

Loans Received To Finish Mackenzie Water Project

Senator John Tower's office called Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Manager Neil Taylor Tuesday morning to notify him that approval had been received for a \$7,363,000 FHA loan at 5% interest for 40 years with which to complete the Mackenzie water project to furnish municipal water to the cities of Silverton, Floydada, Lockney and

Tullia. This money will be added to the \$7,368,000 loan granted by the Texas Department of Water Resources, to total \$14,731,000, the amount needed to complete the project.

A total of \$3,405,000 will be spent on the supply phase, which includes raw water pump station and lines to bring raw water

from the back of the dam to the treatment plant.

The \$11,326,000 will be used to build high-rise pumps, a 1,000,000 gallon storage reservoir near Rock Creek, the treatment plant, and transmission lines to the four cities involved in the project.

Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority officers and directors are meeting today with engineers. It is hoped that they will be able to award contracts for the work in February or March of 1982. After that, it is estimated that about 30 months will be

required for completion of the project.

Mackenzie Manager Neil Taylor was elated as he told the Briscoe County News of the successful culmination of years of dedicated effort to make the project a reality. "This means," he said, "that in approximately three years the project will be finished."

Preliminary work on the Mackenzie project began approximately 20 years ago—described as "our 10 year project" then by Bill Long whose brainchild it was. The plan has had a number of setbacks which, at times, seemed to indicate that the Mackenzie water would never reach the cities which had the foresight to build Lake Mackenzie. Had construction of the dam been delayed even one year, inflation would have made its becoming a reality an impossibility.

As the project now stands, it is a monument to the friendship and cooperation of the people of the four towns who have put their tax dollars on the line to provide for the water needs to insure the quality of life for future generations in their hometowns.

injuries in 1980, points out Kiker. Agricultural work-related accidents claimed about 200 lives and caused about 20,000 disabling injuries. Ten percent of all agricultural accidents occur in Texas.

Total cost of accidents to Texas farm and ranch people exceeded one-half billion dollars last year while the figure topped \$5 billion nationally, adds Kiker.

Farm Safety Week is designed to call attention to both leisure-time and work safety as a necessary part of efforts to control off-the-job, profit-eating accident losses, says Kiker.

Farm and Ranch Safety Week Is Proclaimed Here

As farming and ranching becomes more mechanized, involving bigger and more complex machinery, new and greater hazards will confront farm and ranch workers.

To encourage renewed emphasis to make farms and ranches a safer place to live and work, Briscoe County joins Texas and the entire nation in recognition of 1981 National Farm and Safety Week.

A week-long, statewide campaign to inform Texas rural residents about farm and ranch accident prevention will be conducted by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System, the Texas Farm Bureau, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas.

Therefore, I, as County Judge of Briscoe County, Texas, do hereby designate the week of July 25-31, 1981 as Briscoe County Farm and Ranch Safety Week, and urge all who live and work on farms and ranches to make accident prevention a part of all activities.



Couple To Marry September 12




