## Colonel Brown Buried Monday

Funeral services for William Arnold (Colonel) Brown, 60, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Monday, March 23, at the First United Methodist Church in Silverton. Officiating were the Rev. John Decker, pastor, and the Rev. Earl Blair, pastor of Kingwood United Methodist Church in Amarillo.

Masonic graveside rites were conducted in the Silverton Cemetery by Doyle Walls of Floydada and Silverton Lodge No. 754, with arrangements under the direction of the Moore-Rose Silverton Funeral Home.

Mr. Brown passed from this life at 7:30 a.m. Sunday, March 22, enroute to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

He was born July 3, 1920 at Floydada, Texas, and moved with his parents, the late H. Roy and Mary J. Brown, to Silverton when he was two years old. He attended Silverton Schools and served in the armed forces from September 1944 until February 1946. He served in the Rhine bridgehead in the Ruhr Pocket, and crossed the Danube when the 99th Division was headed for the Alps. He was in 32 battles and campaigns during World War II.

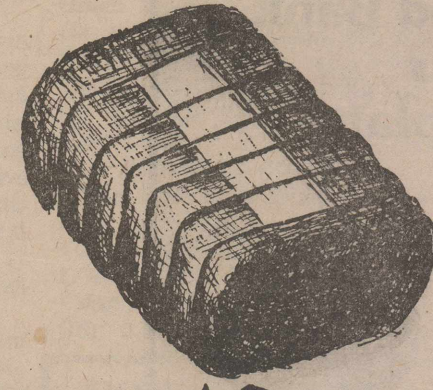
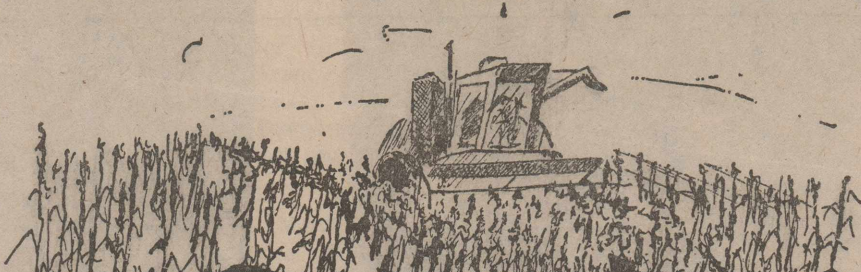
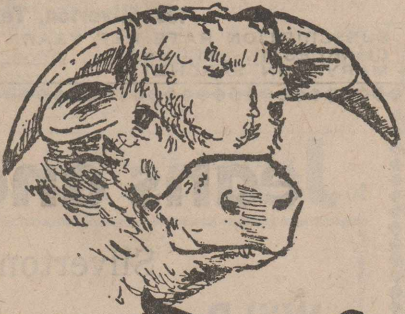

# Weather Modification Hearings End In Plainview

With a burst of emotion during the closing arguments and several verbal jabs, the lengthy hearing by the Texas Water Commission concerning a weather modification permit for Plains Weather Improvement Association finally drew to a close last week.

But the winner of that latest round in the decade-old battle over cloud seeding possibly

won't be known for several more months, according to Hearing Examiner Jon Green with the Water Commission. In drawing the four days of hearings to a close, he told those in the American Legion Hall in Plainview that he may take as long as 120 days to review testimony and draft his recommendations concerning the permit application. "Copies of that determination

will be sent to attorneys of the different parties, as well as interested individuals, who then will have 10 days to file briefs and an additional 20 days to file rebuttals. The three-member Texas Water Commission will then make a final determination during open session in Austin," Green explained.

But the issue could be settled before then. Attorneys for both Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview and the opposing Citizens for Natural Weather were asked by Green to file briefs on whether or not Hale County should be deleted from the project area, apparently a legal question that was not considered during the hearing. While the proposal project in elections last June passed overall in the target area—portions of Hale, Lamb, Castro and Floyd—Hale County voters defeated the issue by a 110-vote margin.

The local hearings, in response to a weather modification permit application filed by PWIA more than a year ago, ran from Wednesday through Friday and re-convened Wednesday of last week during which attorneys with CPNW called seven witnesses.

One witness, Owen Thornton of Lockney, told Green that cloud seeding could cause severe water problems for the four area communities served by the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority—Silverton, Tulia, Lockney and Floydada.

"We need intense rain, a large downpour, to get enough runoff to have a significant inflow at Lake Mackenzie," Thornton, a retired farmer and vice president of the Mackenzie Authority, testified. He noted that the lake, located eight miles northwest of Silverton on Tule Creek, was completed in 1974. "We got our first sizeable runoff in early spring 1977."

Earlier, witnesses for PWIA testified that clouds seeded with silver iodide would generally produce a less intense, longer duration rainfall.

To show the Authority's concern over cloud seeding, Thornton testified that board members at their last meeting passed a resolution opposing cloud seeding. "We need all the rain we can get and as fast as we can get it (for Lake Mackenzie)," Thornton said.

Prior to that, a Wayland Baptist College professor, Dr. Bruce D. Dod, testified that silver iodide used in cloud seeding could be harmful to microorganisms in the soil. However, he noted that it would be difficult to judge how much of the chemical could be injected into the soil through a weather modification program before major damage occurred.

The head of the Department of Physical Sciences at Wayland, Dod based much of his testimony on the types of thunderstorms experienced on the High Plains. Basing his comments on scientific reports, Dod said that he didn't think a cloud seeding project currently could provide rain enhancement and hail suppression at the same time.

Another witness, Oliver Newton of Lubbock, retired agricultural meteorologist with the National Weather Service, said smaller hail, ½ to ¾-inch in diameter, accompanied by wind is more destructive to crops than larger hail, 1½ to 2-inches in diameter.

The other witnesses, all farmers from throughout the region, recounted adverse effects of past programs they have witnessed. Ross Lumsden of Littlefield said his area experienced only one good year during the seven year 1970-77 program originally conducted by PWIA. That good crop year was 1973.

Testifying that he had witnessed clouds being seeded from his gin and home, Lumsden said, "In 12 to 14 minutes after seeding begins, the cloud begins to dissipate." He added, "In our country, annual rainfall before cloud seeding was around 18 inches. I believe I have seen records since then in the range of 13 inches a year."

Nolan Henson of Happy, president of CPNW, testified that a high intensity rain and hail could be helpful for pastureland. "The high intensity rain on grassland will help dissolve cow manure, spread it out, and help its use as fertilizer; it washes away dead grass, and it helps get the moisture deeper in the soil."

Also offering opposing testimony were Walter Graham of southern Randall County who has 8,000 acres of farmland and 15,000 acres of ranchland in Briscoe, Lamb, Hartley, Deaf Smith and Randall counties, and Ralph Nafzger of Plainview.

Two individuals, PWIA President Royce Carthel and Dr. Pierre Saint Amond, were called by PWIA to offer rebuttal testimony. Carthel of Plainview pointed out that the earlier project was geared only toward hail suppression while the new one, if approved, will be for rain enhancement as well Saint Amond said there has been no evidence that he is aware of concerning the harmful effects of silver iodide in the soil.

The state entered three documents into evidence at the close of the hearing: summaries of rainfall received monthly and annually in the High Plains area compiled from yearly National Weather Service reports, including 1970-78, and minutes from the Weather Modification Advisory Committee from March 20 and April 15, 1980.

During the closing phase of the hearing, 12 individuals were allowed to present unsworn comments on the proposed project. Four individuals commented in favor of the proposed weather modification project, while eight spoke against it.

Following the worship service and installation of Reverend Clayton, the ladies of the congregation will serve a potluck noon luncheon. Members and friends are invited for the service and luncheon.
