A few motorists may be confused over the use of glass coatings and one-way glass in motor vehicles. However, the Texas Department of Public Safety reports that drivers should be aware of the law and exercise caution prior to altering the window glass of a motor vehicle.

"No coatings, plastic, liquid or other materials may be put on the windshield or front side windows of any motor vehicle that has not been approved by the DPS," said Mason. However, the DPS spokesman says glass coating materials may be applied to the rear window and the rear side windows if the vehicle has outside rearview mir-

Mason says no motor vehicle glass coatings are currently approved by the DPS for application on windshield or front side windows. "Under state law, the DPS has the authority to approve, but due to the variations of the materials and the numerous methods in which they are applied, we simply cannot approve any of the coatings," he said. "Frequently we find these coatings to be dangerous since they often obstruct the driver's vision," he said.

Capain Mason said the glass coating materials are sometimes spray-on tint, metalized mylar plastic or other kinds of applicable materials. "The use of curtains, blinds or stick-on novelty designs are not prohibited on rear windows, but common sense should be considered when applying these devices to a vehicle," he said. "The driver must be able to maintain good external vision during the operation of any motor vehicle," said Captain Mason.

He said the one-way glass coatings in vehicles is not generally a good idea, even when permitted, since the application of the materials greatly reduces and distorts vision, especially at night, he concluded.

Night-flying moths, mainly cutworm moths, often become a nuisance to homeowners in the

CREATE NUISANCE

The moths are attracted to light and are sometimes referred to as "candlemoths."

Night-flying moths are difficult to control. The following steps alone or in combination with others, may provide some relief under favorable condi-

-Reduce the attraction of the site.

-Intercept moths before they COUPLE TO MARRY reach the site.

-Exclude moths from the —Destroy moths which get

into the house. Reduce the attraction of moths to a house or buildings through proper light management. This often provides substantial relief. Use indirect lighting where practical so the light source is shielded from areas from which moths may come. Locate inside light fixtures so that moths outside cannot see the lamp itself.

There is little evidence that any light repels insects, but a yellow light is least attractive to most insects.

During periods of heavy moth flights, keep outside lighting at a

Insect light traps can intercept moths before they become a nuisance. Place such traps at least 100 feet away from a house or building.

To exclude moths from houses or buildings, properly screen windows and doors as well as air vents and ventillating ducts.

Household insecticides can control moths to some degree. Spray where moths collect and rest outside, such as door frames, window sills, carports, porches and garages. Since moths do not feed on anything where they are resting and are protected by a heavy coating of scales, sprays will not provide any immediate or spectacular results.

Apply ready-to-use household spray formulations of diazinon and baygon to resting sites and cracks and crevices where moths may enter buildings. Be sure to follow label instructions for "nuisance pest" control. Add a stead of covering blemishes and commercial wetting agent or a teaspoon of liquid detergent per blow faults out of proportion. gallon of mixed spray to increase effectiveness.

Once moths get inside the house or building, a vacuum cleaner often gives the best control. A household pyrethrin aerosol spray will also control moths inside a room. Again, be sure thy brother's eye, but considerto check the label on the container when using any insecti-
