Double funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque for Cecil Payne, 32, of Clarendon, who was killed in a one-vehicle accident Friday, and for his uncle, Willie E. (Bill) Payne, 53, of Quitaque, who died of natural causes the same day.

The Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, and the Rev. Mike Grebenik, pastor of the Quitaque Baptist Church, officiated. Burial for both was in Resthaven Cemetery at Quitaque by Quitaque Funeral Home.

The accident occurred shortly after 9:00 p.m. Friday 4.3 miles north of Clarendon on Texas Highway 70.

Cecil Payne, born in Floyd County, was a cowboy and a member of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque.

Survivors include his wife, Carolyn Sue of Boise City, Oklahoma; three daughters, Lauana Sue and Christine Diane, both of Clarendon; a step-daughter, Chandra of Boise City; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buck Payne of Silverton; two brothers, Lonnie Payne of Quitaque and Earl Payne of Clarendon, and a sister, Donna Green of Clarendon.

Willie Payne was born in Floyd County and was a member of the Quitaque Assembly of God Church. He was a plumber and had lived in Quitaque most of his life.

Survivors are four brothers, Orvil, Warren and Ray Payne, all of Quitaque, and Buck Payne of Silverton; four sisters, Olivia Stockton and Lillie Bell Reagan, both of Quitaque, Frances Martin of Portales, New Mexico, and Evall Weems of Carlsbad, New Mexico.

The family moved to Silverton in 1947.

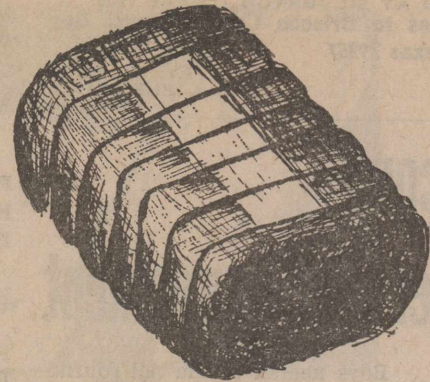
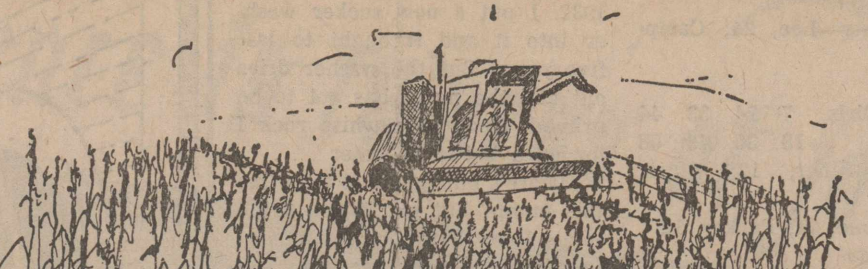
She was preceded in death by her husband in 1959, and moved to Amarillo from Silverton ten years ago.

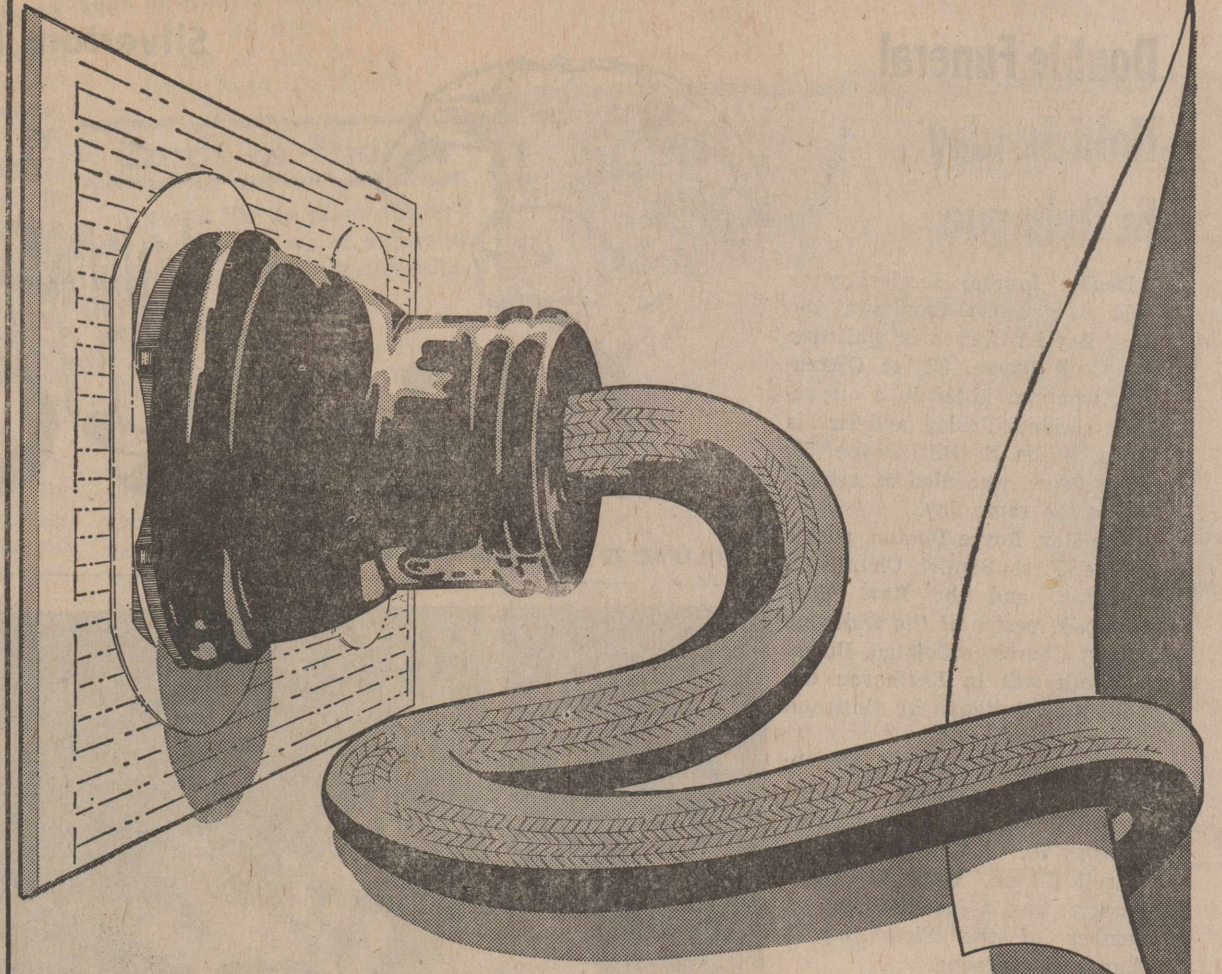



# KIKER'S KORNER

YEAR-END TAX PLANNING

Farmers and ranchers have only a few more days to make decisions that could affect their 1980 income tax situation.

Year-end planning can help save tax dollars.

It is suggested that farmers and ranchers follow a systematic procedure in making end-of-

year tax management moves.

First, decide what your tax management goals are. Commonly, the goal is to save income taxes, but check the impact of this goal on social security retirement income. Although an important objective in income tax management is to smooth out variations in income from year to year, individuals nearing age 65 may want to defer the recognition of income until age 65 to take advantage of the larger personal exemption.

After defining your tax man-

agement goals, it's time to make some estimates. Calculate 1980 net farm profit, taxable non-farm income, and total tax due. Estimate the same items for the 1981 tax year.

By comparing 1980 and 1981 taxable income estimates, decide whether to increase or decrease this year's taxable income (especially net farm profit) relative to next year's. If the drought has reduced your 1980 taxable income and you expect that 1981 will be a more profitable year, you may want to postpone some expenses for farm supplies and purchase of machinery until next year. You may even want to make some additional sales of crops and livestock before December 31 to improve this year's net farm income.

This systematic procedure in reaching end-of-year tax management decisions provides a review of 1980 and another appraisal of expectations for 1981.

So determine your 1980 income tax status and also get a quick look at 1981. When the new year arrives, the cash basis taxpayer loses much of the present flexibility because many income tax management strategies are no longer available for the 1980 tax year.

## SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY JANICE ULMER

With the Christmas rush in full swing it is difficult to think three hours ahead, let alone three weeks. Nevertheless, the beginning of the new year brings numerous changes, including those dealing with Medicare.

In 1981 the hospital deductibles will increase. For the first 60 days, the Medicare patient will have to pay \$204 before coverage begins. For the 61st through the 90th day, Medicare will pay for all covered charges after the first \$51 per day. For the 60 reserve days the deductible is \$102 a day.

With January 1, 1981 we are also in the general enrollment period for Medicare. Individuals over 65 who have either dropped previous Medicare coverage or who have never had it, may enroll for this coverage from January through March. Protection is then effective July 1.

Since each taxpayer's situation is unique, year-end tax management decisions may require consultation with your tax specialist.

services not covered under hospital insurance.

It is possible for people who have never worked to apply for Medicare coverage. It is also possible for people who are not retired to apply for Medicare without signing up for monthly social security benefits.

In most cases, hospital insurance with Medicare is free. The doctor's portion of the insurance is financed by premiums paid by those enrolled and the Federal Government from general revenues.

The cost of this premium is currently \$9.60 per month. In some cases, if a person did not enroll three months before his 65th birthday or three months after (his initial enrollment period), the premium may be higher.

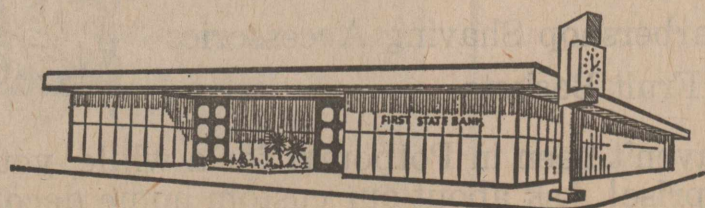
