Gov. Pat M. Neff gave his famous address on "Law Enforcement." He handled the subject of bootlegging without gloves. He gave this same address in Chautauqua last year.

Another great speaker at the convention as Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt. She was the organizer of the National Woman's League of Voters, and was the first president of this organization. She was very pessimistic about another war. She said that in spite of the fact that the nations of Europe are almost starving they are constantly working on war machinery. She also said that if we have nother war it will be a short war because they will use poisonous gases which will wipe out whole towns, and bombs filled with disease germs. She says the people look to the legislature, the legislature leaves it to the president, and he in turn leaves it to the people, and nothing is done about the abolishment of war.

Hon, Morris Shenherd

Hon. Morris Shepherd, another distinguished speaker was introduced as the man who has always stood for everything that women stand for. He says. "It is the supreme duty of the women of America to see to it that there is a world association of Nations. Under the leadership of the apostle of humanity, Woodrow Wilson, the League of Nations was formed, the first time in the annals of history that there has been a league of all civilized nations, and it has more than justified its creation." "It can be said of President Wilson that he let neither laudation nor censure deflect him from duty in the end laying down on the altar a broken body and a broken heart. He said before the Senate there was no objection to any article except Article 10. but that should go in." In conclusion Senator Shepherd told the story of the peace pact between Argentina and Chile. They had been at war for years and finally decided to have peace and erected a statue of Christ between the two countries, in the Andes Mountains. This famous "Christ of the Andes" has kept them reminded of their solemn pact and they have never fought since its erection.

Dr. Rhineheart's Address on International Peace.

Dr. Aurelia Rinehardt, who spoke Saturday morning, is one of the outstanding women of America. She is national president, American Association of University Women, and comes here from a meeting in Washington of the board of directors of the association.

Dr. Rinehardt has been speaking on educational problems and international relations in Boston. New York, Washington, Chicago, St. Louis and other places. She has been recognized as the foremost woman educator of the United States, and was one of five women asked to an international conference overseas. She is a speaker of unusual ability and is of striking personality.

Dr. Rhinehart is one of the best women speakers of the U. S. President of Mills college in California, and the mother of two young sons.
