"Uncle Zeb" Wood Buried Wednesday

Funeral services for Carl C. (Uncle Zeb) Wood, 75, were conducted Wednesday at 2:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Claude, with the Rev. Daymon White, pastor, and the Rev. Charles Davenport, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Tullia, officiating. Burial was in the Claude Cemetery by N. S. Griggs & Sons Funeral Directors of Amarillo.

Mr. Wood died Monday. Born in Glenrose, he moved to Claude in 1930. His wife, Georgia, died in 1975. He was a retired farmer and rancher and was a member of the First Baptist Church in Claude.

He served for nine years on the Claude School Board, seven years as president. He was an executive in the Farm Bureau and the Claude Lions Club.

From 1954 to 1960 he served as Armstrong County Judge, but he did not seek a second term, preferring to devote his time to writing and volunteer work.

Perhaps his best known work was in the field of newspaper writing. For many years, his column, "Plowing Out the Corners," which he signed "Uncle Zeb," appeared regularly in several Panhandle weekly newspapers. The title of the column later was changed to just "Uncle Zeb."

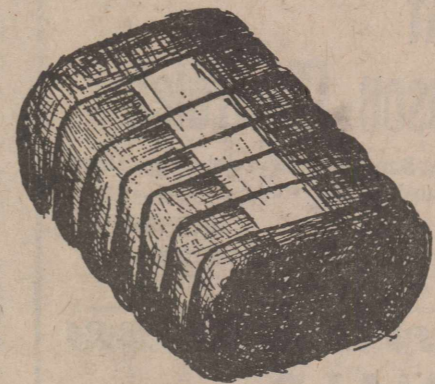
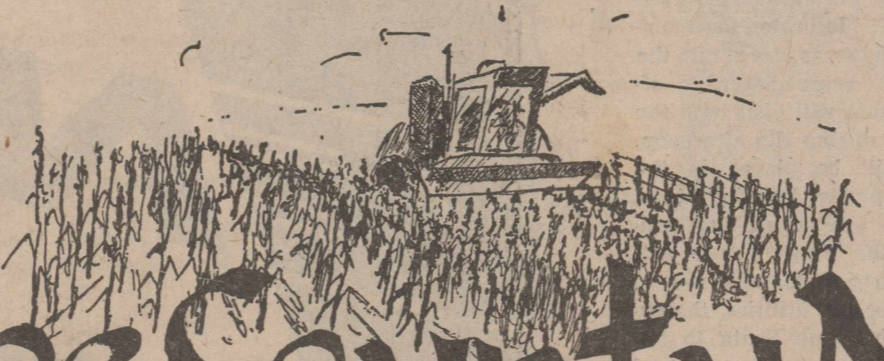
Mr. Wood once said of his character Uncle Zeb, "I wanted him to be a nice guy, what I'd like to have been, only I'm flesh and blood." He said he aimed to write "something that makes people feel better and want to live better."

His column also appeared in book form—five of them to be exact. The first book, "Uncle Zeb and Red River," came out in 1961, followed by "Plowing Out the Corners," a compilation of his columns published in 1962; "Uncle Zeb's Notebook," and "Along Life's Way," both printed in 1967; and "Memories of Uncle Zeb," published after his wife's death in July 1975.

Hearts Unlimited, a round-robin letter club for shut-in readers, grew out of Mr. Wood's column. After he had spent many hours at hospitals while his wife suffered a lingering illness, Mr. Wood discovered that he liked to talk to families of other patients and to the patients themselves, perhaps to impart some words of comfort in trying

Nuclear Waste Disposal To Be Discussed At Meeting Here Today

There will be a program and discussion of the nuclear waste site which has been proposed to be located in northeastern Swisher County at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, December 3, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton.

The meeting will last for approximately one hour. It is hoped that representatives of all the clubs, churches, businesses, the commissioners court, city council and all others interested will attend.

The guest speakers will be from Tullia.

The proposed nuclear waste disposal site is only 20 miles from Silverton and should be of great concern to all residents of Briscoe County. At this time, locations in Swisher and Deaf Smith Counties seem to be of prime interest to the Department of Energy, and all of Briscoe County and part of Deaf Smith County lie within a 50-mile radius of Tullia.

Following their marriage, he worked as a pharmacist and she was a saleslady and buyer for a dry goods firm.
