## **Defensive Driving Course To Be Offered**

Due to several requests, Barbara Pigg has agreed to schedule an eight-hour defensive driving course to be taught by the Department of Public Safety, if there are enough applicants. If you are not aware of the benefits of the course, some are listed below.

1. You may take the Defensive Driving Course at least once every two years to get a traffic violation charge against you dismissed from prosecution and off your driving record; violations include speeding, running stop signs, passing in no-passing zone, etc.

2. You may take the DDC to reduce your auto insurance premiums by 10% for a period of three years.

3. The DDC will help you avoid loss of life, disabling injury and property damage to yourself and others.

If enough individuals are interested, the course will be conducted during two nights, at four hours each. Contact Barbara Pigg within the next week if you are interested in taking the course or have any specific questions about same. Upon completion of the course, you will be awarded a DDC certificate.

Following are some of the most common questions asked about the insurance rate discount.

Question: What coverages come under the 10% discount? Answer: DDC credit is applica-

ble to bodily injury, property damage, medical payment and collision coverages where those coverages are afforded.

Question: When there is more than one driver of an insured automobile, will both drivers be required to complete DDC to qualify for the discount?

Answer: No. Only the PRINCI-PAL driver is required to complete DDC. However, if there are two vehicles, both principal drivers must take the course. (This sometimes depends on your insurance company and what it requires.)

Question: When a person is already getting a 10% discount for Drivers Training, can he or she take DDC and receive an additional 10% discount?

Answer: No. Only one Drivers Training course credit is allowed for the three-year period.

Question: Are there any restrictions on eligibility?

Answer: No. There are no minimum or maximum age limits.

Question: When does the cre- ready in effect as of that date dit apply to the insured's policies?




