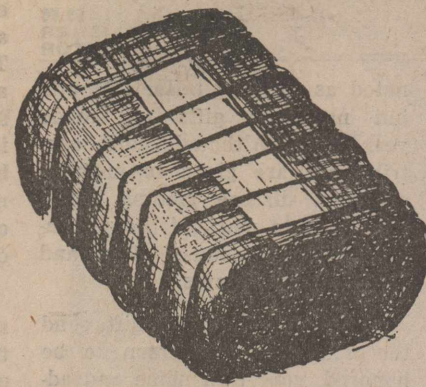
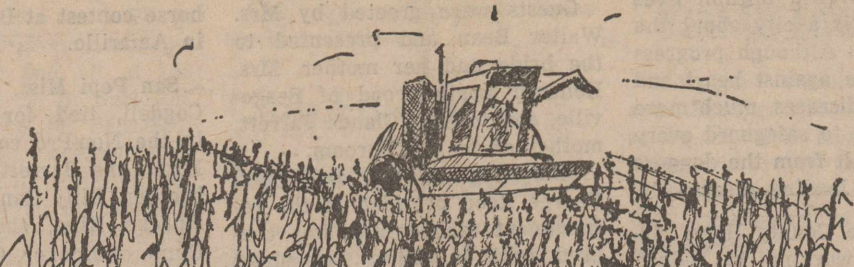

Refrigerators are used because most households have them and because they usually remain secure if a fire breaks out.

Citizens For Natural Weather To Meet In Tullia February 18

Swisher County Citizens for Natural Weather will conduct a meeting Wednesday, February 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the district courtroom of the Swisher County courthouse with Bob Stevens as guest speaker. They have extended a special invitation to Briscoe County CFNW and all persons who are opposed to cloud seeding are urged to attend.

The Texas Department of Water Resources will conduct a hearing which is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. March 11 at the American Legion Post 260, 111 Ash in Plainview. A hail reduction-rain enhancement project for a large portion of the area will be proposed. A hearing officer has not been selected for the session as yet.

The hearing will determine if those precincts voting for cloud seeding will constitute an area large enough to make a feasible program for cloud seeding.

Recently the water commission approved a weather modification license for the Plainview-based Plains Weather Improvement Association, the group that wants once again to conduct hail suppression activities over the High Plains.

PWIA's license does not authorize any specific project; a permit will be required for any actual cloud seeding work, and that permit will be the subject of the March public hearing.

"It will be up to us to prove that our activities do not affect the project area, as well as the areas adjacent to it, to anyone's detriment," explained Royce Carthel, PWIA president. "And the other side, our opponents, will be trying to prove just the opposite. I suppose we both will have our expert witnesses and Ph.D.'s to testify."

On June 11, 1980, voters in the four-county project area, Hale, Floyd, Castro and Lamb, approved the hotly debated weather modification program by a vote of 2,260 - 1,873, a 387 vote margin. However, the proposition was defeated in Hale County by 110 votes, 1,264 - 1,154.

While PWIA last spring originally proposed to conduct its hail reduction - rain enhancement activities over portions of the four counties, the water commission could modify that project area, if they approve the permit application, to represent the program's strongest support as indicated by the June election returns.

In that election, the program carried largely rural precincts in Hale County while generally losing in Plainview. It carried only one of five precincts in Floyd County, the Sandhill area. However, only one Lamb County precinct voted against it and Castro County voters in the five precincts within the project area voted strongly for the program. Only persons within the proposed project area were allowed to vote.

Annual Young Farmers Convention Held In Waco January 23-24

Texas Young Farmers 27th Annual Convention was held in the Waco Convention Center in Waco January 23-24.

The opening session began at 9:30 a.m. with the presentation of colors and the pledge to the flag. Guest speaker for the morning session was Coach Grant Teaff. His topic was "Being Successful in Human Life." Winning is important, but one can be a winner or loser by the ability to use what he has (what God gave him free) not by just winning or losing.

The traits in this successfulness are (1) Loyalty which is the foundation on which we build our family, community, school, nation—loyalty to all. It will enhance us.

(2) Attitude is yours to control and one of the most important qualities of your life. Basically, input equals output. The human mind is a most powerful source of strength God gave us and all for free! The sad fact is no one usually uses more than 15% of this strength. One should have a positive attitude and put only good, positive things in and good will come back out. But, alas! human nature is to be negative—so get that positive attitude from sharing, caring, the Holy Scripture, talking, music.

To set a positive attitude every day, (a) pray to God, (b) positive input such as "I'm only one, but I can do what I can." We're important because God loves us—He didn't make any junk!

One must remember you can't always score but you can contribute what you have. Find out what you're capable of doing, and do it. You can do it, ought to do it, and by God's grace, do it!

(3) Goal setting is the final trait. To reach high goals, one must do nitty, gritty everyday goals, and work toward the high goals. What one does with defeat is most important. At this point, Coach Teaff related a moving true story of a young man on his football team several years ago who was a very promising athlete, but during a routine practice session was injured—paralyzing him from the neck down.

But this young man was a goal setter with a positive attitude and loyalty. He encouraged everyone (team, coaches, parents) instead of the other way around. It was a long, hard road but several months went by and slowly through therapy and determination he achieved one small goal after another. That season the team played for him; and he and the team went on to be Southwest Conference Champs and played in the Cotton Bowl, a

game the young man attended to cheer his team on.

If you've not lost, you will! It is so easy to win, but it's tough to lose. So remember you may give out but you don't have to give up!

Coach Teaff spent his early years on the farm, so he's well versed on farmers and applauded the Young Farmers of Texas. The Young Farmers are extremely important to this nation, he said, and urged them not to give up.

A noon luncheon was held to honor the exhibitors.

The second session began at 1:30 p.m. with Lewis Timberlake as guest speaker. Mr. Timberlake began his program with the statement: "Whether you think you can or you can't—you are right!" Fear is holding a mental picture of what you don't want to happen while faith is acting like it is when it isn't. One can change the way he looks at himself and change the way he behaves.

Four reasons for failure are (1) looking for failure, (2) it's someone else's fault, (3) surrendering to fear instead of faith (the greatest problem) and (4) no goal lines.

Success can be achieved by understanding why people fail and by doing what unsuccessful ones won't do!

Mr. Timberlake concluded his speech with, "God loves you and so do I. Remember, everyone has a right to be!"



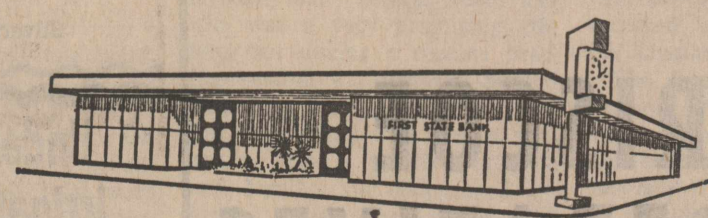
