Mr. Vines died Friday.

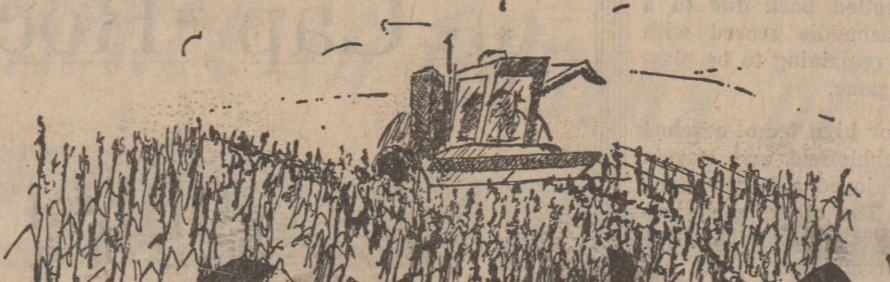
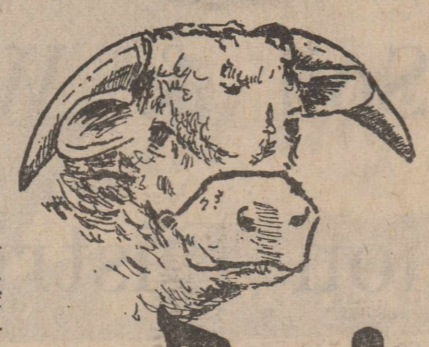

### Briscoe Countians Approve Six Proposals

A total of 323 Briscoe County voters went to the polls Tuesday to have their say on seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. County voters approved all of the proposals except No. 3, which concerned a management committee for state funds.

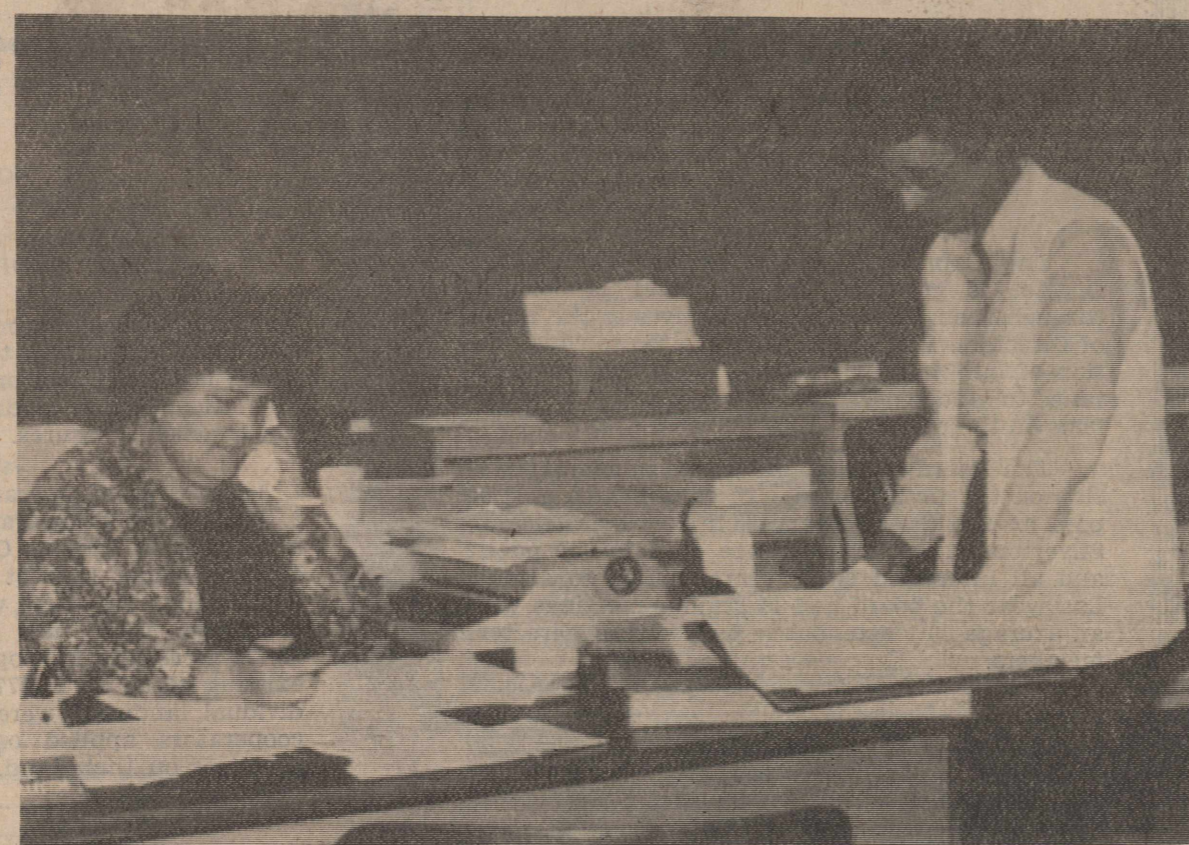
Statewide, the proposals which were approved by voters were: No. 1, tax relief for redevelopment areas; No. 2, authorize school land patents; No. 6, tax relief for residence homesteads; and No. 7, veterans land fund increases.

Proposals which failed statewide included No. 3, management committee for state funds; No. 4, state water fund from excess revenues; and No. 5, tax exemption for livestock and poultry.

### Owls Win In Last Second Of Game

Quarterback Shane Reagan directed the Silverton offense 95 yards in the final 55 seconds of the game to score the winning touchdown with only one second to play as Silverton's Owls took a 28-21 District 2-1A win over Lazbuddie here Friday night.

The winning drive was set up when Clifford Clardy intercepted a Lazbuddie pass at the Silverton five yard line.

Reagan had an excellent night on both offense and defense, completing 10 of 20 passes for 193 yards. He completed three passes for touchdowns, including the final two to Clardy, and ran 23 yards for the other Owl touchdown. He also ran for a two-point conversion to account for 26 of Silverton's 28 points. Defensively, he picked off three of the four Silverton interceptions of Lazbuddie passes.

The winning drive, which gave the Owls a season record of 2-7 and a district mark of 1-3, began with a 24-yard run by Gary Juarez to give him 95 yards on 17 carries for the night. Then Reagan took to the air into the teeth of Lazbuddie's prevent defense.

He completed four of his six passes, including two to Casey Bean for 53 yards, during the drive.

The Owls led 7-0 at the half on the strength of Reagan's touchdown pass to Warren Jarrett and Michael Hill's point-after kick in the first quarter. They extended that to 13-0 when Reagan broke his touchdown run, but Lazbuddie came back to take a 14-13 lead late in the third stanza.

Silverton retook the lead at 21-14 with :50 remaining in the period when Reagan hit Clardy on a 66-yard scoring pass - run and Reagan ran into the end zone for the conversion.

Lazbuddie scored with 10:28 remaining to be played in the game. The defenses then held to set up the climactic finish.

Gary Juarez was the highest-grading back at 76%; Bob Arnold was the top receiver with a 70% grade, and Eber Gill and Eric Patton tied with 85% as the top linemen.

Juarez was credited with 16 tackles in addition to his 95 yards rushing.

### Silverton Quarterback Earns 1A Grid Honors

It took longer than head coach Joe Stubblefield hoped it would, but Shane Reagan, who missed playing on offense in two games and part of a third because of a broken finger, is all the way back.

The junior quarterback turned in a banner performance last Friday night, completing 10 of 20 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Owls to a 28-21 comeback victory over Lazbuddie.

With the game tied at 21-all and his team 95 yards from paydirt with 55 seconds remaining, a Silverton victory looked remote. But firing well directed darts to receivers Casey Bean, Bob Arnold and Clifford Clardy, Reagan directed the Owls downfield. He then capped the miraculous drive with a six-yard scoring toss to Clardy with one second remaining on the clock.

Reagan, who rushed for 36 yards and a touchdown, also played an important role in the defense. From his spot at safety, he intercepted three passes (returning them for 55 yards) and contributed 10 tackles.

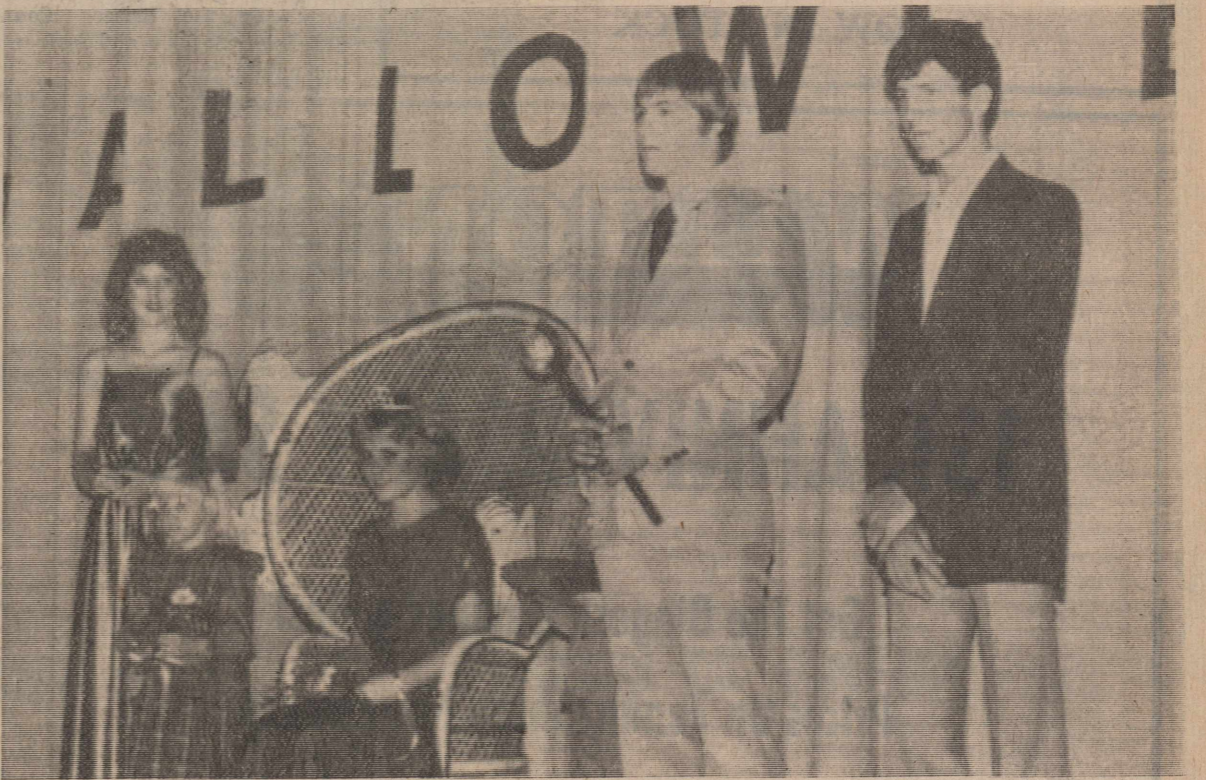
For his clutch two-way performance, Reagan captured this week's Globe-News Class 1A Coca Cola Player of the Week Award, and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Player of the Week Award.

"He's just a good, natural athlete," said soft-spoken Stubblefield. "He's just starting to put it back together after the time he missed because of the injury. "He's a good scrambler and can keep a play alive by moving out of trouble and finding some place to throw it."

Earning honorable mention as Globe-News Player of the Week was Silverton's wide receiver - safety Clifford Clardy, who intercepted a Lazbuddie pass on the five-yard line to thwart a scoring drive, in addition to catching two touchdown passes of 66 and six yards, the latter for the game winning points.

#### DISTRICT COOPERATORS IN 1981

District Cooperators are those landowners who have recognized the need for conservation of the land they own or operate, and have joined with the District to develop plans for applying conservation measures.

1. Approx. No. of Operating Units in District.....500
2. Total Acres in Operating Units.....539,507
3. Number of District Cooperators.....490
4. Acres Under District Agreement.....496,828

During 1981, there were 10 conservation plans developed with new District Cooperators on 12,472 acres, and 12 cooperators who updated their existing plans on 16,277 acres. A total of 310 individual landusers were assisted in 1981 and 135 cooperators applied one or more conservation practices on their land.

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is governed by the local landowners through their elected representatives to the Board of Directors. The District is dedicated to conservation of our natural resources by providing assistance to landowners in solving conservation problems on their land.

The Board of Directors meets in regular session on the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Silverton. These meetings are open to the public and all interested citizens are invited to attend. Last year the board had 11 regular meetings with an average 80% attendance by Board of Directors members.



IRRIGATION WATER MANAGEMENT

The cost of pumping irrigation water has increased dramatically in the last few years. The high cost of fuel is forcing farmers to take a look at what it costs them to pump the water they have. This year the District co-sponsored an irrigation field day to show area farmers how to check the efficiency of their irrigation pumping plants. By measuring the water output and energy cost, a farmer can figure his pumping cost per gallon.

The Soil Conservation Service staff will help any area farmer check the efficiency of his irrigation pumping plant.

#### TERRACES

Irrigation water is becoming both expensive and scarce. Many area farmers are turning to more dryland farming. Terraces, once thought of for erosion control only, are now widely recognized by farmers as an excellent way to conserve rain water.

Area farmers recognize that every inch of water that runs off of a field is water lost. This usually means a loss in production.

Furrow dikes, used along with terraces, are helping area farmers hold and use almost every inch of rain that falls on their fields. In dry years (which happen more often than wet years) this may make the difference between a good crop and no crop at all.

In many fields, terraces can be designed to lay parallel. Parallel terraces have few, or no, point rows and are designed to fit the farmer's equipment.



In 1981, the District sold and delivered 1020 trees to be planted for farmstead windbreaks. Orders are being taken for delivery in the Spring of 1982. Contact any board member or call 823-2320 to order.

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## Reagan Named Coke Player Of The Week

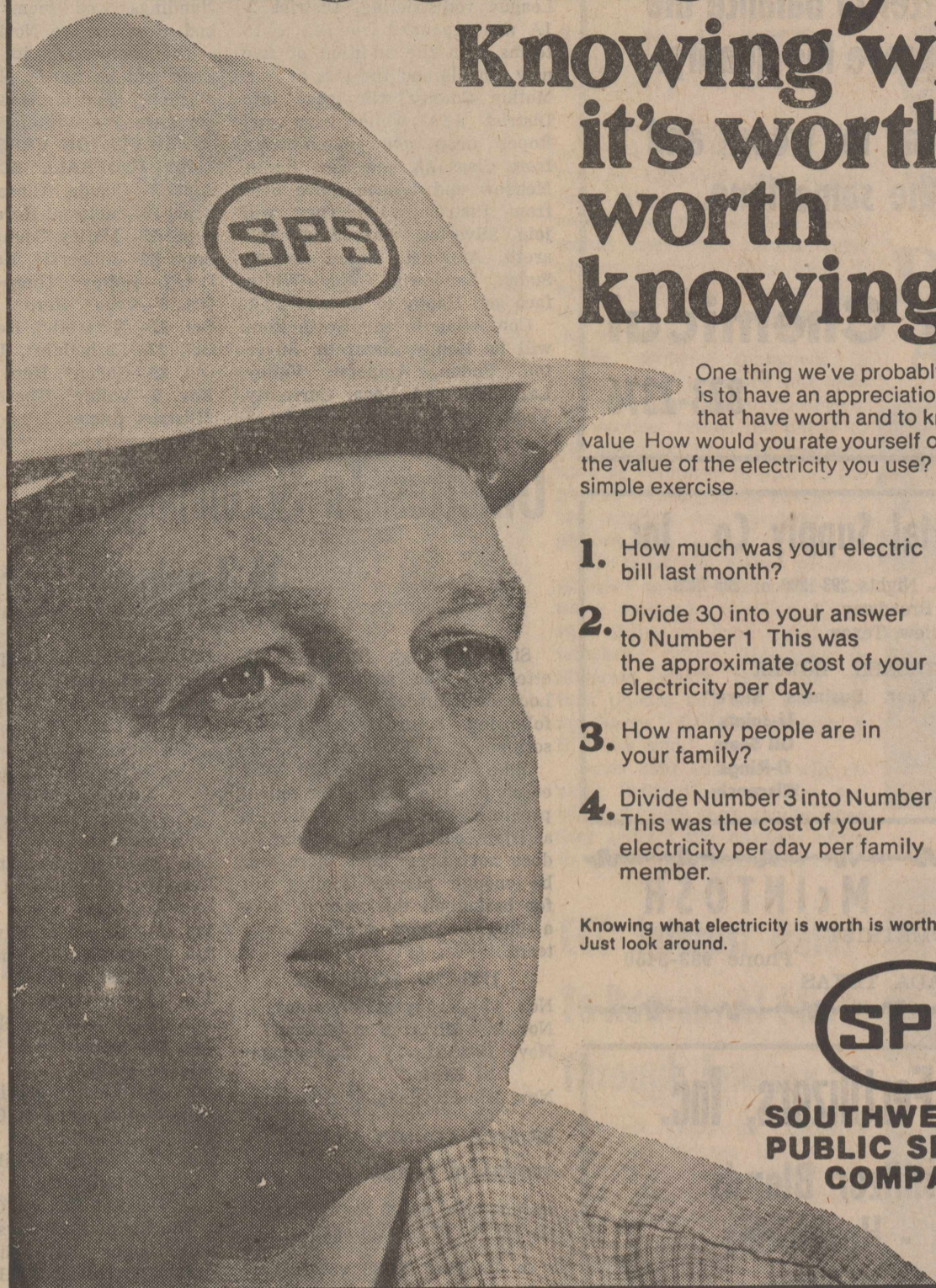
Silverton Quarterback Shane Reagan has been selected as the ninth recipient during the 1981 football season as the KVOP-KATX-COCA COLA Player of the Week. The announcement of the weekly honor was made Monday morning by Plainview radio stations KVOP and KATX along with the Plainview Coca Cola Bottling Company following Reagan's outstanding performance in the Owls' 28-21 win over Lazbuddie last Friday.

The 165-pound junior was picked because of his play on offense and defense. He led the Owls 95 yards in the final 55 seconds of the game and threw the winning touchdown. For the night Reagan completed 10 of 20 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns covering five, six and 66 yards. On the ground he rushed for 36 yards including a 23 yard touchdown and a two-point conversion. Totalled up Reagan figured in on 26 of Silverton's 28 points. On defense he intercepted three Longhorn passes and returned them for 55 yards.

Reagan is the second Silverton player ever to be recognized as the KVOP-KATX-COCA COLA Player of the Week. Ironically, Kelly Comer was selected in 1979 when the Owls narrowly beat Lazbuddie.

For being named as Player of the Week, Reagan is now eligible for Player of the Year honors to be announced at the conclusion of this season. He joins previous winners: Roland Powell of Tullia, Thomas Carrera of Hale Center, Max Riley of Abernathy, Calvin Schulte of Nazareth, Kevin Hendrix of Valley, Ernest Pardo of Hale Center, Chris Sperry of Tullia and Darren Young of Kress. The past recipients of Coke Player of the Year were Eddie (Magic) Johnson of Kress in 1979 and Plainview's Pat Brown in 1980.

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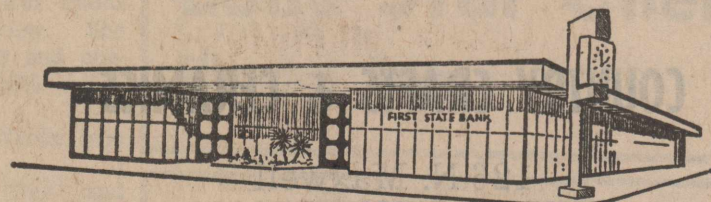
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**UIL Redistricting Affects

Davis said customers will receive instructions on how and where to take instruments when they contact the business office to discontinue their service.

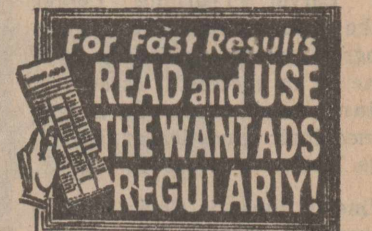
### CCC Interest Rates To Remain At 14.5% Through January

Interest rates for 1981-crop loans and storage facility and dryer loans made through the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation will remain at 14.5% through January 31, according to Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

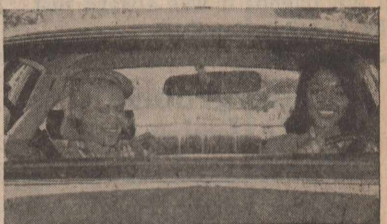
Block said the 14.5% rate has been in effect since April 1, when USDA announced it was instituting a "floating" interest rate, subject to adjustment on the 1981-crop and facility loans.

The variable interest rate on outstanding loans—which enables CCC to adjust rates in line with borrowing costs to the U. S. Treasury—will continue in effect, Block said.

Beginning February 1, he said, CCC's policy will be changed to provide for interest rates on new loans that more accurately reflect interest costs to the corporation.

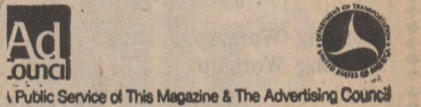

### Mood Of "Family" Impresses Student

Though not all those who enter Carver Learning Center make it successfully through the program, many graduates have gone on to successful careers in industry and others have continued their education at the college level.

One of those is Chris Lusk, a 19-year-old commercial art student at Amarillo College.

Miss Lusk moved to Amarillo from East Texas with her family several years ago, as she was about to enter her senior year in high school.

Her studies at Tascosa High lasted but four weeks.

"I was just getting bored with public school," she said.

After hearing about Carver from friends, she decided to apply.

"From the first day I walked in, I felt at home," she said.

"The students treated me like an old friend; it was always just like one big family."

After gaining a feeling of acceptance among the students, Miss Lusk said she began to enter her studies with an apparent new-born enthusiasm, which she had never felt before.

The credit, she said, went to the teaching staff, particularly to her art teacher, Jon Birdsong, who helped her along for two years on her way to becoming a prize-winning art student.

"They (the teachers) teach you self-discipline," she said. "I wasn't really ready to take another step, until my art work began winning prizes."

Birdsong, recognizing the reluctance of Miss Lusk to move on to higher goals, encouraged her to enter art contests.

In 1980, Carver placed more pieces in the Regional Scholastic Art Awards Competition than any other high school in Amarillo, and was second only to Borger High School among area schools that entered the competition.

One of the winners was Miss Lusk, who won not one, but four prizes—two for watercolors, one for acrylics, and another for mixed media.

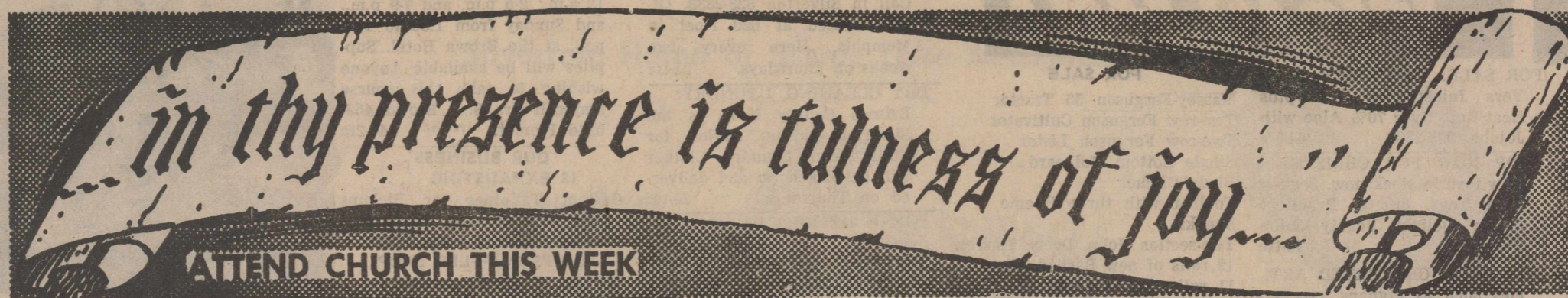
