STATE FEDERATION OF CLUBS MEETS IN WICHITA FALLS

The 26th annual meeting of the Federation of Women's Clubs, which met in Wichita Falls November 13th to 17th inclusive was in every way the greatest in its history. Mrs. Lee Jo-

seph, who has been the president for the past two years has proved herself a very able leader. Some of the things she has accomplished are: She has made it her aim to assist in a more efficient system of education in Texas. The four greatest educational needs of Texas today are (1) Adequate support; (2) Proper control; (3) Reorganization of the common school system; (4) An expert survey. The president sent a letter which included the federation program to every member of both houses of the Legislature. Mrs. Joseph and many patriotic women and the joint legislative council are responsible for a expert state survey of education and carrying an appropriation of \$50,000,000 dollars.

A \$400 scholarship in the State University. She has given much time to the Illiteracy Bill and the Towner Sterling Bill. She helped devise a plan to put 5,000 copies of the Federation News into the hands of the women, and the publication of the "Who's Who" of the womanhood of Texas, which will be out soon. She has traveled 20,189 miles in the interest of clubs. And many other brilliant achievements.

Keynote of Meeting International Relations.

Gov. Pat M. Neff gave his famous address on "Law Enforcement." He handled the subject of bootlegging without gloves. He gave this same address in Chautauqua last year.

Another great speaker at the convention was Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt. She was the organizer of the National Woman's League of Voters, and was the first president of this organization. She was very pessimistic about another war. She said that in spite of the fact that the nations of Europe are almost starving they are constantly working on war machinery. She also said that if we have another war it will be a short war because they will use poisonous gases which will wipe out whole towns, and bombs filled with disease germs. She says the people look to the legislature, the legislature leaves it to the president, and he in turn leaves it to the people, and nothing is done about the abolishment of war.

Hon. Morris Shepherd Speaks.

Hon. Morris Shepherd, another distinguished speaker was introduced as the man who has always stood for everything that women stand for. He says, "It is the supreme duty of the women of America to see to it that there is a world association of Nations. Under the leadership of the apostle of humanity, Woodrow Wilson, the League of Nations was formed, the first time in the annals of history that there has been a league of all civilized nations, and it has more than justified its creation." "It can be said of President Wilson that he let neither laudation nor censure deflect him from duty in the end laying down on the altar a broken body and a broken heart. He said before the Senate there was no objection to any article except Article 10, but that should go in." In conclusion Senator Shepherd told the story of the peace pact between Argentina and Chile. They had been at war for years and finally decided to have peace and erected a statue of Christ between the two countries, in the Andes Mountains. This famous "Christ of the Andes" has kept them reminded of their solemn pact and they have never fought since its erection.

Dr. Rhinehart's Address on International Peace.

Dr. Aurelia Rhinehart, who spoke Saturday morning, is one of the outstanding women of America. She is national president, American Association of University Women, and comes here from a meeting in Washington of the board of directors of the association.

Dr. Rhinehart has been speaking on educational problems and international relations in Boston, New York, Washington, Chicago, St. Louis and other places. She has been recognized as the foremost woman educator of the United States, and was one of five women asked to an international conference overseas. She is a speaker of unusual ability and is of striking personality.

Dr. Rhinehart is one of the best women speakers of the U. S. President of Mills college in California, and the mother of two young sons. She says, "We have shown the world what we can do by courage, now let us show the world what we can do by intelligence." Dr. Rhinehart gave three ideas for forming a National basis—Tools with which to work, declaring that God expects cooperation and activity of human beings in bringing about his ends rather than supplications.

As the first of these ideas she says "That the American idea of independent Government makes for World Peace." Always we have found our

leaders working for this end, which is for liberty, democracy and the right to work under organized order. The League in its essence is an American idea, a federation for good to the greatest number, she pointed out, scoring us for our blindness and stupidity in failing to recognize it as our own idea.

The League Means Order—Peace

The importance of our country, geographically, economically, and industrially was pointed out. We have the power now, what are we going to do with it? Not only to help the world but to help ourselves must we change our course. Women must help God carry out his purpose through training, education and understanding.

Women must be consecrated to this task every day, the purpose of helping the World prepare for peace, both community, national and international, for we get what we prepare for. And the Lord said unto Job: "Job what hast thou done?" and Job answered, "Oh Lord if I have taken my morsel alone, let my bones be broken."

MRS. HENRY REDMOND IS ELECTED PRESIDENT T. F. W. C.

Mrs. Henry Redmond of Corpus Christi was elected president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for the coming two-year term at the closing session of the convention in Wichita Falls last week.

Other officers, all of whom were elected by acclamation, include Mrs. A. R. Averill of El Paso, first vice president; Mrs. Carl Goodman of Plainview,

secretary; Mrs. Walter Robertson, of Wichita Falls, treasurer, and Mrs. Mary L. Wright of Fort Worth, auditor.

Brief memorial services were held prior to the election for those members of the federation who died during the last year.

Next year's convention city will be selected at a meeting of the executive board to be held next summer. Beaumont and Galveston have extended an invitation to be hosts next year.

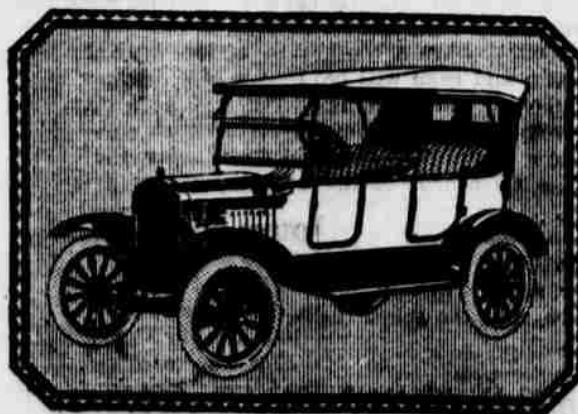

**MRS. J. U. FIELDS ADDRESSES
STATE FEDERATION MEETING**

Below we give a part of the address delivered by Mrs. J. U. Fields of Haskell before the Twenty-Sixth annual Convention of Club Women of Texas, held in Wichita Falls last week:

"Do we consider what we can give or what we can get?"

"Are we as individuals measuring up to our opportunities?"

"Do we realize our responsibilities?"

These were some of the pertinent questions asked and discussed by Mrs. J. U. Fields of Haskell, in an address to a joint meeting of the American citizenship and Legislative Conferences, of the State Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Fields dwelt on the importance of friendship pointing out that it cannot thrive where envy, jealousy and gossip obtain, and urging the cultivation of real friendships both as individuals and clubs.

In urging the importance of careful selection of reading she referred to the

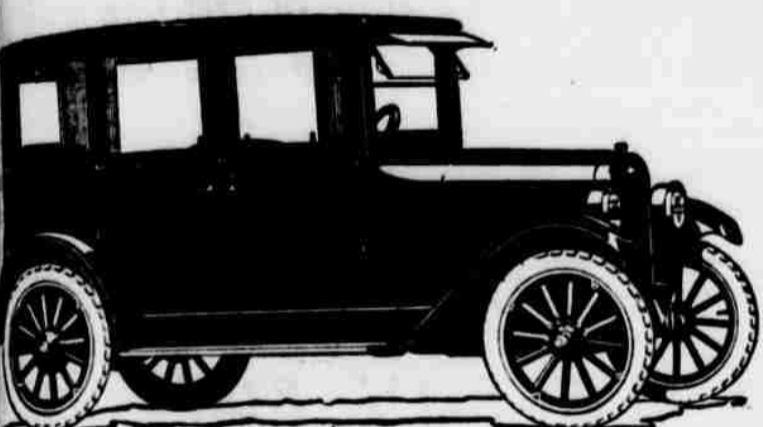
