

**All Around the Town**

Oil news and tall tales continue to dominate the local scene, and probably will continue.

Drilling is underway on the J. K. Patrick farm one-half mile northwest of Quitaque, on the W. H. Brooks farm northeast of Silverton, and on the Reeves farm just outside Briscoe County in Floyd County. Drilling is expected to begin in February on the Rex Johnson place south of Turkey. Work continues on the Allen Johnson re-entry in the Red Hill community area of Swisher County.

Halliburton is in town this week, perforating and acidizing the BLN, Inc. wildcat on the Saul Ranch, ten miles southeast of Silverton. This well was drilled to 2872 feet and cased to 2850 feet. BLN plans to drill another wildcat on the Saul Ranch soon.

Marathon Oil Company has finished drilling on the Pascal Garrison No. 1 at 8300 or 8400 feet.

A pump was placed in the Marathon Oil Company G. Mayfield No. 1 last week, and pumping began Wednesday night. A completion report has not yet been filed with the Texas Railroad Commission.

The G. Mayfield No. 1 is the first oil discovered in the Palo Duro Basin, and this is why the oil exploration in Briscoe County is such big news.

Seismograph activity continues to be brisk on and near the Mayfield Ranch, and in the area south of Silverton near the Floyd County line.

Much work has been done to update information and records of the cemetery. If you have information concerning any of the unmarked graves or stones, or have any questions, this would be a good time for sharing.

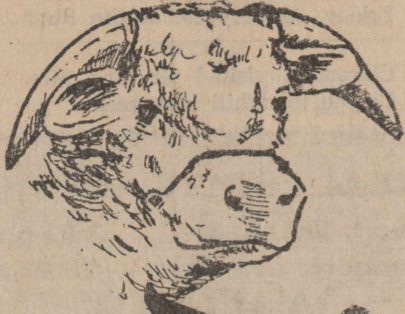

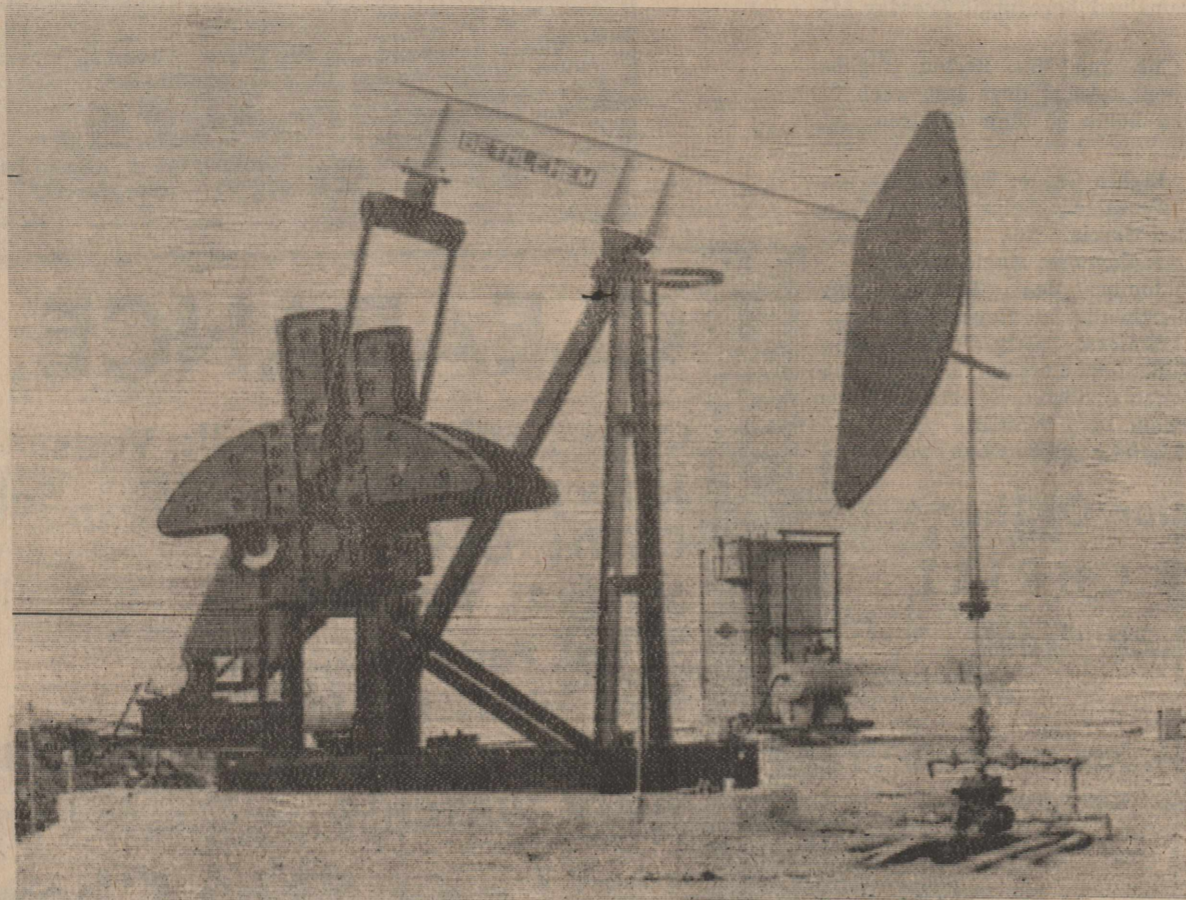

Anthony Kingery, Silverton's first paramedic and current president of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service, was recipient of the first annual Ambulance Attendant of the Year Award at the association's banquet Saturday night at the fire station.

The award presentation was made by Lynn Frizzell.

Jeff Jones was master of ceremonies for the banquet and introduced the special guests, which included Mrs. Linda Massey, director of the Amarillo Communications Center, and her husband. Mrs. Massey addressed the group, commending the volunteers of the Silverton Ambulance Service, and adding that she was especially proud of Anthony Kingery, Lynn Frizzell and Bruce Tiffin for placing in the Paramedic Olympics held in Amarillo last year. "They were the only unpaid team placing in the Olympics," she added.

The invocation was given by Ted Kingery, after which those present filled their plates from a buffet laden with turkey, ham, vegetables, salads, pie and cobbler.

Following the meal, a demonstration of the stabilizing of a simulated heart attack patient was given by Anthony Kingery, Lynn Frizzell, Emmett Tomlin, James Edwards, Jeff Jones and Bruce Tiffin, with narration by Ted Kingery.

Three new Emergency Medical Technicians, Mike Mercer, James Edwards and Dale McWaters, were introduced. Anthony Kingery paid tribute to the wives who stay at home while their husbands spend many hours preparing themselves to serve the community's emergency medical needs.

The fire department's new Hurst tool, including Jaws of Life, was on display and the two ambulances were open for inspection. At the conclusion of the banquet, Jeff Jones made the announcement that a \$5,000 gift toward the purchase of the Hurst tool had been made by Riley, Sandy, Shelly and Scotty Harris. Total purchase price was almost \$10,000, and by buying it last week, the fire department was able to avoid a 12% increase in price which goes into effect immediately.

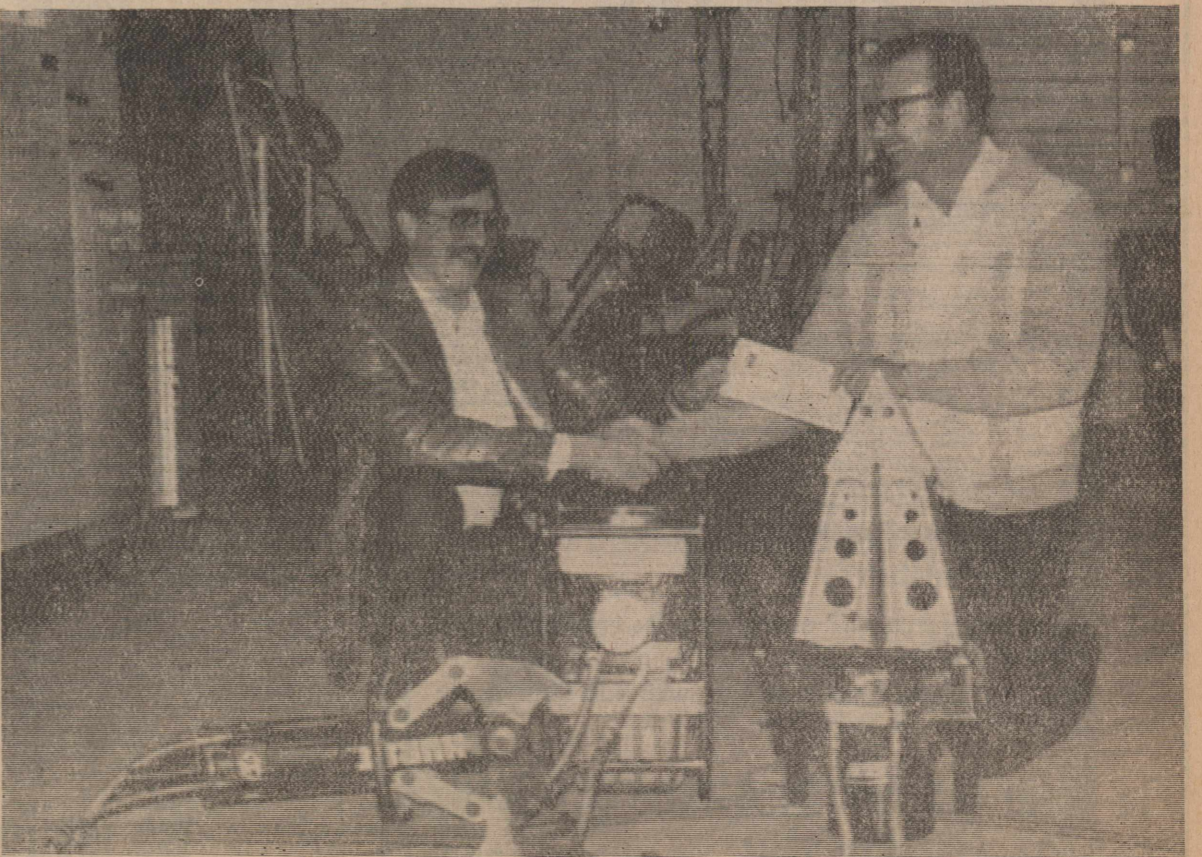

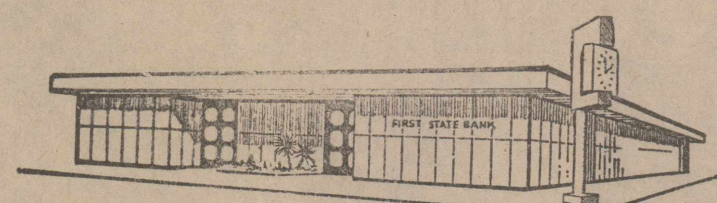

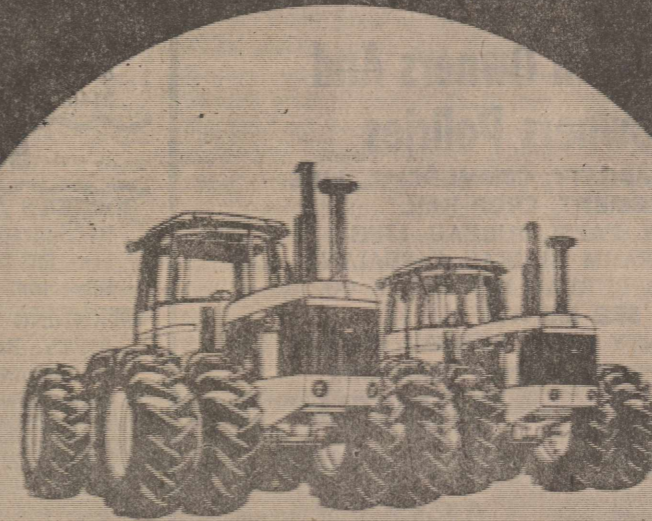
