

Nuclear Waste Storage Area Could Be Located Twenty Miles From Silverton

How do you feel about having the United States' first permanent high level nuclear waste storage area 20 miles from Silverton? If residents of this area don't take action immediately, his could very well become a reality.

A stable salt formation is needed in which to store the nuclear waste canisters, and it is

present in the northeast corner of Swisher County. The Palo Duro Basin is considered an ideal location because of the strata formation.

The Department of Energy has contracted for the drilling of two shallow test holes in Swisher County. One has been drilled, and the other is expected to begin soon. An 8,000-10,000 foot deep test hole is to be drilled

later.

DOE is expected to hold public meetings in January at which residents will have a chance to air their feelings on this matter, but it is felt that it will be too late by that time.

Thousands of letters need to be written now. Governor Bill Clements could bring all this to a halt by declaring that no nuclear waste is to be buried in

Texas. This is what governors of some of the other states have done, and this is what we need. It is very important that you write to Governor Clements, to Dr. Ted Taylor, who is chairman of the 22-member Texas Energy and Natural Resource Council, and to Dr. Jeff Neff, DOE. Letters to your United States Senators and Congressman also will help. All these ad-

resses are provided at the bottom of this article.

One of the problems with nuclear waste is that it is expected to remain hot and active for approximately 250,000 years—CENTURIES! Another problem is that so far satisfactory storage containers for this material haven't been made. The canisters that nuclear waste is presently stored in in Washington state

have begun seeping the dangerous material which has polluted hundreds of miles of river to the extent that no fishing is allowed. Canisters, said to have been built to contain the material for 30 years, and disposed of in the ocean by this country, Russia, and possibly other countries, were in pretty serious condition when they were 15 years old. On the basis of this, we can expect that nuclear waste buried in the salt in Swisher County would, after 15 years, be out of the containers and held in the salt formation. Okay, if it stays in the salt. But what if there were to be a shift in the formation, or for some reason the salt See NUCLEAR WASTE—

Mr. Gardner died at 7:00 a.m. Saturday at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tullia. He was admitted to the hospital November 9.

Mr. Gardner was born August 5, 1889 in Millam County. He married Mary Etta Douglas on January 1, 1911, in Pioneer. In September of 1921 the family moved in two covered wagons from their farm between Pioneer and Rising Star in Eastland County to Cone. In January of 1925, the family moved to Briscoe County and settled on a farm known as the Wagley place southwest of Silverton. During the time they lived at Silverton, Mr. Gardner was a Steward in the Methodist Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Gardner moved back to Eastland in 1948, but due to the failing health of his wife they moved to Tullia in 1964 to be near some of their children. Mrs. Gardner died in October 1966. He was also preceded by a son, Roland Lee.

A retired farmer, Mr. Gardner had worked for the Green Thumb organization in recent years.




There will be a program and discussion of the nuclear waste site which has been proposed to be located in northeastern Swisher County at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, December 3, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton.

The meeting will last for approximately one hour. It is hoped that representatives of all the clubs, churches, businesses, the commissioners court, city council and all others interested will attend.

The guest speakers will be from Tullia.

The proposed nuclear waste disposal site is only 20 miles from Silverton and should be of great concern to all residents of Briscoe County. At this time, locations in Swisher and Deaf Smith Counties seem to be of prime interest to the Department of Energy, and all of Briscoe County and part of Deaf Smith County lie within a 50-mile radius of Tullia.

Public Hunt Set For Aoudad Sheep

A public hunt for aoudad (Barbary) sheep and feral goats will be held at Caprock Canyons State Park in Briscoe County January 2-16.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized the 14-day hunt which will be conducted similarly to the hunt held last year.

The hunt will be conducted to provide recreation and help control numbers of the introduced

aoudad sheep and feral goats which compete with native mule deer herds in the park. Staff members told the commission the hunt will have minimum impact on park activities, because visitation during January is very limited.

Hunters will be selected by public drawing at 10:00 a.m. December 7. Applications for the hunts must be received by 5:00 p.m. December 3. Application forms may be obtained by writing the Park Operations Branch, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

A fee of \$350 will be charged each hunter for the two-day hunt, which begins at noon on the first day and ends at noon on the third day. Hunters selected for last year's hunt will not be eligible. Bag limit will be one aoudad sheep per hunter. A total of 56 permits will be issued.

Hunters also are reminded that they will be required to wear a minimum of 400 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange material, with 144 inches appearing on both the chest and back. Additionally, applicants must be at least 12 years of age and those under 17 must be accompanied by a hunter over the age of 21.

formation let the substance seep out? This would contaminate the soil, the ogallala and santa rosa water formations, and even the water impounded in Lake Mackenzie (about 10 miles from the proposed nuclear dump). The water in the lake would be ruined both for drinking purposes and for recreational purposes, and the time, effort and money spent by the people of Lockney, Floydada, Silverton and Tulia would be for naught.

There are other dangers associated with the storing of the nuclear waste. Consider that this material would have to be hauled by rail and or by truck to the location.

If there were an accident at the disposal site or if the site were to be bombed, it would release nuclear fallout similar to a terrible accident at a nuclear reactor. A lot of people would die immediately. Some others would die in six weeks after suffering the horrible symptoms of radiation poisoning. Birth defects, illness and cancer would result for at least fifty years after the accident.

There is no safe level of exposure to radiation. Emissions damage cells, promote illness, reduce life expectancy, cause cancer and birth defects.

Back to the waste disposal site itself. There is a low level nuclear waste disposal area in New Mexico. One hundred and sixty acres around the hole is fenced, and no one is permitted inside. For another five miles around, nothing is permitted except cattle grazing (no water well activity). For another twelve miles around the location there is no oil or mining activity permitted. You can readily see the economic loss to those owning land in that immediate area, in addition to the danger.

There are three types of nuclear waste. Two of them are classified as high level and low level. The low level waste includes the bulky slightly contaminated items of clothing, etc. with weak radioactivity. This includes clothing, gloves, etc. worn by the nuclear scientists. The high level classification contains the spent fuel of nuclear reactors and the bi-product of the government weapons program which produces high heat and lasts for centuries.

Accounts are open in the Tulia banking institutions for donations to help pay court costs in the legal battle which probably will follow. Your help is needed with this.

Now to the letter campaign. You can mail postcards if you don't have time to write a letter, but a letter will receive more attention. Here are some suggestions.

Be original. Do not send zero or other copies of letters.

Write the letter in your long-hand if it is at all legible; use ruled tablet paper, if you prefer. Expensive personalized stationery is not needed for this job.

Be legible. Be brief. Say what you need to say in a courteous way and end the letter. Limit your letter to one page.

Be pertinent. Have a forceful first line. Show how they can help us.

Be courteous. Don't threaten that you won't vote for him if he doesn't help in this.

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


The Rampleys shared their meager rations of cheese, crackers and vienna sausage from tin pans and tin cans before bidding them farewell and sending them on their way.



ADVANTAGES OF FALL FERTILIZATION

Fall application of fertilizers for next year's crop has some real advantages over waiting until next spring. We can identify some of the factors in favor of the practice.

Of first importance, it is proven that phosphorous, potassium and other plant nutrients are relatively immobile in our clay loams. When fall applied, they stay there ready for plant use next year. Except on sandy soils, fall-applied nitrogen loss is negligible. Research with grain sorghum shows equal yield response from fall and spring application on the heavier soils.

Any time after corn, sorghum or cotton harvest is a good time to fertilize. Presently, our soil moisture conditions are favorable for ammonia application and retention. If you are concerned about residue decomposition, the present combination of warm soil, moisture and the addition of nitrogen are in your favor.

Now that much of the fertilizer is custom applied in bulk with heavy equipment, there is less danger of compaction in the fall. Good weather generally prevails making the job easier for all concerned. Availability of materials and equipment is a distinct advantage, and quite possibly, there may be price incentives now versus the price next spring. Talk to your dealer about price.

The kind and amount of fertilizer needed can best be determined by having a soil test made and interpreted in light of re-

HOLIDAY FOOD SAFETY

"Turkey Day" is just a week away. Do you have visions of a holiday table spread with hams, roast beef and turkey, sweet potatoes and cranberries, salads, freshly baked breads, cakes and pastries?

Buffets are festive and fun but don't let them turn into a holiday "nightmare" because of food poisoning.

Consider how many guests you can safely serve. Be sure you have enough refrigerator space for the perishable foods. Keep buffet servings small, and replenish the serving dishes directly from refrigerator or stove.

When all your guests have finished eating, put the perishables—especially meat and poultry—back into the refrigerator.

Remember, when foods are left on the buffet table for more than two hours, the risk of food poisoning increases. Under these conditions, germs may multiply

search that has been conducted in this area. The Extension Soil Testing Laboratory has recently added considerable equipment to improve soil testing. In addition to determining nitrate nitrogen, six other tests are routinely made. The micronutrients, zinc, iron and manganese are made on request.

Prompt attention can be given soil samples received in the fall, but it may take a little longer next January or February. Information on how to collect and mail soil samples can be obtained from my office in the basement of the Briscoe County Court House.

OUTSIDE PESTS MOVE INSIDE IN FALL

Outside insects aren't overly fond of cool weather and often come indoors with autumn weather.

Spiders, scorpions and their relatives that live outdoors in the summer search for a warm place to spend the cold days of winter.

Roaches and ants inside not only want to keep warm but also help themselves to stored products or food.

So insect pests in the home are not only annoying, but some can inflict a painful sting or bite.

Pests often enter through open doors and windows or through vents in the attic or small cracks in the foundation. They also ride firewood inside.

Once in the house, they hide in clothing, under boxes or other cover.

To keep pests out, "tighten up" the house with caulking or some other type of weather stripping. This not only keeps outdoor pests from coming inside but makes the house more airtight and energy efficient.

Homeowners also can treat around the house with an approved insecticide to create a chemical barrier that kills insects or repels them.

Indoors, use an insecticide containing diazinon, chlorpyrifos (Dursban), propoxur (Baygon) or malathion. For an effective barrier outside the house, treat the foundation and a 5 to 10-foot strip of ground around the house with any of the above materials, with Baygon and Dursban being the longer-lasting.

to levels which can cause food borne illness.

You can't always tell if a food is safe to eat by taste, appearance or smell. So if you know a perishable food has been left out more than two hours or handled carelessly, throw it out.

To be sure they are safe to eat, keep meat and poultry dishes cold, below 40°F; or hot above 140°F, until serving time.

Give special attention to holiday dishes such as cold meats, poultry, poultry stuffing, potato salad, cream pies and eggnog. All these contain meat, poultry or eggs . . . just what germs love. Also these foods are handled more than other foods in preparation—especially for a fancy buffet—and it's easy for germs to spread from hands to food.

If you need to prepare hot dishes ahead of time place them in the refrigerator within 30 minutes after cooking. Reheat thoroughly just before serving.

Never leave cold dishes such as meat, poultry or meat and egg salads at room temperature. Refrigerate immediately.

Food borne illness can cause diarrhea, vomiting, stomach cramps, and other unpleasant symptoms which can last for several hours or days! Use three simple rules for food safety: keep food hot, keep food cold, and keep food clean. Make your holiday memories pleasant ones.


