Decontrol To Provide More State Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said President Reagan's early decontrol of crude oil prices could mean up to \$150 million more in state tax revenue this year.

Bullock said Reagan's decision to speed up the decontrol of crude oil prices instead of waiting until October 1, to allow existing law to take off controls, will immediately hike up the price of domestic oil.

The state collects a 4.6 percent tax on the market value of oil produced in the state and Bullock said the crude oil production tax will produce about \$3.1 billion in revenue during the state's 1982-83 budget period.

Federal decontrols of propane and gasoline will not earn the state extra income, Bullock said.

The easing of controls on these petroleum products is likely to be met with consumer resistance because prices can be expected

to go up. If Texans use fewer gallons of gasoline or propane, the state will collect less in taxes on these products, he said.

He said the decontrol impact on propane and gasoline would probably be minimal.

Fitting problems are a complaint of those who sew as well as those who buy ready-to-wear. However, if you make your clothes, you have greater control over fit than when you buy clothes.

You may feel better to learn that patterns fit only about 20% of the people, with 80% needing to make some alterations.

I recently attended a two day pattern alteration workshop in Amarillo with other Extension Agents from this area. We did 14 different pattern alterations on full-scale patterns. I have these completed pattern pieces on file in my office, and you may look at them or check them out to use in altering a pattern at home.

The Extension clothing specialists have completed a series of pattern alteration publication leaflets as well as a personal measurement chart to use in determining needed adjustments. Each leaflet is for a different alteration from protruding hip bone to sway back.

As the dormant season for many plants approaches, home gardeners should receive proper pruning techniques before manning pruning shears and saws.

Improper pruning can result in poor growth, unnatural plant forms, poor flower and fruit production, and occasionally even death of the plant.

Following basic guidelines for pruning can transform a tree or

son of the year and the need for pruning before taking that first job right. snip. Many times there is no reason at all for pruning if the tree is hale and hearty.

The winter season when plants are dormant may not necessarily be the best time to prune every plant on your landscape. Deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers, and evergreens probably can be pruned at this time of year. However, exceptions include spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias, which should be pruned after they flower. Do not prune roses until mid-February.

Using proper tools is important for safety and adequate cutting. Use hand shears for small twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are best for branches onehalf to one inch in size. Larger branches require a pruning saw. A long-handled pole pruner or saw is necessary for cutting high-

It is recommended that cuts be made flush with the trunk

As years pass stubs decay and

Seal cuts more than two inches in diameter with a pruning paint sealer. The sealer will dry hard and protect the wound from insect and disease invasion and moisture loss.

As important as seasonal pruning is, it's even more important to prune when needed. Prune prune after transplanting, particularly with balled and bare rooted plants. Pruning will compensate for roots the plant lost in the digging.

Starting in April of this year, there is no longer any limit on may enroll for supplementary medical insurance (part B).

Previously, a person could refuse part B and then re-enroll only two times. After that, they would remain permanently ineligible for the portion of Medicare outpatient costs.

This provision also applies to premium Health Insurance or to those people who are paying for their hospital insurance on a monthly basis. For all those who have part A of Medicare as to social security, this change

will have no effect. Also, beginning in April 1981, you need not wait for the general enrollment period to apply for Medicare. Under the old regulations, a person could apply for Medicare only during their initial enrollment period (that is, three months before one's 65th birthday, the month of the birthday, and the three months after) or during the first three months of each year (the general enroll-

You may now apply for Medicare at any time after your 65th birthday. Coverage will start three months after you file.

Furthermore, in the case of a deceased Medicare beneficiary, the bills need no longer be paid before Medicare will process the

Previously, unless the doctor involved agreed to accept the reasonable charge paid by Medicare as payment in full, the bill had to be paid before Medicare would pay any part of it. Now payment may be made to a pertion to pay for the services and files a request for payment.


