1. Allow plant material affect 1. Allow plant material affect-
ed by frost to dry thoroughly
before grazing This before grazing. This may require
a week or more of good sunlight a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animast hay or a sup-
plement before turning them in on plants that may contain prus-
sic acid. Animals that sic acid. Animals that are not
hungry will not be affected as hungry will not be affected as
seriously by toxic material since
their intake will be limited. 3. Remove all animals from
the pasture if one in the hert the pasture if one in the her
shows any signs of poisoning. shows any signs of poisoning.
3. Call a veterinarian immed-
iately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antiopote to treat
affected animals is highly effi affected animals is highly effi-
