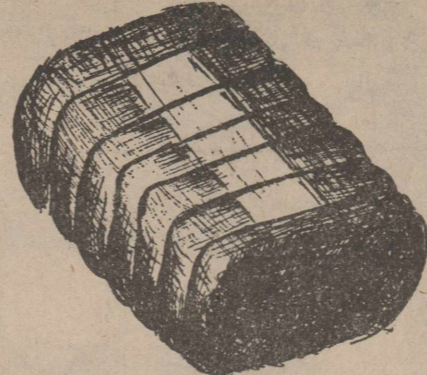
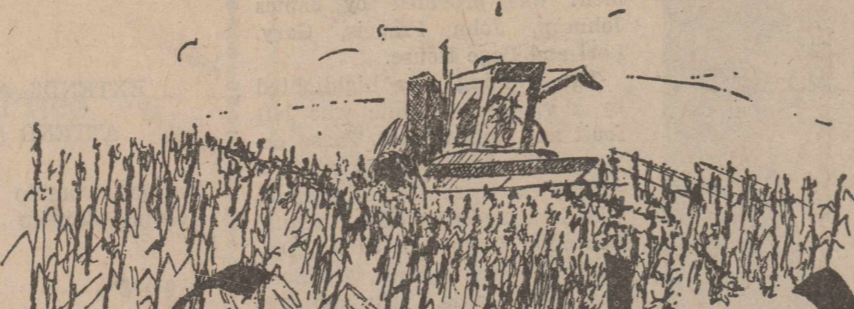

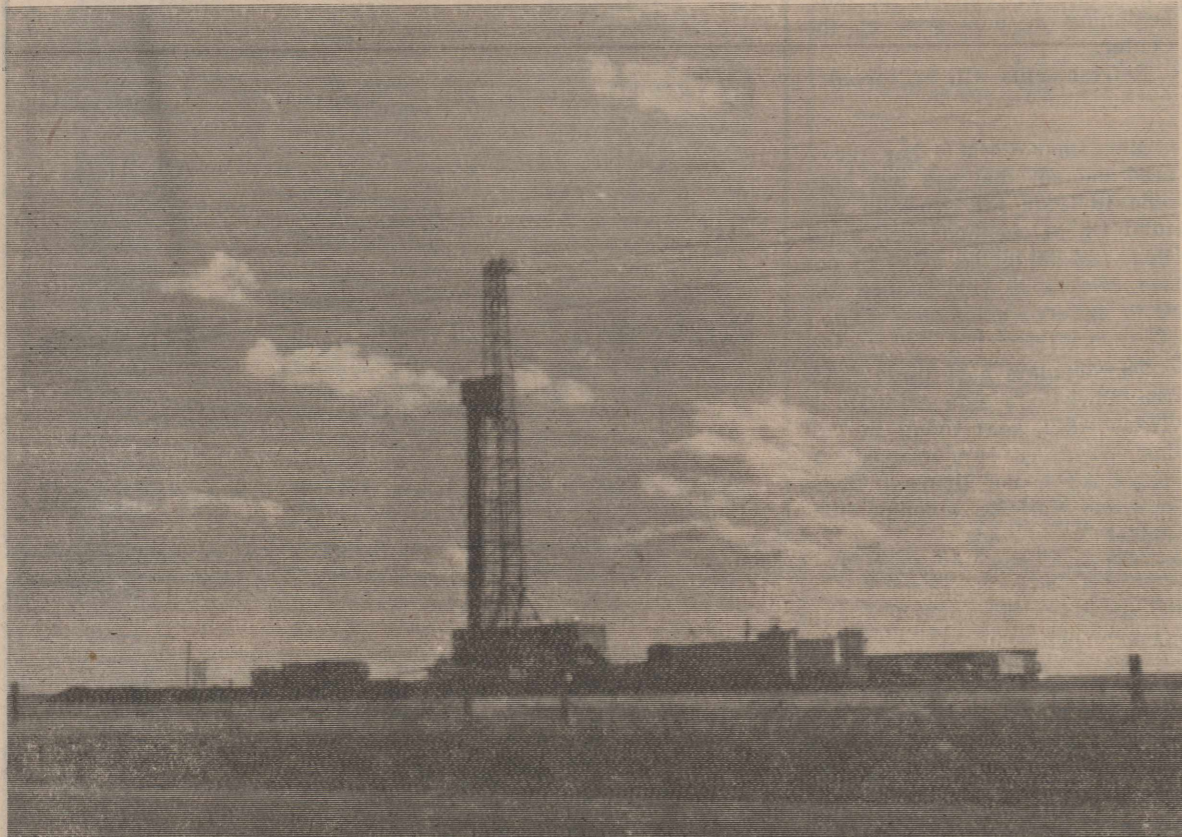

## Oil In Briscoe County?

Briscoe County (Wildcat Miss. Dolo) Marathon Oil Company, No. 1 Pascal Garrison (320 ac.) 467' from North and West line, Section 198, GM, GC&SF, 6 1/2 miles northwest of Silverton reportedly is drilling below 4000 feet this week. The permit is to drill to 9500 feet.

People ask us almost every day, "Why isn't the newspaper carrying stories about the oil well drilling activity that is going on in Briscoe County now?"

The simplest answer to this question is that most of what we know is hearsay—not a reliable news source. The gossip is very exciting, but it isn't news. It is very difficult to get any information from Marathon Oil Company, representatives of which have answered most of my questions to date like this: "Are you aware this is a tight hole and we can't give out any information about it?"

Some of the information that we have been able to come up with, that we believe to be factual is this:

The pit has been dug on the W. H. Brooks farm northeast of Silverton and Exploration Unlimited of Corpus Christi is expected to move a rig to this location around January 5, 1982. A test hole will be drilled to 8500 feet.

BLN, Inc. of Silverton has drilled an exploration hole on the Saul Ranch ten miles southeast of Silverton. Their permit was for drilling to 3600 feet, they drilled to 2872, cased it to 2850, and plugged the hole. They believe they had enough promise to case the hole. They plan to perforate the casing in January or February to see what the well will develop into.

BLN, Inc. (which we understand was supposed to have been BNL for "Brothers-in-law") also plans to drill three or four more holes in Briscoe County, the next hole to be on the Don Garrison farm three or four miles northwest of Silverton.

Wednesday morning Marathon Oil Company was making ready to perforate the casing in a 9500 foot hole drilled on the G. Mayfield Ranch, and it was thought that by the weekend they would know what the well would produce. If this well does produce, it will be Briscoe County's first producing oil well.

The Marathon Oil Company rig which drilled the hole on the Mayfield Ranch is now drilling a second hole 1/4-mile east on the Pascal Garrison farm. The drilling permit is for 9500 feet, and it is reported they are below 4000 feet now. This location is 6 1/2 miles northwest of Silverton near Highway 207.

Oil exploration in Briscoe County is at the highest point now that it has ever been, and many Silverton residents are very optimistic about the test holes now being dug. This has brought about a small boom to the economy. It was reported last week that the old Silverton Hotel had been purchased with plans to use the facility to provide housing for some of the oil workers. The hotel is being cleaned up and repaired at this time.

Several local men have been working on the oil rigs, in addition to those who are here from other places. Houses are needed to rent to these workers.

In addition to the oil exploration, oil leasing has been going on in a very serious way, with the lease price, which had been \$1.00 an acre not too many years ago, having been reported up to \$25, \$40 and \$110 per acre.

### Fire Destroys Cotton At Gin

Six modules and three ricks of cotton were destroyed by fire at Silverton Gin, Inc. Monday, December 21. Both the Silverton and Quitaque volunteer fire departments answered the call and worked from shortly after noon to shortly after dark to keep the fire from spreading to other cotton on the yard.

Module trucks belonging to the other gins and individuals assisted in moving modules away from the area threatened by fire.

### Reagan Named To All-South Plains Team

Silverton junior Shane Reagan was named to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's Class 1A All-South Plains football team for his play in the Owls' defensive secondary.

Reagan, 6-0, 170 pounds, was also Silverton's starting quarterback and is one of only six underclassmen named to the all-star squad.

## New Year's Day To Bring Changes In State Liability Insurance Law

Beginning January 1, 1982, Texas drivers contacted by Department of Public Safety officers during traffic stops and vehicle accident investigations will be required to furnish proof of compliance with the new compulsory liability insurance law.

Under House Bill 197, an amendment to the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Act (6701h) approved this year by the 67th Legislature, all drivers must carry minimum liability coverage for medical expenses of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more) and property damages of \$5,000.

Department of Public Safety Director Colonel Jim Adams reports troopers will accept as evidence of insurance coverage the policy for the vehicle being operated or a document issued by the insurance company.

"Such a document must contain a statement that the liability coverage for the motor vehicle is the minimum prescribed by law," Adams said. "The document must also include the name of the insurance company, the name of the insured person, the policy period and the policy number. This document may take the form of a letter or a card, depending upon the preference of the insuring company."

Insurance companies throughout the state recommend drivers do not carry their original policy or a photostatic copy of the policy declaration page or the insuring agent's binding agreement. They would rather motorists carry with them an official card or letter.

Adams has pointed out that DPS troopers will be enforcing the provisions of this law along highways and rural roads. Local police officers and sheriff's deputies have also been given the authority to request this information.

Drivers who do not maintain the specified coverage, refuse to give information or give false information to law enforcement officers risk a minimum fine of \$75 for the first offense or \$200 for subsequent violations.

In addition, a conviction under this new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver's license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

For convicted violators to establish proof of financial responsibility, a filing of an "SR-22" form must be made to the Safety Responsibility Bureau in Austin by the violator's insurer as proof of coverage.

The SR-22 form, used as evidence of insurance, is kept on the DPS computer file for five years, but if the violator cancels or allows the coverage to lapse, the violator is notified that his or her license and registration are suspended and that another SR-22 filing will be required.

Since most insurance companies will not insure those requiring an SR-22 filing, coverage may be obtained through either a

county mutual insurance company or through the Texas Automobile Insurance Plan (TAIP), an assigned-risk insurance pool, at a higher premium rate than the norm.

Those persons convicted under this new law will pay 20 percent more than the standard rate for insurance, if in the TAIP. Drivers convicted a second time will pay up to 95 percent higher rates.

Out-of-state, government-owned and self-insured vehicles are exempt from these insurance requirements. However, drivers of self-insured vehicles will be asked by DPS officers to produce evidence of self-insurance at accident scenes and traffic stops.

The insurance industry predicts liability premiums to increase because poor drivers who once were uninsured will now be put into the insurance system.

The new law covers motorcycles as well as every form of motor vehicle operated on a public road or highway.

Rep. Gene Green, D-Houston, the author of HB 197, describes the bill as "experimental—if it doesn't work, we'll do something about it."

The highway patrol does not plan any extraordinary effort to detect violators, but will ask for insurance proof during routine traffic stops and while investigating accidents. It has been past policy of the DPS to issue warnings rather than citations during the first 90 days after a new law has taken effect.

Interment was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Mr. Maciel died Thursday night of last week at the Lockney Nursing Home. He was transferred to Lockney from Tullia by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service early the previous week.

Born May 12, 1910 in Mexico, Mr. Maciel came to Silverton 20 years ago from the Rio Grande Valley. He was a laborer and a member of Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church.

Survivors include his wife, Felipa; one son, Jessie Maciel of Silverton; two daughters, Adela Trevino of Edinburg and Olivia Aguilar of Silverton; one stepson, Joe Garza of Tullia; 30 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren.

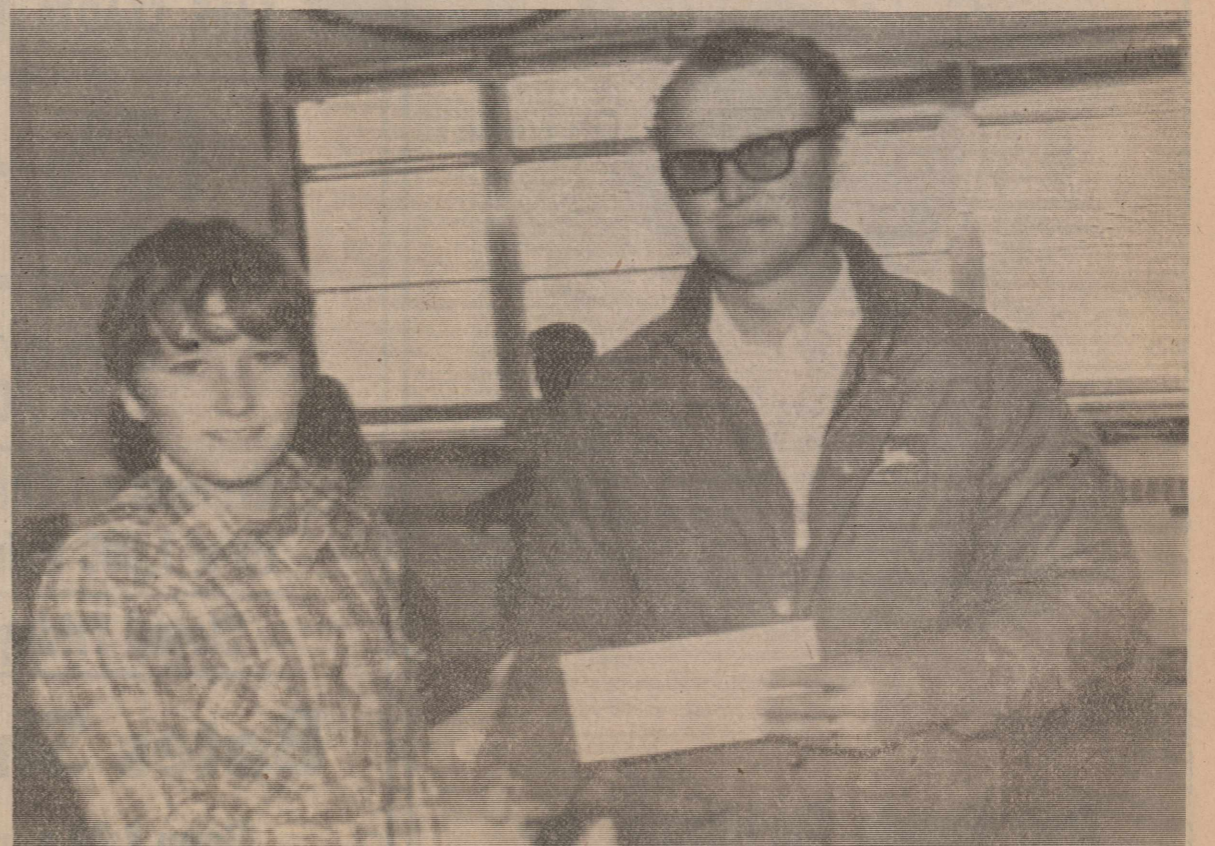

The newly created District adds Crosby and Dickens counties and the north portion of Lubbock County to Whaley's old 66th Legislative District. Whaley lost Wheeler County to the District now served by J. W. Buchanan in the Northern Panhandle.

Foster Whaley is a 1949 graduate of Texas A&M; is a former County Extension Agent; has farming and ranching interests in Gray, Carson and Armstrong counties. He is a founding member of the Texas Cattle Feeder's Association and is credited with hedging the first pen of cattle in Texas, south of the Canadian River, on the live Beef Cattle Futures Market. He has served as a panelist member on Merrill Lynch hedging seminars.

Whaley, with the help of his wife, Lois, serve on a full time basis as State Representative. Their farming and ranching interest is leased out to others. They log over 50,000 miles annually serving their present ten county District.

Foster Whaley does not accept downstate Political Action Committee money for his campaign fund. An Austin publication stated that fewer than six legislators are in this category. Whaley serves as a member of the powerful House Appropriations Committee and is vice chairman of the Constitutional Amendments Committee.

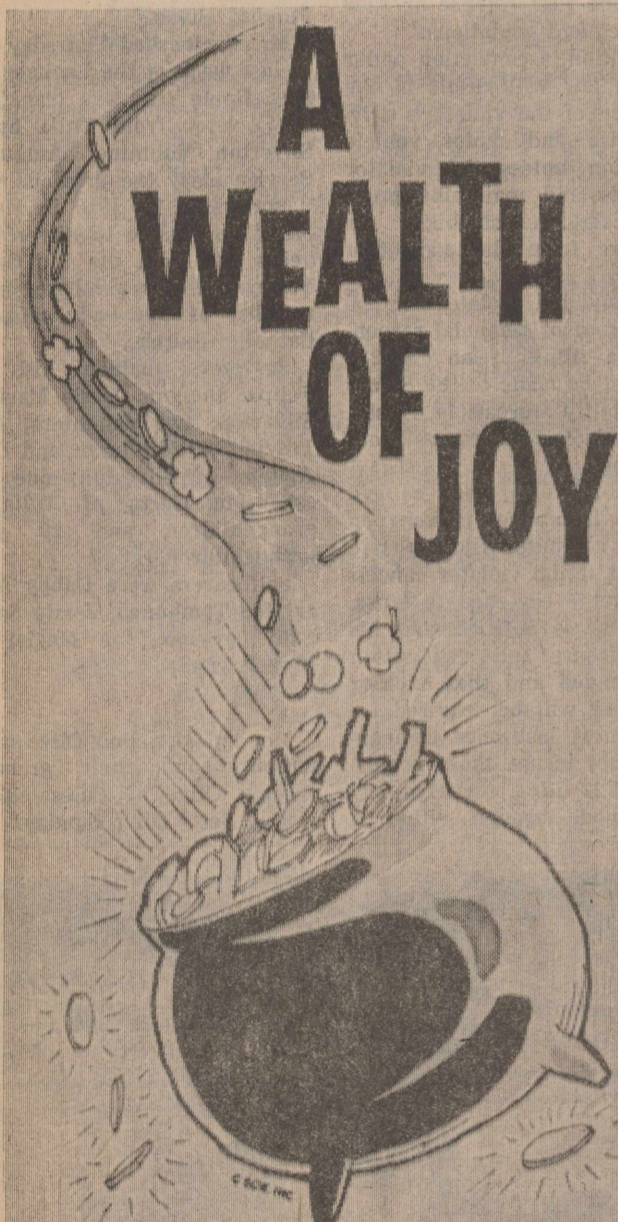

**Time To Order Trees  
For Windbreaks**

The time has come again to begin ordering trees for use as windbreaks in Briscoe County. The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District has once again received applications from the Colorado State Forest Service and the Texas Forest Service to place orders for seedling trees.

Some of the trees that will be available are ash, cottonwood, golden willow, hackberry, honey locust, Russian olive, poplar, Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, red cedar, Douglas fir, scotch pine and Colorado blue spruce.

If you are interested in some of these trees you may contact any one of your Caprock SWCD board members: Jack Sutton, Don Burson, Murry Wayne Morrison, Jimmy Myers or Jarus Flowers, or go by the Soil Conservation Service office for assistance in ordering trees.

Although the survival rate of young trees has generally been good, a few trees fail to survive mainly due to adverse conditions such as scorching heat and a limited water supply.

An economical system called Drip Irrigation is being used very effectively in many areas
