Every swimmer must wear a bathing suit; no cut-offs will be permitted.

PRESSURE CANNER TESTING

Don't wait until the green beans are ready to can to dig out your pressure canner from the cellar or pantry and decide if it correctly, your food may be either in working order.

The dial gauge on a pressure canner should be checked once a year or more often if the canner is used frequently or if the lid is dropped or receives a hard knock.

If the gauge does not register

er underprocessed, or overprocessed. If your canner has a weighted gauge, it only needs a thorough cleaning.

Since I do not have the equipment to test pressure canners or to repair or replace faulty valves, petcocks, and plugs, I will schedule a Pressure Canner Clinic in June with resource people from Lubbock doing the testing if there are at least ten in the county who want this testing done.

The cost is \$3.50 per cooker. If ten do not call in to request the canner testing, a clinic WILL NOT be scheduled.

If you have used your cooker for years and never had it tested, call my office —823-2343— and

put your name on the list. The charge is a small price to pay for your family's food safety and to preserve the quality of the food you worked so hard to grow.
