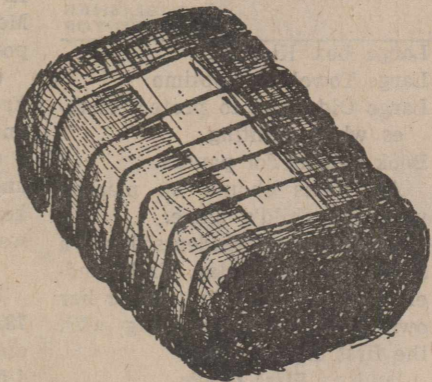
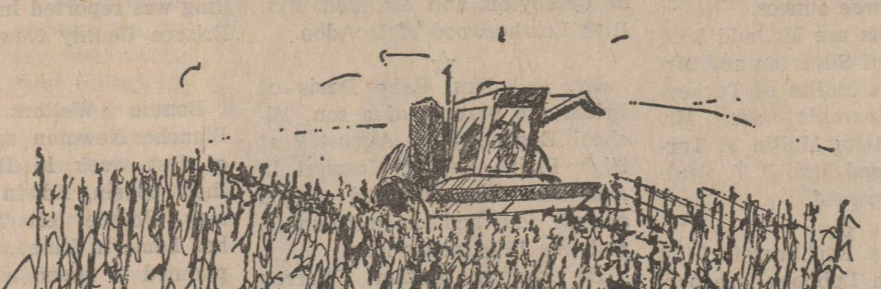

# Irrigation Field Day Slated Friday

## School Opens Next Wednesday Here

An Irrigation Field Day will be held Friday, August 21. Interested farmers should meet at the Briscoe Co-op Gin at 10:00 a.m. and at the First National Bank in Quitaque at 1:30 p.m.

Leon New, irrigation specialist with the Texas A&M Extension Service, will discuss pumping plant efficiency of irrigation wells, and will demonstrate the use of the "Torque Cell Converter." The Torque Cell Converter is a device used to determine the amount of power that is actually transmitted from the engine to the gearhead. During the test it takes the place of the existing drive shaft. This device gives a reading of the amount of power and efficiency actually lost due to an inefficient motor.

First, overall efficiency of a well is determined by comparing the total amount of water pumped with the amount of gas or electricity it takes to pump it. Pumping depth is also a big factor. Once overall efficiency is determined, the Torque Cell is used to measure engine efficiency. This allows a farmer to determine if the problem is an inefficient pump or an inefficient motor, or both.

Several tests in Briscoe County have been run by the local Soil Conservation Service on both gas and electric wells. The results have confirmed what most farmers have suspected for many years. A declining water table has reduced most area wells to pump far less than their original potential. Yet in many cases the same pump and motor remains in use. An eight inch pump driven by a six cylinder gas motor pumping 150 gallons per minute is probably not very efficient. You still pay for the gas to run a large pump, but you get the water output of a much smaller unit.

Comparing pumping costs will be a large part of the program on Friday morning. Many wells in this area are costing farmers much more to run than they should. In some cases it would pay in the long run to go to a smaller, more efficient pumping plant.

The Field Day is hosted by the Texas A&M Extension Service and the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District. All area farmers are invited to attend.

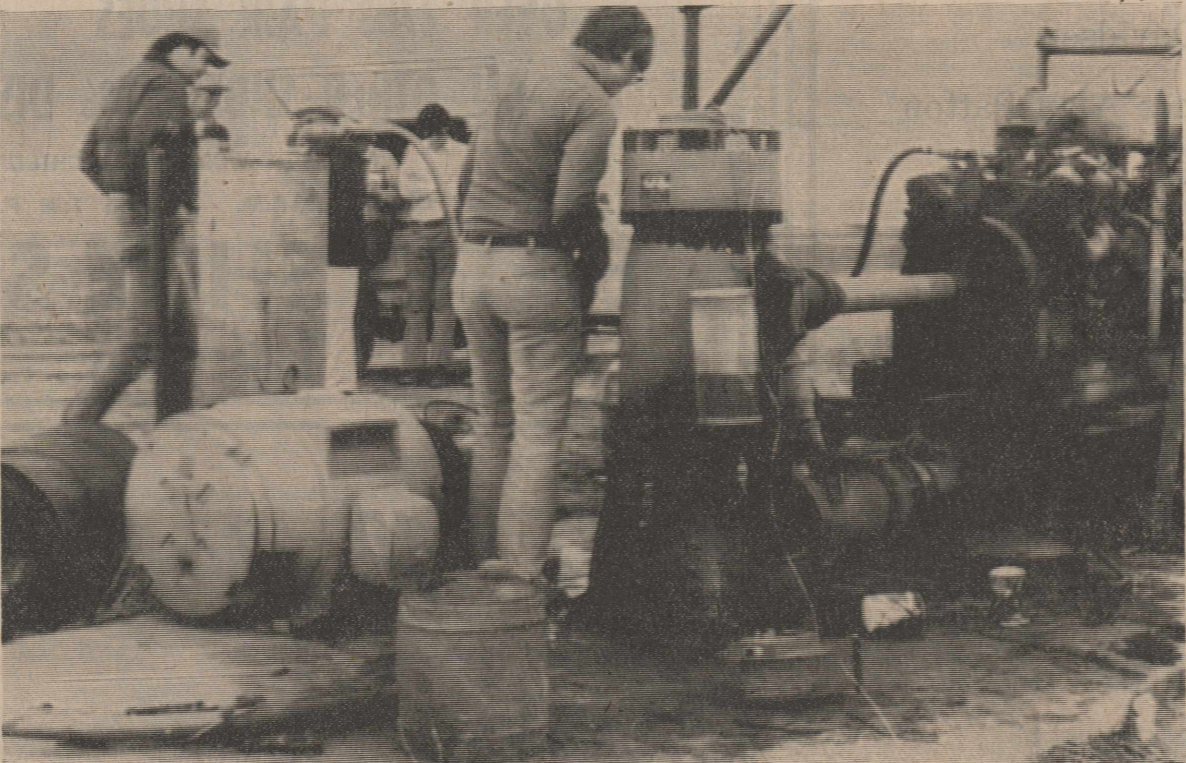

Rain in Silverton last Thursday afternoon soaked the parade participants but did not dampen the spirits of hundreds of people who gathered for the 89th Briscoe County Celebration, and all festivities took place as scheduled, including the barbecue, rodeo and dances.

The downpours of last week necessitated a change in the place where the dances were held Thursday and Friday nights. They were moved to the Hester building in downtown Silverton, where large crowds turned out both nights to dance to the music of Country Revue and the Rough Riders. Saturday

night's dance took place as scheduled at the concrete slab at Silverton Elevators, and more than 1000 gathered to listen to and dance to the music of the Maines Brothers. All three dances were sponsored by the Silverton Young Farmers and Silverton Volunteer Fire Department.

A pretty good little country parade was staged through Silverton following tricycle races in the downtown. A light shower fell as the parade was forming, and then just after it began a heavy downpour drenched all those riding floats and horses. Like trouper, they continued,

and the Progressive Homemakers, who had worked very hard on their presentation of the Old Woman Who Lived in a Shoe, won the \$75 first prize donated by First State Bank of Silverton.



**NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK OWNERS**

**BEGINNING** August 31, 1981 and continuing for six months, all livestock owners must re-register their brands and marks in the office of the County Clerk. Article 6890, V.T.C.S., requires owners of various livestock to have distinct marks and brands and to record them with the clerk of the county in which their livestock are located. Article 6899j, V.T.C.S., provides that:

Section 1. (a) In all counties each owner of livestock shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the County Clerk of the county whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) After six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect.

Section 2: All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every ten (10) years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.
