## Owls Lose Final

### Game At Nazareth

Silverton's Owls lost their final football game of the season, 43-14, at Nazareth on Thursday night of last week. It was a "comedy of errors," according to Coach Joe Stubblefield.

Nazareth scored after recovering a kickoff near the Owl five yard line, scored again after recovering a fumbled punt deep in Silverton territory, scored easily on a pass interception, and blocked a punt for good field position.

Silverton took an early 6-0 lead as quarterback Shane Reagan broke for 56 yards into the endzone, but Nazareth scored the next six touchdowns.

Reagan scored again for the Owls in the third quarter on a 25-yard run.

Gary Juarez was the leading tackler for the Owls with 13 to his credit. Juarez also rushed for 61 yards on 13 carries; Craig Patton for eight yards on five tries, and Reagan rushed for 58 yards on 10 carries. Reagan also completed nine of 24 passes for 150 yards.

For the season, Juarez, even though missing the first two games, rushed for 527. Reagan missed playing on offense for three games due to a broken finger, but passed for 1,025 yards this season.

Motley County defeated Valley in a close game at Matador last Friday night, and is to play Smyer this week for the District Championship.

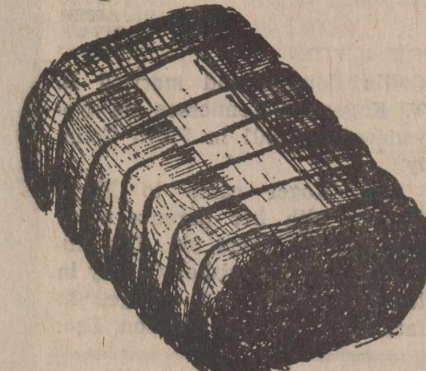
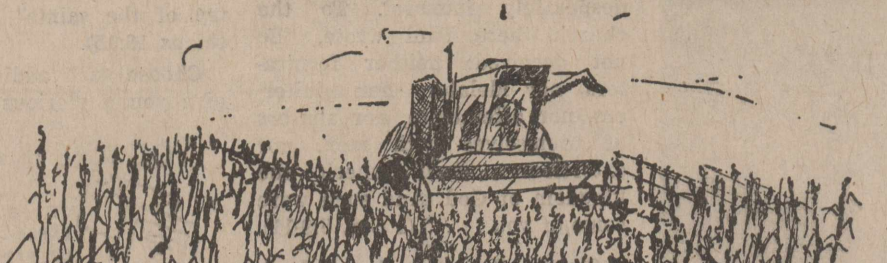

## Interconnection To Be Dedicated November 20

John David Hughes, Commissioner, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, will be the principal speaker in Lubbock, November 20 at the dedication of an interconnection between Lubbock Power & Light (LP&L) and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The dedication will begin with a coffee at Southwestern Public Service Company's Reddy Room and will be followed by Commissioner Hughes' address. The group will then adjourn to the site of the interconnection, where Commissioner Hughes will energize the interconnect.

The interconnect agreement between the two companies will provide the City of Lubbock with firm power service, emergency service and non-firm energy service. Under the contract, LP&L will buy 10,000 kilowatts of firm power per month from SPS and have the option of buying still more off-peak generation at a reasonable price.

The Federal Power Commission has released a staff report which indicates that Lubbock, Texas could save more than \$95-million in electric power service over the next 15 years by interconnecting with Southwestern Public Service Company.

## Ambulance Service To Buy New Radio

Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service met at the City Hall Tuesday night and voted to purchase a new two-way radio for the newest ambulance. This radio will keep the ambulance in touch with the Amarillo Communication Center, area hospitals, the sheriff's offices and Mackenzie Lake personnel.

A resolution was discussed which was passed by the Texas State Firefighters Association to have some benefits for Emergency Medical Service personnel who are injured or killed in the line of duty. Presently there are benefits for firemen but none for EMS personnel who often work side by side with the firemen.

Radio communication into the Lubbock area was discussed. Seven ambulance runs were made by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service to serve eight patients during October.

Those attending the meeting inventoried the sheets, pillow cases and other supplies used in the ambulances before the meeting was adjourned by President Anthony Kingery.

## Vehicles Using Liquefied Gas Need Tax Decals

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday warned that vehicles using liquefied gas must display a new tax decal by January 1, 1982.

Bullock said legislative changes in the LP gas law will permit his office to tax vehicles on both weight and mileage and decals should cost less for those who drive fewer miles.

An LP-powered vehicle cannot legally be refueled or pass state vehicle inspection without a valid tax decal.

Fuel tax decals range in cost from \$24 a year for a vehicle driven less than 5,000 miles annually and weighing less than 4,000 pounds, to \$300 for a vehicle weighing over 43,501 pounds and driven more than 10,000 miles a year.

Bullock said renewal notices to owners of LP-powered cars and trucks are being sent out by his office, and decals are available from the Comptroller's field offices and at the agency's Austin office.

Bullock estimated that there are more than 40,000 liquefied gas powered cars and trucks in Texas.

The motor fuels tax on LP gas brings in about \$4 million a year in tax revenue.

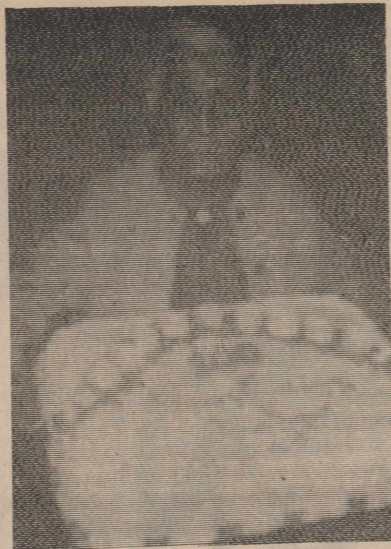

## The Burning Of The State Capitol - A Centennial Note

Austin — "The architectural monstrosity that has so long figured the heaven—Kissing Hill at the head of Congress Avenue, in Austin, is no more. The venerable edifice that bore such a striking resemblance to a large sized corn crib, with a pumpkin for a dome, and whose walls have so often resounded with

legislative eloquence, reminding the distant hearer of a dog barking up a hollow log, . . . took fire on Wednesday at noon, and in two hours nothing was left of it but the bare walls. The old building, however, was filled with many historical reminiscences and thousands of bats, all of which perished in the flames.

With those irreverent words, the editor of a local newspaper (The Texas Siftings) sang the death knell of the State's third capitol building, which burned to the walls on November 9, 1881. The fire began in a defective chimney and rapidly spread to the rest of the old structure. As the editor goes on, "it was a thrilling scene. The fire demon's cruel tongue licked the fair proportions of the historic pile, while huge volumes of black smoke poured from the doomed building, and settled over the fair city of Austin, like a sable funeral pall enveloping in its somber folds the spires and domes that glitter on the seven hills of the Capitol City of Texas, while the toot, toot, toot, of the fire engine, and the hoarse profanity of the enthusiastic volunteer firemen, seemed an appropriate dirge as the old sarcophagus crumbled into, etc. etc."

The capitol fire was less than a completed tragedy. However, many of the State records were saved from the flames, and the Capitol building itself already was destined for replacement by a new structure, the present

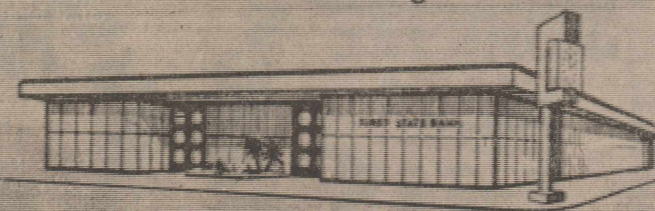
