoma and Texas where the company has no authority to carry packages between points within the two states. The company is continuing its efforts to eliminate these last two intrastate service barriers.

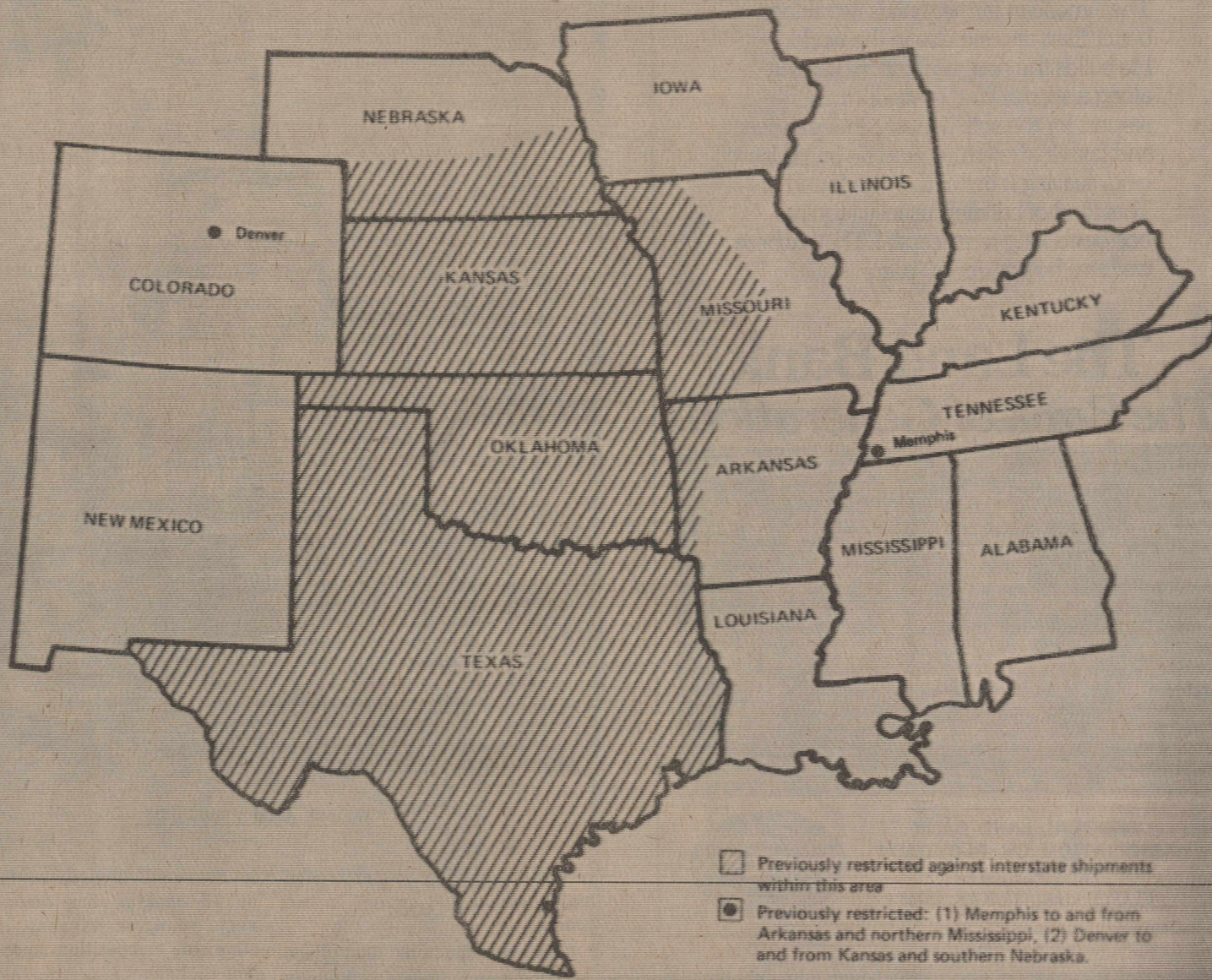
The ICC decision is the second major transportation change affecting the area within a month. In mid-August UPS commenced offering its two-day Blue Label Air service to residents of 10 states in the area, who previously were restricted against use of that service.

The air service was instituted as a consequence of the new truck deregulation law which removed a restriction on UPS against offering its economical air service throughout the mid-American states.

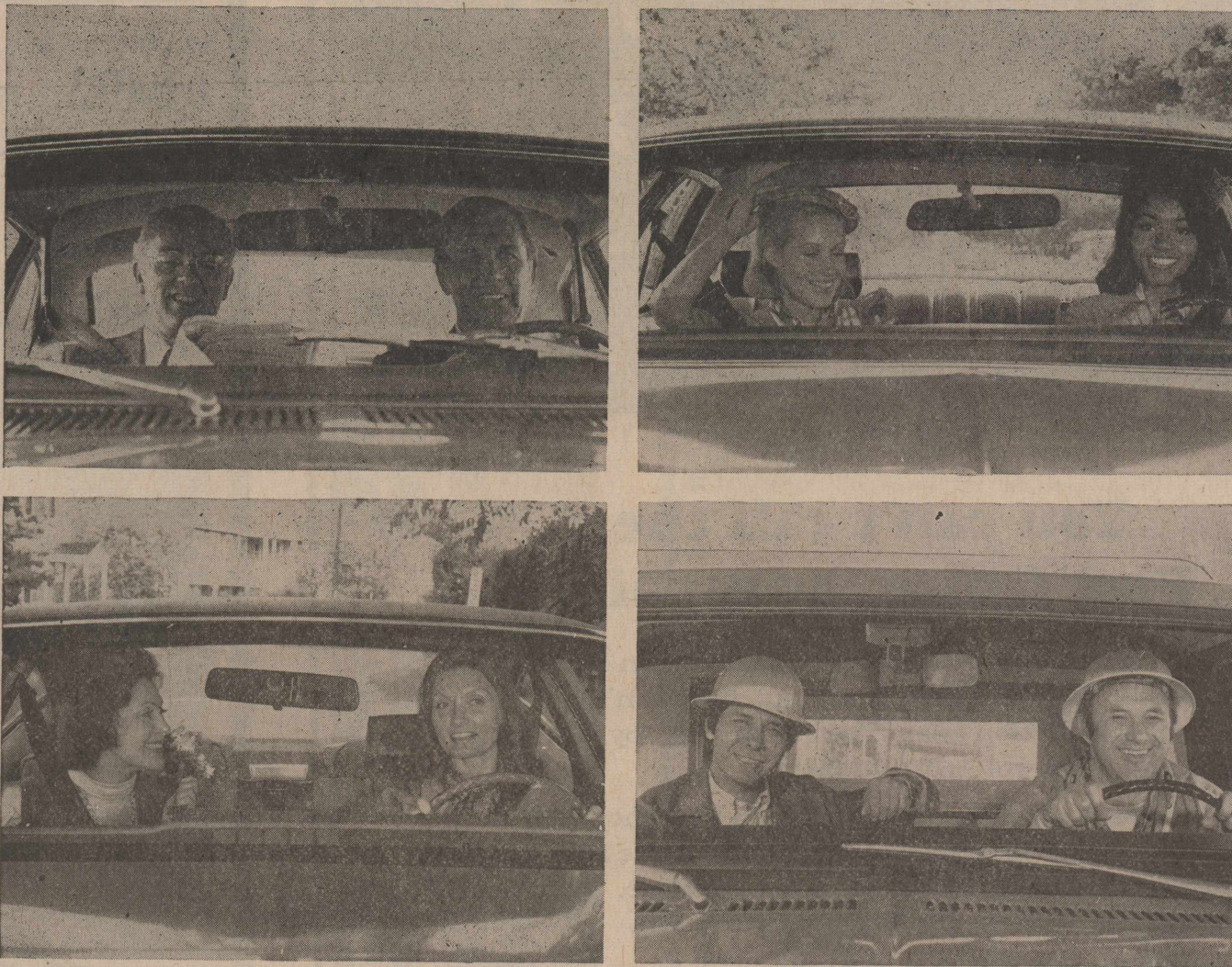
United Parcel Service currently supplies package delivery service connecting the rest of the nation with the area that has been opened up by the ICC decision. The company announced that it had adequate facilities to cope with new volume that will be generated by the decision.

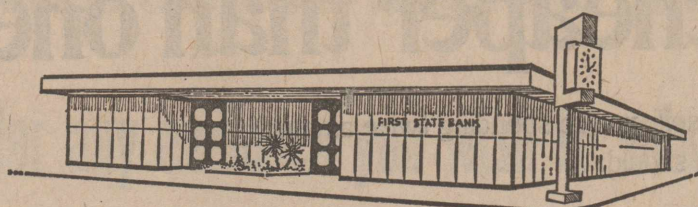

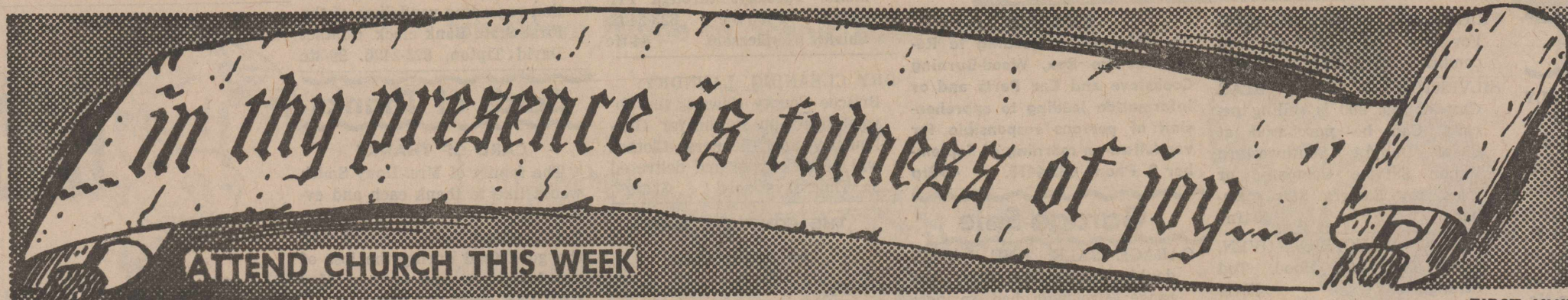
