

Interconnection To **Be Dedicated November 20**

John David Hughes, Commissioner, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, will be the principal speaker in Lubbock, November 20 at the dedication of an interconnection between Lubbock Power & Light (LP&L) and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The dedication will begin with a coffee at Southwestern Public Service Company's Reddy Room and will be followed by Commissioner Hughes' address. The group will then adjourn to the site of the interconnection. where Commissioner Hughes will energize the interconnect.

The interconnect agreement between the two companies will provide the City of Lubbock with firm power service, emergency service and non-firm energy service. Under the contract, LP&L will buy 10,000 kilowatts of firm power per month from SPS and have the option of buying still more off-peak generation at a reasonable price.

The Federal Power Commission has released a staff report which indicates that Lubbock, Texas could save more than \$95million in electric power service over the next 15 years by interconnecting with Southwestern

Public Service Company.






