first downs. The defense pushed them back on the next series, and the 'Horns saw the ball go back to the Owls on the Silvertton 26 with 1:49 remaining to be played in the first half.

A roughing-the-kicker penalty against Lazbuddie gave the Owls a first down, and Bean completed a pass to Mark Patton. The Owls received a motion penalty, but Mark Patton ran for 15 yards just as the first half ended.

After taking the kickoff which opened the third period of play, the Longhorns fumbled on third down and the Owls recovered on the Lazbuddie 47.

Runs by Mark Patton, Ernest Rodriguez and Gary Juarez picked up three first downs, the third of which was on the Lazbuddie 14. Then an Owl aerial was picked off by Lazbuddie in the end-zone, and the Longhorns had a touchback.

This possession was ended with a Lazbuddie fumble which was recovered on the 'Horn 11. After getting a 15-yard penalty, the Owls attempted a pass out of a fake field goal formation, the

West Texas Board of Directors, states that fifty percent of all patients presently on dialysis could have avoided this costly, time-consuming treatment if they had been diagnosed during childhood. Some kidney diseases can be present for 20 years before any symptoms are present. By then 85 to 90 percent of the kidney functions can be lost.

Funding for the project is being provided by a private grant and various donations by individuals.

The urinalysis screening consists of a very simple procedure. The child will be asked to go into the restroom and give a sample in a paper cup. The child will then give the cup to the nurse who is doing the testing. A dip stick, which works on the same principle as litmus paper, is dipped into the sample and the color will tell if the child could have any abnormal kidney function. This test checks Ph, glucose, protein and blood in the urine. If a child shows some tendencies towards kidney disease, the parents will be notified, informing them that the child should be seen by the family physician.

If your child has not brought his/her parental consent form home, please contact the school so that your child may be tested. You can prevent serious complications which could lead to eventual kidney failure by participating in this program. Your children need this help!

### CROP, LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS, RANCHERS

From mid-November to early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

This time, with six minutes remaining to be played, the Owls mounted another successful drive. Runs by Rodriguez and

Mark Patton picked up a first down on the Lazbuddie 36, Juarez and Patton ran the ball to the 25, and Rodriguez carried the touchdown from that point with 3:33 still showing on the clock. The Owls lined up with Michael Hill back to do the kicking, there was a bad snap that just grazed the hands of Casey Bean who was to hold for the kick. Hill, picked the ball up off the ground and tossed it to Russell Couch who was waiting in the end zone, and the Owls had themselves a two-point conversion and a 15-0 lead in the game.

Gary Juarez intercepted a Lazbuddie pass shortly after the Owl kickoff, but the Owls saw the ball go over on downs with 1:20

remaining to be played. Lazbuddie picked up a first down on a penalty against the Owls, but were held on the next series, and time ran out in the game with the 'Horns in their own end of the field.

The Owls made 17 first downs as compared with six for the Longhorns. Silvertton had seven penetrations in the game in spite of scoring only twice. The Longhorns had two penetrations.

The Owls will be playing at home tonight, and as always, will need, deserve and appreciate the support of all fans. It will be a big plus for the Owls if they can end their season on a high note with a big victory. Be there to help them!

## Urinalysis Screening Project To Be Held Here November 18

On November 18, 1980, the National Kidney Foundation of West Texas will sponsor a urinalysis screening project in the Silvertton Elementary School for kindergarten through eighth grade students. This program is designed to detect kidney disease early among school age children at no charge to the student or the school.

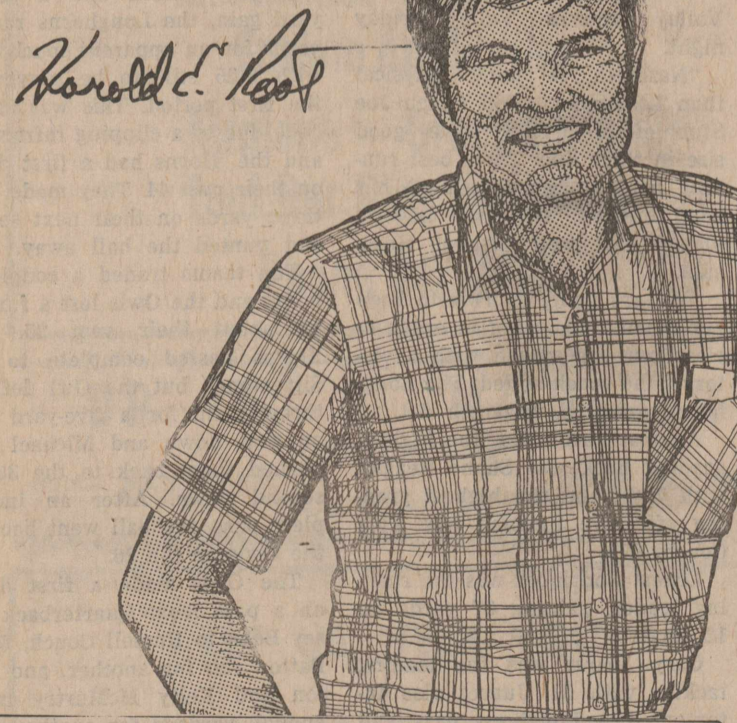
Kidney and urinary tract diseases affect more than 13 million American men, women and children and continues to be one of the major causes of work loss

and school absenteeism. Of these people, 43,000 need an artificial kidney just to stay alive, some of these are children. The mortality rate due to kidney disease is 54,000 annually, more people than are killed in traffic accidents each year. There are currently more than 200 people in our area who must sustain life on an artificial kidney machine because of renal failure. 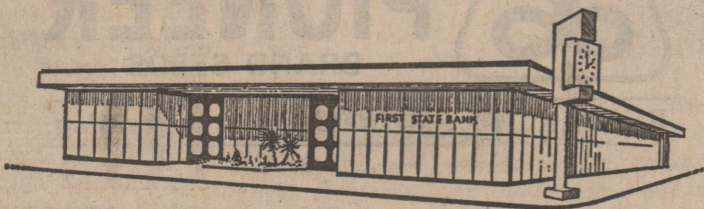
