

## All Around the Town

An intention to drill has been filed for a wildcat four miles northwest of Silverton by the Sojourner Drilling Corporation, Box 3234, Abilene, Texas 79604. This will be the No. 1 D. M. and W. M. Cogdell, located on 1224 acres 4300 feet from North and 2045 feet from East line. Section 192, GC&SF Survey. The drilling permit is for 9000 feet.

The report is that they are having difficulty maintaining circulation on the No. 1 J. K. Patrick wildcat seven miles northeast of Quitaque. Drilling was below 1000 feet early this week. This wildcat is being drilled by Hanson Corporation, Box 1212, Midland, Texas 79702. The permit is for drilling to 8000 feet. The legal location is 660 feet from North and 1320 feet from West line, Section 42, 3, T&P.

Drilling on the W. H. Brooks No. 1 was below 4000 feet early this week, and according to reports, drilling is going very well. This location is eight miles east of Silverton and the permit is for 9000 feet. This wildcat is being drilled by Tri-Ex Oil & Gas, Inc. 1-6 Exploration Unlimited, and its legal location is 467 feet from North and East line, Section 6, B-1, BS&F.

More casing has been brought in for Marathon Oil Company's Pascal Garrison No. 1, 467 feet from North and West line, Section 198, GC&SF, 6 1/2 miles northwest of Silverton. Drilling was finished at 8300 or 8400 feet on this wildcat.

The BLN, Inc. wildcat on the Saul Ranch, ten miles southeast of Silverton, was perforated and acidized last week, and has been swabbed this week. Plans are to perforate again at another depth. This well was drilled to 2872 feet and cased to 2850 by the Silverton company.

## Young Farmers To Have Field Day February 6

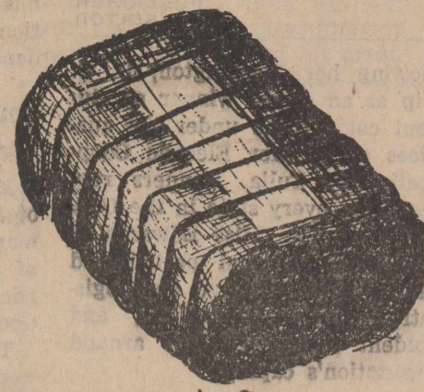
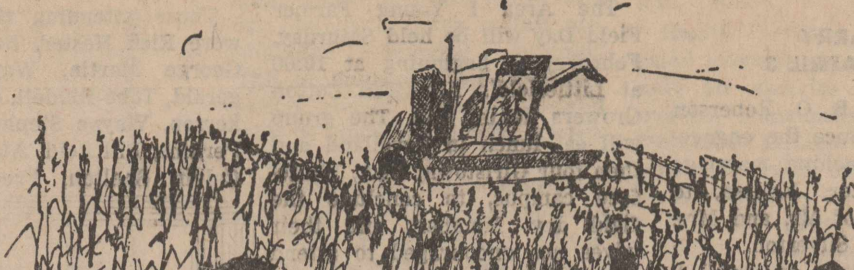
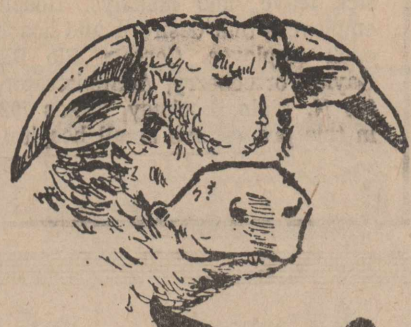

## Silverton Fire Department Purchases Hurst Tool

Silverton Volunteer Fire Department has recently purchased a piece of equipment that its members hope they will never have to use.

This is the Hurst Tool, an extrication device with Jaws of Life. Most people are familiar enough with the Jaws of Life that they know it is a tool which can be used to open the door of a vehicle that has been damaged in an accident, to make it possible for passengers to be removed from the wreckage.

A person may be pinned in the car by the steering column, and the Hurst Tool can be used to relieve this pressure by pushing back the seat or pulling the steering column.

It pries, bends, tears, shears and forces metal, masonry or timber—gets rescuers to trapped victims with life-saving speed. It can be used to force doors, remove steering columns, open barred windows, cut door posts, raise heavy weights, peel back roofs and sheet metal, lift rollup doors or take fire doors completely off their hinges. It can cut door posts, chainlink and security fences in critical seconds,

and can be carried anywhere. It includes a hydraulic cutter which has a cutting force of 15 tons; the Jaws, with an opening force of 18,500 pounds and closing force of 18,800 pounds, and a ram, with opening force of 15,000 pounds and closing force of 7,000 pounds. It includes motor and pump, aircraft tips, chain and shackle set.

The Hurst Safety Products Division, in conjunction with Texas Firefighter Equipment Company, have an emergency repair service for this equipment that provides a Hurst Tool to use anytime something goes wrong with the purchased equipment. This enables the department to be back in service in a day or two.

The fire department and the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service will be working together in a combined rescue effort whenever the Hurst Tool is used. Quite often, both departments are needed at the scene of an accident and most of the members of the ambulance service are also members of the fire department.

The ambulance service has purchased several items its members hoped they would never need—but not one of them has been used.

The Hurst Tool may help prevent someone from dying or burning in the wreckage of an automobile.

The fire department is in need of donations to help defray the cost of purchasing the Hurst Tool. It is a very expensive item at \$9,428.58, but was purchased in time to avoid a 12% increase in the price which was to go into effect immediately. If you would like to make a donation toward this purchase, you may do so by contacting any fireman, going by the City Hall, or leaving it at First State Bank.

## Annual State Convention Of Young Farmers Held In Corpus Christi

The 28th annual Texas Young Farmer Convention was held in Corpus Christi January 22-23.

During the opening session on Friday, remarks were given by Mrs. Mary Ann Leveridge, member of the State Board of Educa-

tion. Bobby Bauch, past state TYF president, spoke on the National Young Farmer Institute held in Pennsylvania in December.

Nominations for state president were made and a short speech by each nominee was heard.

During the Young Farmer luncheon, introduction of exhibitors and presentation of awards were made: Two former Silverton residents were recognized as exhibitors: Freddie Dunham, with Ace Bolt & Nut, and Cletus Grady, jr., with Farmland Industries.

The luncheon speaker was Dr. James Blakely, who used the topic, "To Soar With Eagles." Dr. Blakely stated that education and training in any business will help the individual soar. One must follow the rules and regulations and keep up with the changes. We have to be careful.

Sometimes we worry and feel sorry for ourselves—part of this could be due to bad public relations, inflation, so on, but we can see the difference between us and our border neighbors, Canada and Mexico. We have to keep our public relations.

Farmers are just like hybrids, and we are a hybrid nation (from all over the world).

There were several highlighting points made by Dr. Blakely. (1) Faith: Faith is the daring of the soul—to go farther than you see. An example was Buddy Davis, polio victim, who overcame the disease one day at a time.

At the beginning for a full year he couldn't talk or do anything except move his left hand. But he never gave up and did the best he could with what he had. Doctors said he'd never walk again. One day he stood and over the next eight years rode his stationary bike 100,000 miles. He walked one full year on tip-toes. He went to high school where the coach saw his 6'9" height and wanted him for bas-

ketball. By the time he was a senior, this boy, who was never to have walked again, had lettered in every sport. He was the tallest basketball player at Texas A&M.

There the school had high jump so he participated and was the best in the nation in his first year.

When you have a good year do you set a goal for next year? He did—the olympics; and a year later he did it—received a gold medal—broke an 11-year record of 6'8". He came back to the USA and said he'd do one more thing by breaking the world record of 6'11". One day in practice he broke 7'. He knew he could do it! (Do you?)

Five months before time for the world record meet, he broke his foot. Everyone said there'd be no way. Five weeks before the event he cut the cast off and went. He jumped 6'11 1/2". Buddy Davis, who did this, was just a poor polio kid who could only use his left arm. Yet, he did the impossible.

In this life we must have faith, (2) service, get involved even with out all the answers, (3) wisdom—through wisdom we can and have faced situations and challenges. One highlight on wisdom was that as parents we duck the responsibility of correcting our children. Dr. Blakely said, "Bust your kids at least once a week—if you don't know why, THEY WILL! (4) life of action; go as far as you can go. Stimulate the minds of others as well as your own. (5) security; real security is the power of the mind. See what you have and how little you've done with it.

If you can march but only to a different beat, do it. Soar with those eagles. Some very strong people did soar such as Buddy Davis and look where he landed—soar now!

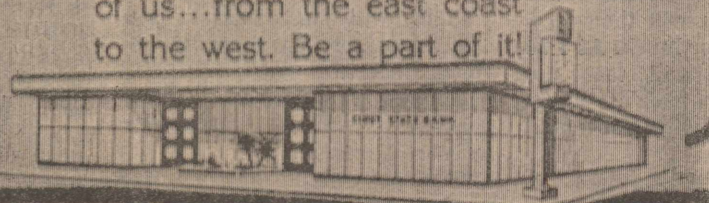

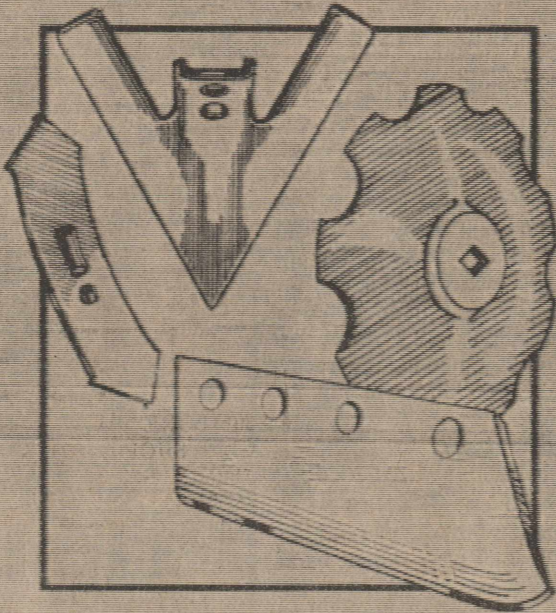
