Award - Winning **Film To Be Shown**

"No Longer Alone," winner of three prestigious film-industry awards, will be shown on Sunday, October 25, at the First United Methodist Church in Silverton. The showing, open to the public free of charge, is scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. The film, a true story, takes a close look at a woman who was searching desperately for love and acceptance, but whose cries went unheard by those who surrounded her.

Originally released by World Wide Pictures in commercial theatres, the film is now one hour in length in preparation for its eventual presentation as a television special.

"No Longer Alone" traces the life of an English actress, Joan Winmill Brown. Though she skyrocketed to fame on the British stage, her life was marked by a frantic grasp for personal fulfillment and love. Tormented by a past she was unable to forget, she succumbed to a series of nervous breakdowns; and, at one point, attempted to take her own life.

In her ultimate moment of despair, Joan was invited by a "chance" phone call to attend a Billy Graham crusade. It was here that she first discovered her worth as an individual and began her long struggle to piece her shattered life back together. Those who have followed Billy Graham's ministry will be interested to know that Dr. Graham appears in the film in some of the footage of his 1954 London Crusade, and also in the introduction and conclusion to the film, photographed recently for this special version.

According to William F. Brown, President of World Wide Pictures, "No Longer Alone" was presented with the Award of Excellence from the Film Advisory Board of Hollywood, as well as the Angel Award from Religion in Media in America, as the outstanding religion film of the year. It also received the Silver Halo Award from the Southern California Motion Picture Council.

"No Longer Alone" was filmed in color on location in London, and stars Belinda Carroll, Wilfrid Hyde White, James Fox, Samantha Gates, and Gordon De-Vol. Simon Williams, who has one of the leading roles in the

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Keep Your Child

From Choking

Halloween brings ghosts, goblins and, sometimes, real danger. The American Lung Association of Texas warns about one danger for children—the risk of choking on holiday treats such as candy corn, hard candy, and peanuts.

At Halloween, children go door-to-door "begging." Parents should insist youngsters bring the goodies home for inspection. For the youngest—two, three or even four years old—some of the candy can be divided or mashed before eating.

The chewing and swallowing muscles of young children may not be sufficiently developed to cope with certain treats. Choking can result. Halloween goodies also may "go down the wrong way," and lodge in the lung instead of the stomach. This is called aspiration. A "foreign object" of any kind in the lung can cause life-long problems. At times, surgery for removal is required.

The best warning is: be sure children are old enough to chew and swallow correctly before trusting them with small, hard bits of food. Parents should always be on guard against "small objects" getting into the hands of children, particularly those young enough to want to put everything into their mouths. Choking, blocked air passages, even aspiration of the lung can result.

Moreover, such items as eyes and buttons that might come loose from dolls, or wheels from toy cars are dangerous. Set a good example. Don't put anything but food into your own mouth. Keep the coffee table clear of small objects a child might reach for . . . and ask your Lung Association for the leaflet: "Keep Your Child From Choking."

In Amarillo

C. L. (Jack) Sutton, Don Burson, Jimmy Myers, Jarus Flowers and Murry Wayne Morrison, directors from the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District, will be in Amarillo October 26-28, 1981 to attend the Forty-First Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Directors.

Earnest Kiker Briscoe County Extension Agent BE READY FOR FIRE

Fire can be friend or foe, depending on the situation. Unfortunately, unfriendly situations arise all too often, costing lives and devastating property.

Prevention is your best defense against fire losses, but you must be prepared if fire starts. These precautions are suggest-

ed:

*Test smoke detectors regularly. Change batteries within the recommended interval or when you see or hear a "low battery" signal from the detector. If you have yet to equip your home with these proven lifesavers, do so soon

*Post phone numbers of the fire department, emergency medical service and others who could help during an emergency. Teach youngsters how to call for help in case of fire or other emergency.

*Prepare, then practice a home fire escape plan.

*If you have no nearby water source such as a river, lake or farm pond, install water holding tanks for fire fighting.

*Equip your house, outbuildings and motorized equipment with fire extinguishers of the proper type and rating.

Type A fires (paper, wood, straw) are best fought with a pressurized water extinguisher. Type B fires (petroleum products, solvents, kitchen grease). require the smothering effect of a dry chemical or carbon dioxide extinguisher.

Type C fires (electrical) also require use of dry chemical or carbon dioxide extinguishers.

A dry chemical extinguisher charged with tri-class chemicals can be used on Type A fires but not as effectively as water.

Bingo Not Legal In Texas Until 1982

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office has warned that it will be early 1982 before Texans can conduct and play legal bingo and cautioned against fraudulent claims that legal bingo has already arrived in Texas.

George Garland, director of the Bingo Regulation Division, said the new bingo law also requires a local option election before games can be held.

He said because of the language in the law at the earliest date a local option election can be scheduled would be January

16, 1982.

Garland said local option elections to play bingo can be called on a city-wide, county or justice of the peace precinct basis.

Garland said the Comptroller's office would be ready to issue bingo licenses to authorized organizations as soon as local option elections are certified.

He said the agency would also be adopting rules and regulations in time for Texans to conduct legal bingo games.


