



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

RELATING TO GRANTING OF CONFEDERATE PENSIONS

Senate offint Resolution No. 10

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created this state for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such

amendment and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
