

Rain Continues To Dominate Local Weather

Rain, which has been accompanied in neighboring areas by hail, high wind and tornado sightings, continues to be in the forecast for the Panhandle of Texas.

A little small hail fell on Silverton Tuesday night, accompanying .55 of an inch of rain. This brought the total rainfall for 1981 to date to 4.86 inches, quite a bit short of our normal rainfall.

Silverton has been short-changed a bit on rainfall this spring, with Quitaque having received over eight inches. Rain has been locally heavier in areas north-east and southeast of town.

Flash flood warnings have been issued this week, and some of the creeks, especially south of Quitaque, have been at flood-tide, but no important rise has occurred at Lake Mackenzie even though there have been heavier rains in the Tulla-Happy area.

Lake Mackenzie received .60 of an inch Tuesday night, with just a few small hailstones.

Club Members Enjoy Tour of County

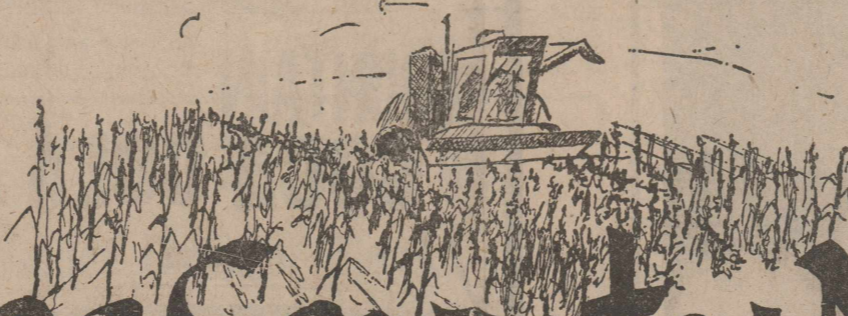

Biologist Conducts Study Of Fish At Lake Mackenzie

Game Biologist Joe Kraai of Canyon conducted a study of the fish in selected areas of Lake Mackenzie on Wednesday, May 27. The test started at approximately 2:30 p.m. and was concluded at 7:00 p.m. on Tule Creek, Williams Creek and in the main part of the lake.

Fish at a depth of three to four feet were shocked into temporary unconsciousness and netted for study.

A total of 21 largemouth bass were brought to the surface. The largest of these weighed three pounds, seven ounces, and the smallest weighed one ounce. The study showed the largemouth bass have spawned and are doing well.

Eleven walleye were studied. The largest weighed four pounds, twelve ounces, and the smallest weighed two pounds. Most of the walleye were in the three to four pound range. There is no indication that walleye have ever spawned in the lake. One theory

for this is that there may not be enough gravel area in the lake, and not enough wind stirring the gravelly shoreline. Further study and possible re-stocking of the walleye will be conducted.

Two smallmouth bass were studied. The largest weighed two pounds, eleven ounces. Several in the fry stage were netted. It was thought that most of the smallmouth were in deeper water. There is good indication they have spawned and are doing well.

Two crappie were brought to the surface, the larger one about one pound in weight and the smaller one about four ounces.

There was an adequate amount of baitfish present in the lake.

Mr. Kraai will be back for further study of the crappie and the general fish situation in the lake. It is his opinion that a six to ten foot rise in the lake would be good for the fish population.

The Silverton and Quitaque Volunteer Ambulance Services completed a 27-hour EMT renewal course May 20, 1981. Paramedic Anthony Kingery was the instructor with assistance from Paramedic Lynn Frizzell.

Renewal of certification is required every two years. The remainder of the Silverton and Quitaque EMTs will be renewing their certification next spring.

Grass Die-Off Information Needed

A die-off of area range grasses has become a problem in isolated areas of the Texas Panhandle. The die-off, thought to be caused by a fungus, was noticed recently on one large ranch in Gray County. John Crowell, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton, feels that there are a few cases here in Briscoe County. The die-offs that have been studied are pretty much restricted to the flatter, clay loam soils above the caprock, but may occur below

low the cap as well. The fungus that has been linked to the die-off causes a "root rot" type situation. This type of fungus seems to do better in droughty conditions when the grass is weakest. It seems to occur in years of drought, such as last year. The clay loam soils, where it occurs most often, are heavy clay soils with grasses such as buffalo grass and blue grama. Most of the die-offs were found on pastures that were grazed continuously and grazed fairly short.

More research is needed on this problem. Crowell encourages area ranchers to contact the Soil Conservation Service if they think they have a die-off. One place has already been located where a die-off has occurred here in Briscoe County. The SCS is hoping to find a solution to the problem before it becomes widespread.

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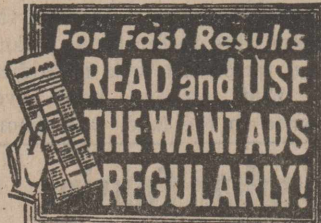
