
The family moved to Silverton in 1947.





JANICE ULMER With the Christmas rush in full swing it is difficult to think three hours ahead, let alone three weeks. Nevertheless, the beginning of the new year brings numerous changes, including those dealing with Medicare.

In 1981 the hospital deductibles will increase. For the first 60 days, the Medicare patient will have to pay \$204 before coverage begins. For the 61st through the 90th day, Medicare will pay for all covered charges after the first \$51 per day. For the 60 reserve days the deductible is \$102 a day.

With January 1, 1981 we are also in the general enrollment period for Medicare. Individuals over 65 who have either dropped previous Medicare coverage or who have never had it, may enroll for this coverage from January through March. Protection is then effective July 1,




