Here is a letter I received, dated March 11, 1981, which should be of interest to the people of Briscoe County.

It read:

"Dear Mrs. Sarchet:

"Thank you for your letter in behalf of Doctor James Chua Tuan. I was pleased to introduce private legislation in his behalf during the 97th Congress.

"While I feel that my effort was appropriate, I must advise you of my traditional policy regarding the introduction of private bills. As a matter of course, I exercise a great deal of discretion in lending sponsorship to legislation of a private nature. Those requests which I do entertain are few in number and are carefully scrutinized in order to insure that the introduction of legislation is consistent with the strict purpose which private bills seek to serve. After such a determination is made, I then must rely on my colleagues to judge the merits of my proposal and to render a decision thereon. Therefore, I am inclined to accept as final the decision of my peers on any individual relief measure in any given Congress.

"I appreciate knowing of your high regard for Doctor Tuan and am hopeful that my efforts in his behalf will afford him the opportunity to gain permanent residency.

Senator Tower introduced the bill mentioned in his letter in Congress to prevent the deportation by the Immigration Department of Dr. Tuan. Mr. Tower has performed this service for the people of Briscoe County several times before, and his help in keeping Dr. Tuan in Silverton is appreciated very much.

Services Held Tues. For Alton Clemmer

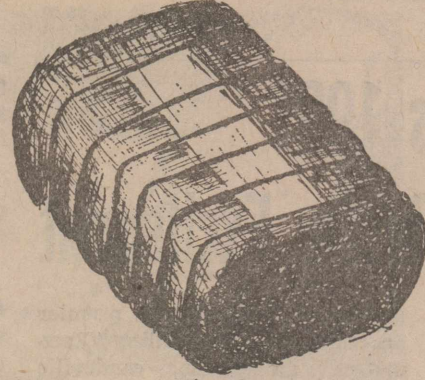
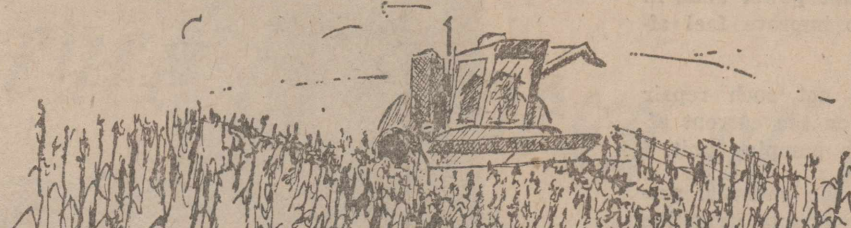

Tax Relief Available For Land Used For Agricultural Production

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes?

If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Mrs. Carlye Hill, tax assessor-collector for the Silverton Independent School District, qualified landowners hold the option of having an agricultural or open-space land valuation applied to their property.

She said that land in rural areas, especially near fast-developing urban areas, has increased tremendously in value during the past two decades and it is anticipated this will continue. Subdivisions, shopping centers and industrial sites are fast developing in areas that were previously devoted to agricultural purposes, she noted.

This development, she added, and the subsequent increase in land prices prompted the Legislature to look for ways to help keep the farmer and rancher from being "priced-out" of business.

Mrs. Hill said a form of alternate valuation available to qualified landowners is that of open-space land valuation. Effective in 1979, it provides for the valuation of agricultural and timberlands and ecological laboratories. She added that the legal basis for this form of land valuation is in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d-1.

Several conditions must be met in order to qualify under that section, including:

—The land must have been devoted principally to agricultural use for at least five of the last seven years;

—The land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use;

—A valid application must be timely filed annually during the rendition period;

—The land must be used for agricultural purposes to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area, and,

—The tax assessor-collector must approve the application.

Mrs. Hill said that under this form of valuation, the possibility

of a rollback tax exists. She indicated this liability for additional tax is triggered under Sec. 1-d-1 valuation by a change in the use of the land. The change of use would be to a non-agricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation.

The additional tax is measured by the difference between the taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid at the market value, she added. The re-capture of lost taxes extends back three years under Sec. 1-d and five years under Sec. 1-d-1.

Additional information is available at the local tax office. Mrs. Hill will be able to assist with the type data which will be necessary for beginning qualifications for the program.

Application forms are available at the tax office and should be filed before April 1 for the year in which the individual wishes to qualify.

Costs of irrigating cropland can be reduced by keeping irrigation pumps and power units in good repair to improve fuel efficiency.

Whether or not such repair pays depends on the current efficiency of the pumping unit.

To evaluate the potential profitability of repairs to irrigation units, consider current pumping efficiency, depth from which water is lifted, interest rate, cost and expected life of the improvement, and current condition of the power unit and pump.

The following example illustrates the effect of the current efficiency factor on the profitability of repair work.

Assume that improvement cost is \$5,000 at 15 percent interest, the increase in efficiency from 40 to 50 percent will pay repair costs in less than two years. On the other hand, increasing efficiency from 60 to 70 percent requires almost four years to pay repair costs.

Today more pumping plants fall in the 40 to 50 percent range than the 60-70 percent range. Thus many producers can make profitable improvements in irrigation pumping efficiency before preplant irrigation starts this spring.

The evaluation of the unit's current efficiency is critical as a first step.

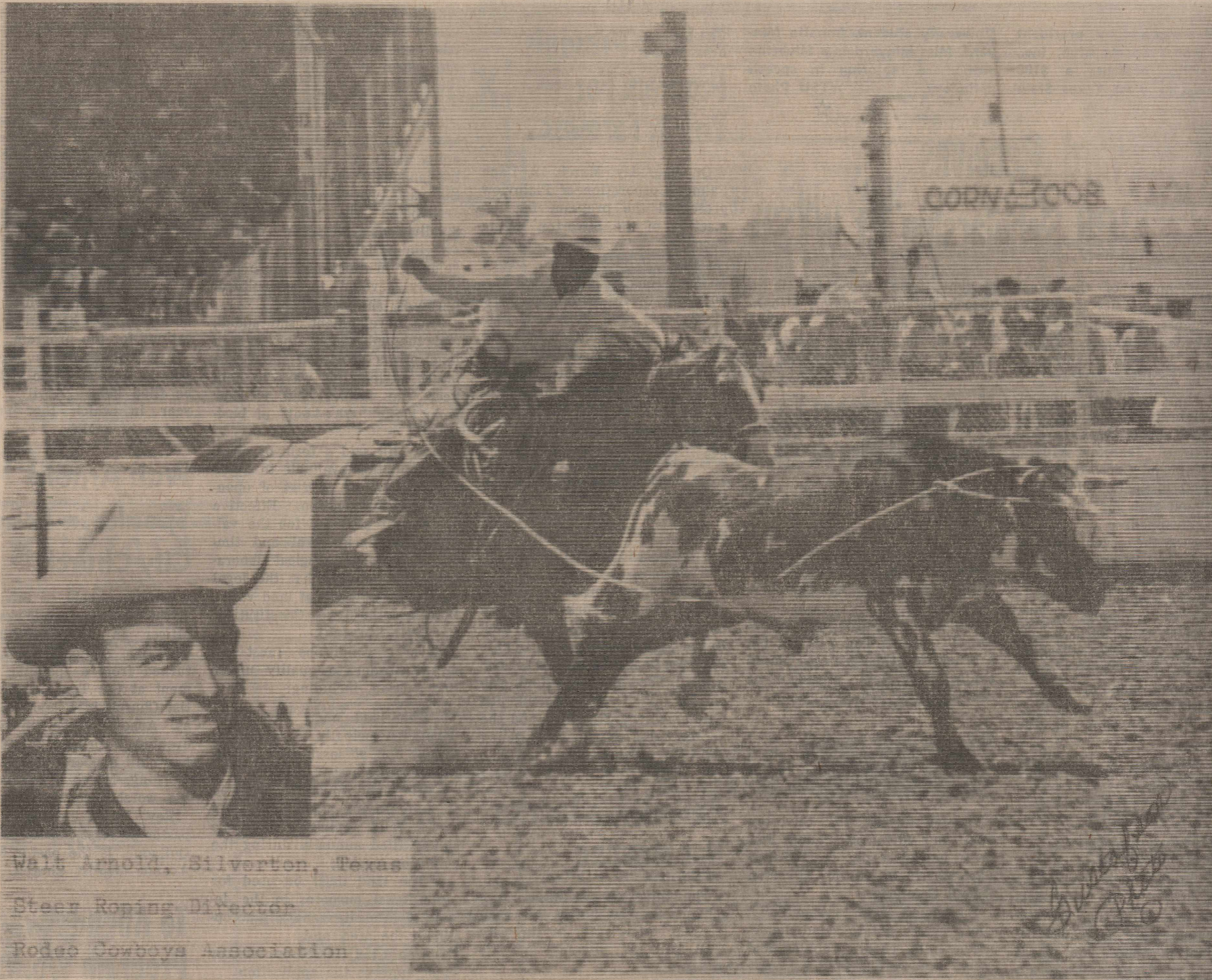

MEASURE YOUR SEW-HOW

With spring here and Easter near you may get the urge to dust off your sewing machine and whip up new outfits for the family.

What happens when you have your garment cut out, machine threaded and ready to roll, and the machine is making a horrible stitch, or skips stitches, or the needle breaks or the seams pucker? Well, I almost resolve to quit and go buy my clothes. But since I really like to sew, I tackle the machine and start sewing on scraps, changing needles, adjusting tension, etc. to make the machine sew correctly.

One of the first steps in sewing machine maintenance is the same for any piece of machinery including your car—keep it oiled and clean. Oil according to the manual that came with your machine using only a sewing machine oil, not all-purpose oil.

Frequently remove lint from the feed dog and the bobbin case with a small brush. The knits, velours, terries, etc. really leave a lot of lint in the machine.

I have an excellent booklet—Solving Common Sewing Machine Problems—that is a part of a four-part "Measure Your Sew-How" series available from my office. The other publications in the series are: Sewing Tools, Thread Tips and Pressing Points. You may enroll in this free

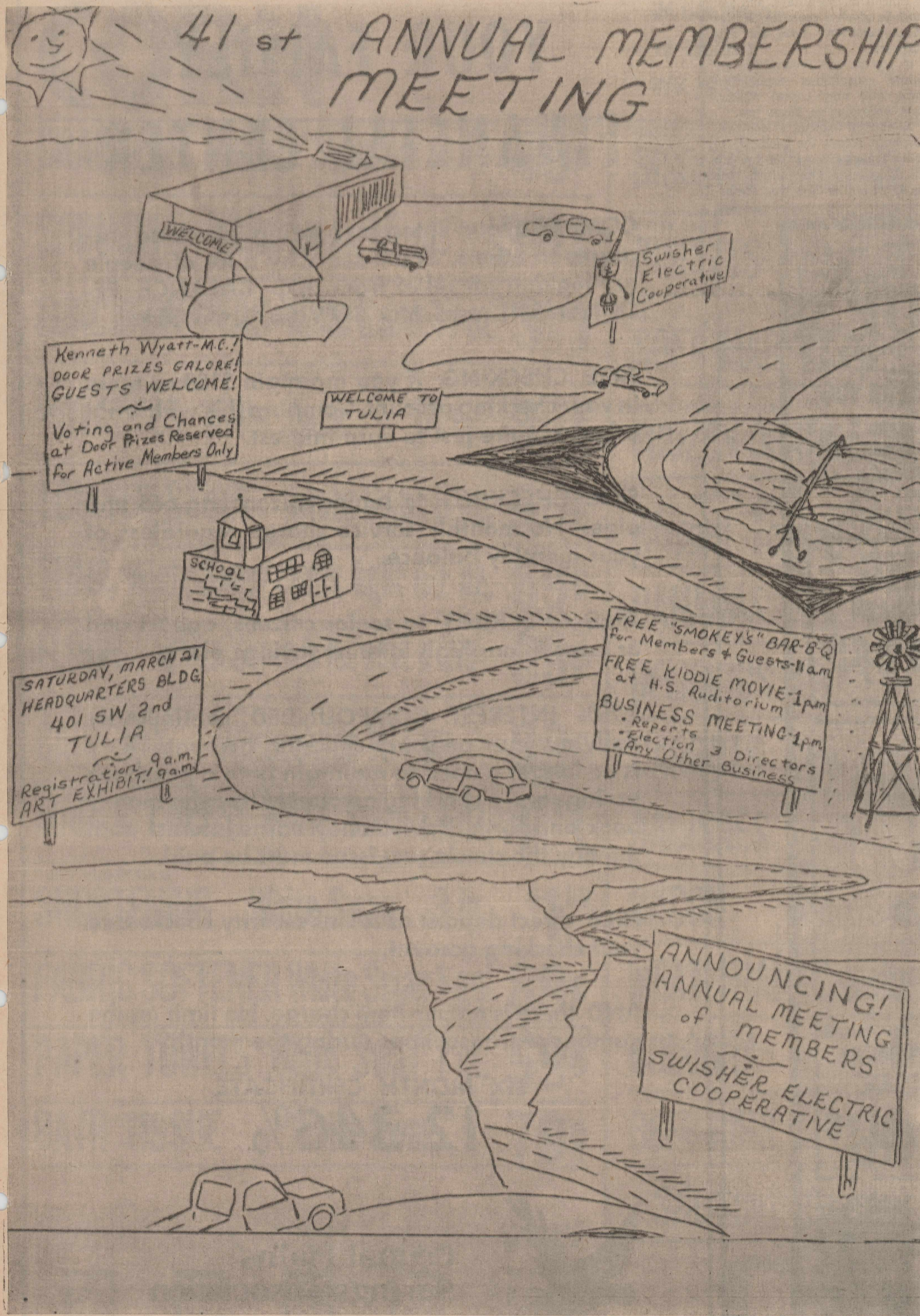

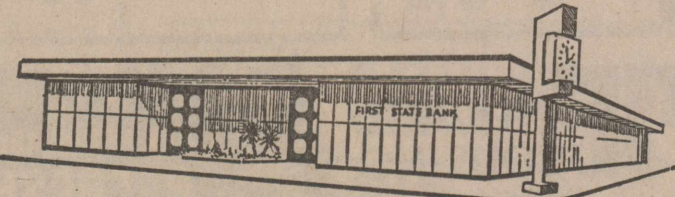

DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES

"Knock, knock. I'm selling..." Have you ever wished you hadn't bought that vacuum cleaner, house siding, or insurance policy they sold you in the comfort of your living room?

We had at least one extremely "determined" insurance salesman in town this week. I know from experience how persuasive he can be.

However, be aware that you do have certain rights when it comes to door-to-door sales—under both a federal regulation and Texas law. Federal Trade Commission regulations and the Texas Home Solicitation Sales Act define the rights of the consumers regarding door-to-door sales.

One right is a three-day "cooling-off" period. You have the right to cancel the sales agreement until midnight of the third business day after signing the contract—in cases involving door-to-door sales, lease or rental of goods or services costing \$25 or more, when both the sales promotion and your agreement to buy are made somewhere other than the seller's place of business.

To cancel, simply mail a written notice of cancellation to the company within the three-day period. Of course, you must have obtained the address during your transaction.

Another section of the law allows you to cancel at any time.

Sales contracts you sign are required to tell you of your right to cancel in three days, and you must be given a separate "Notice of Cancellation" form for this purpose.

If you do not receive the required cancellation notice and form, you may cancel at any time, according to Texas law.

After you cancel a contract, you must return the goods if the seller requests you to. If you are not requested to return the goods within 20 days, you are un-

SOIL INSECT CONTROL IN VEGETABLE GARDENS

As vegetable gardeners in Briscoe County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects. Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled.

For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a five per-

cent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast five percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is not formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of five to six inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.

General Manager Ray Williams said the theming of the ride site is the most extensive decorative treatment ever given a single

cent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast five percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is not formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of five to six inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.

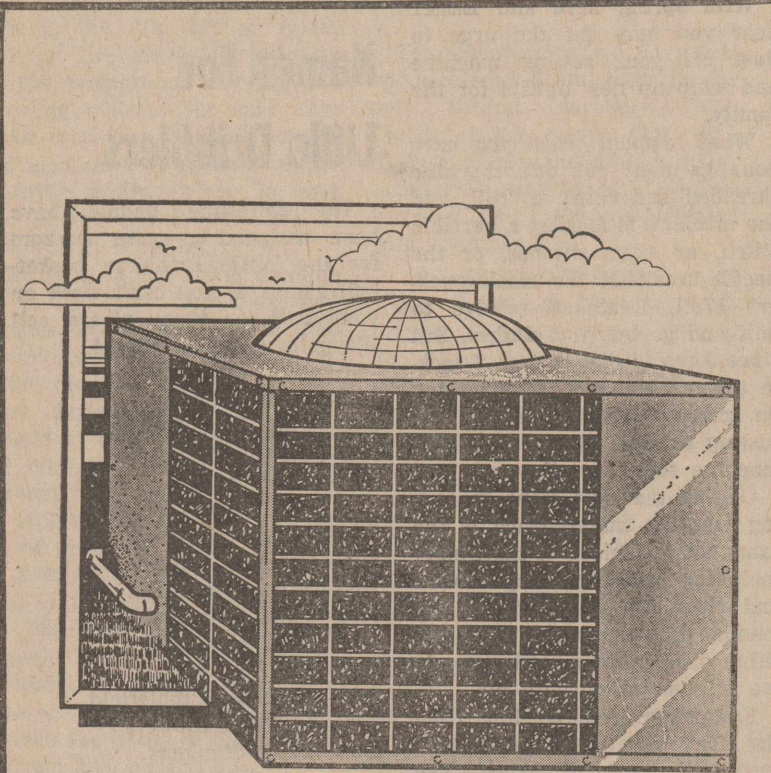

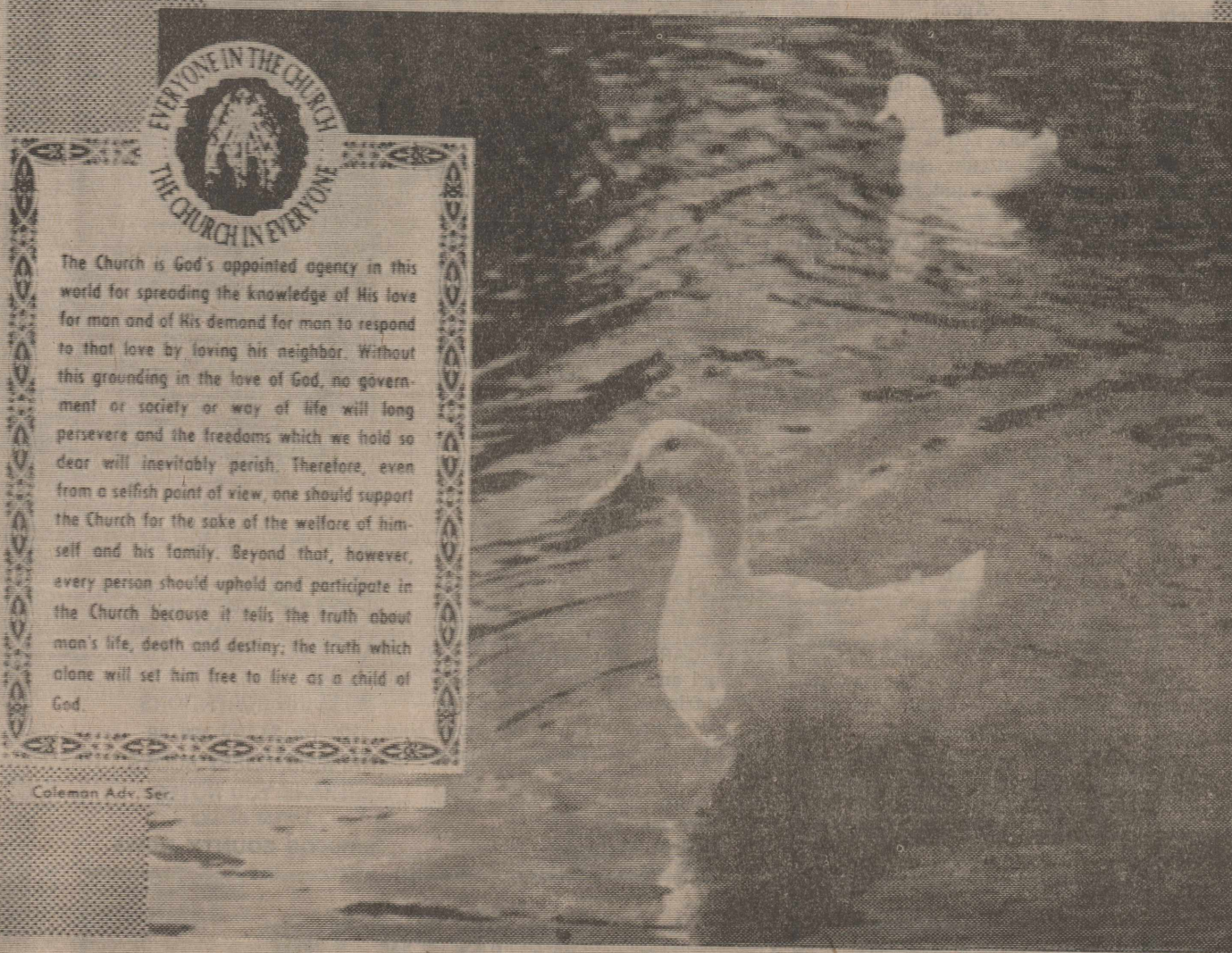
