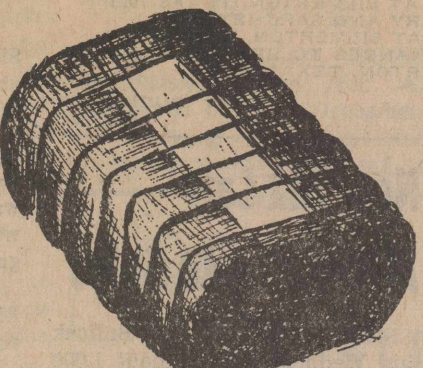
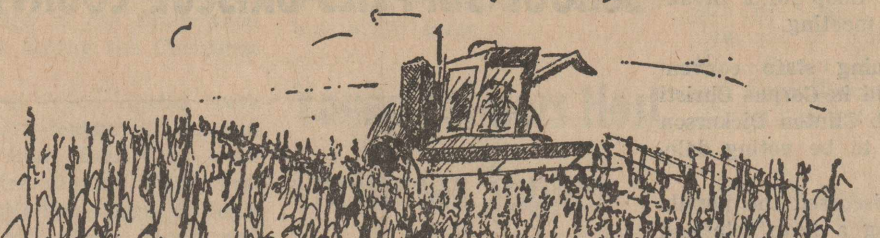

County Livestock Show To Be Held Saturday

The Annual Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show will begin Saturday at 9:00 a.m. with steer judging in the county show barn in Silverton. This is to be followed at 10:00 a.m. by the swine judging. After a break for lunch, the sheep judging will begin at

1:00 p.m. Superintendents are Cam Forbes, steers; J. E. Patton, swine, and Joe Edd Helms, sheep. Judge for the show will be Stanley Young, Lynn County Extension Agent. Show superintendent is Don Cornett, and the ring announcer is Donnie Martin.

The show is sponsored by the Briscoe County Livestock Show Committee, of which Don Cornett is chairman and Earnest Kiker is secretary-treasurer. The other members are Joe Brannon, Harvey McJimsey, Stan Fogerson, J. E. Patton, Jimmy Burson, Jerry Baird, Riley Harris, Joe Edd Helms, Donald Hughes, Aaron Younger, Harold Edwards, Elton Cantwell, Jerry Patton, George Martin, Bennie Reagan, Doug Forbes, Donnie Martin, Joe Ike Clay, Billy Shannon, David Tipton and Wayne Stephens.

All of the stock for the show must be weighed in and in place between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. Friday. Entry fees are \$2.50 per head for lambs and barrows, and \$5.00 per head for steers. All exhibitors must be members of active FFA chapters or 4-H clubs in Briscoe County, and the feeding period for the animals to be shown must have begun before November 15.

Animals will be divided into classes following weigh-in. Lambs must not be over 140 pounds and must have baby teeth. Top weight for the barrows will be 275 pounds. Each exhibitor may enter no more than three animals in each division of the show.

4-H families are reminded to come to the Extension office to sign up and pay their deposit if they plan to participate in the 4-H Ski Trip to Durango, Colorado February 26 - March 1. Those already signed up need to pay half the cost of the trip at this time.

Some of the reservations at Tamarron will be cancelled if more do not register for the trip.

Parents who want to go but do not plan to ski will deduct the cost of the lift ticket from the price of the ski package that was quoted in the letter sent to 4-H families.

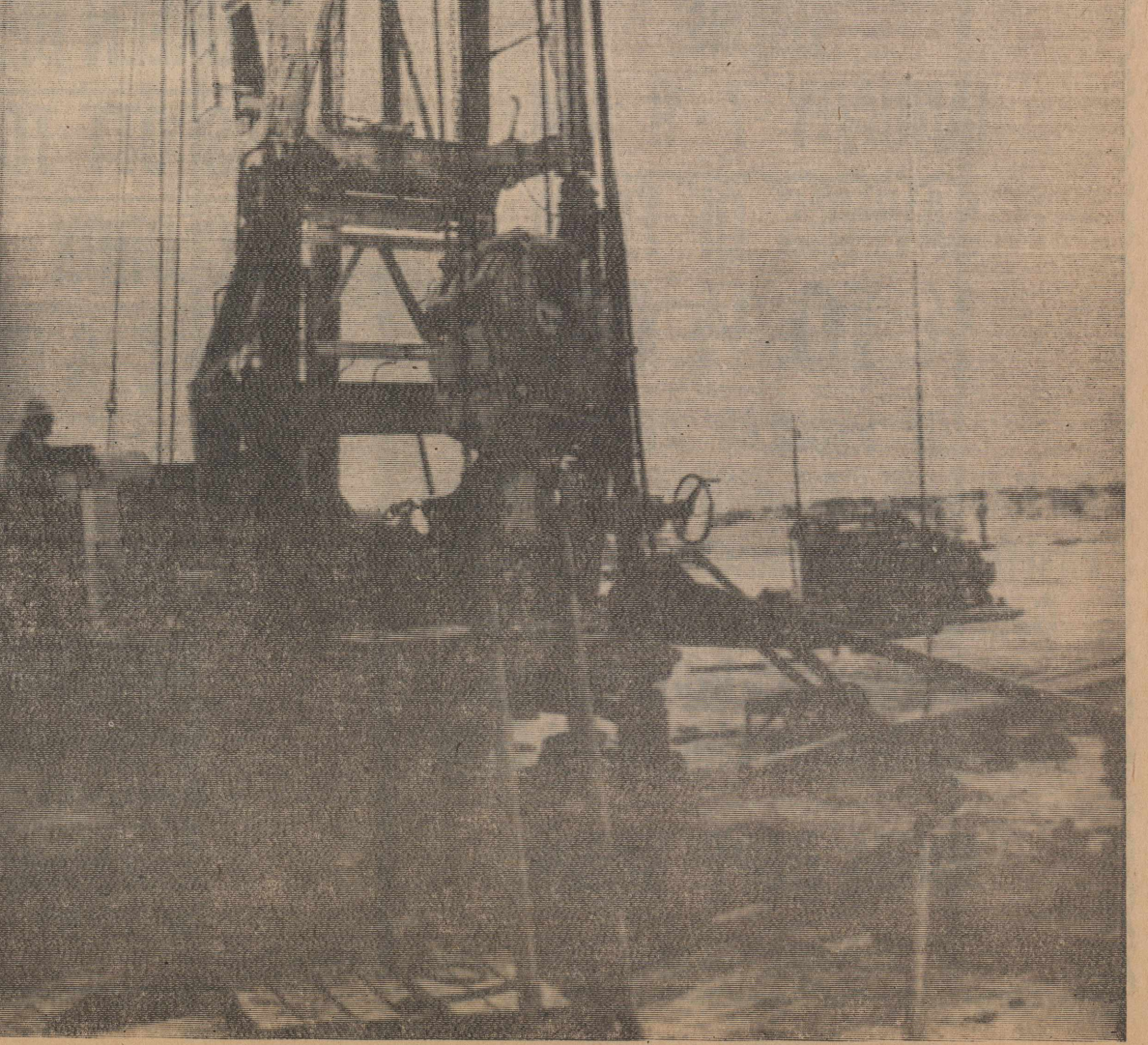
Services Pending For Mrs. Garrison

Oil Activity Is Continuing In County

Oil leasing activity continues in the Plains portion of Briscoe County, but it is reported that most of the county below the Caprock already has been leased.

At the location of the W. H. Brooks wildcat exploration, eight miles northeast of Silverton, caliche has been hauled for the pad this week. Workers at the site said they expected the oil drilling rig to arrive Friday. According to the intention to drill, this test is to be drilled to 9,000 feet.

It has been learned that another oil well location has been staked on the J. K. Patrick Estate, 1 1/2 miles northeast of Quitaque (Section 42). It is expected that this test will be drilled to 9,000 feet.

It is estimated that from three to six wells are to be drilled below the Caprock in Briscoe County.

Drilling at the Pascal Garrison location is reported to be below 5,000 feet this week.

At presstime the work-over rig at the G. Mayfield location was still swabbing the hole. This work sometimes requires from two to three months to complete. There is oil in the hole, but how much is not yet known.

The casing was perforated last week at Marathon Oil Company's G. Mayfield No. 1 northwest of Silverton and the hole is being swabbed this week. It was learned that sometimes this operation takes from two to three months to complete.

SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY JANICE ULMER

Happy New Year! Once again it's time for resolutions, good intentions and a general recovery time from the hustle and bustle of the holiday season. Then on with the business of 1982.
 Today, I would like to remind you of a few of the events coming up if you receive social security. W-2 forms will soon be issued. If you received any social security benefits in 1981 and earned over your limit, you will need to file your annual report with us before April 15, 1982. Your limit is determined by your age. If you were under 65 in 1981 it was \$4,080, if you were 65 or older in 1981, it was \$5,500. Remember, your social security annual report must be filed with us even though it is due the same day as your income tax. Filing your tax return does not file your social security annual report.

In several instances you may receive your annual report form in the mail. You can either complete it yourself or we will be glad to assist you. We can help you by phone so don't hesitate to call either 293-4371 locally or our toll-free number, 1-800-392-1603.

Another general reminder concerns Medicare. Don't forget, the part B deductible increased to \$75 per year effective January 1, 1982.

Also, if you are OVER 65 and haven't filed for Medicare you may do so only during the first three months of the year. This is a recent change. Briefly in 1981, you could apply for Medicare anytime after you turned

New Tax Law Affects Credit Sales

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that about 1,000 Texas merchants need to be aware of new sales tax requirements on credit sales which go into effect January 1.

The new law affects merchants who make installment sales of taxable items, include the amount of sales tax due in the outstanding balance and keep their books on the "cash" basis of accounting.

According to the new law, a part of the interest paid on the sales tax portion of credit sales will be taxable. This additional amount is to be reported and remitted when the regular sales tax return is filed.

If the interest on the sales tax and the unpaid balance are the same—and the rate is 18 percent or less—the state gets half the interest on the sales tax portion of the total amount being financed.

If the rate is more than 18 percent, the state gets all interest on the sales tax amount above nine percent. For example, a merchant charging 20 percent interest on credit sales will remit 11 percent interest on the sales tax amount to the state, assuming the rate for the sales tax portion is the same as for the rest of the unpaid balance.

If the interest charged on the sales tax portion of the bill is different from the rate charged on the rest of the unpaid balance, the merchant must remit all of the interest paid on the sales tax portion to the state.

65. But this is no longer the case. You are now limited to filing during the first quarter of the calendar year.

Finally, I would like to encourage all Medicare beneficiaries to check with the insurance representative in your doctor's office any time your doctor cares for you during a hospital stay. Although the hospital will file your hospital claim, this will not cover any services provided by your doctor. His bill must be filed with Medicare part B. Any time you are in doubt about whether or not your doctor bill has been filed, check with the doctor's insurance representative. In many cases they will assist you in filing. In the event their policy is not to file Medicare, bring your itemized bill to us and we will be glad to help you.

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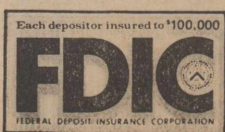
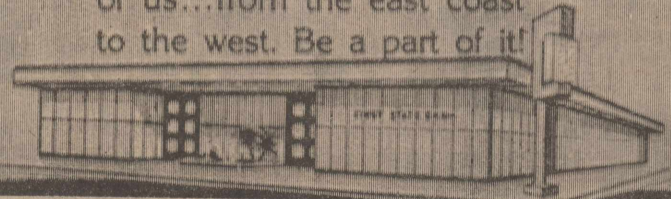
