## All-Star Cast Gears Up For Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon

Celebrity greats from all realms of the entertainment world will once again take part in the fight against neuromuscular diseases when they join Jerry Lewis for the 16th annual Labor Day Telethon to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association. According to Betty Stephens, Silverton Pledge Center Coordinator, the Telethon will be carried by KFDD-TV, Channel 10 in Amarillo beginning at 8:00 p.m. Sunday, September 6, and continuing through 6:30 p.m. Monday, September 7.

Some 50 superstars will appear on the 1981 show, including Sammy Davis, Jr., Tony Bennett, Johnny Cash, Bill Cosby, Crystal Gayle, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers, Ben Vereen, Don Rickles, Pearl Bailey, Wayne Newton and Tony Orlando. The show will be broadcast live from the Space Center of Del Webb's Hotel Sahara in Las Vegas for the ninth consecutive year. Many performances will also be telecast from cities around the country such as Dallas, Nashville, New York and Atlantic City.

Jerry's anchormen during the 2 1/2-hour marathon will be Ed McMahon, David Hartman and Chad Everett. The show will be carried by some 200 "Love Network" stations in the United States as well as by stations in Canada.

"We're really putting on the Rolls Royce of gala specials this year," commented national Telethon producer Bob Considine. "There'll be something for everyone, from country music to French cancan. With apologies to Barnum and Bailey, I'd say we've got the "greatest show on earth."

The legendary soul star Smokey Robinson will host Telethon rock segments along with singer/songwriter Rick Springfield. Additional celebrities performing will be Charo, Norm Crosby, Jack Jones, B. J. Thomas, Mel Torme and impressionist Bob Anderson. Stars of NBC comedy series "Facts of Life" will be featured in a roller skating sequence, a 1981 Telethon first.

From the sports arena, World Boxing Association welter weight champion Tommy Hearns and World Boxing Commission welter weight champion Sugar Ray Leonard will appear on the Telethon just days before their scheduled fight for the undisputed welter weight championship title of the world.

"A lot of people don't know that many of our terrific Telethon stars are also Corporate Members and Vice Presidents of MDA," noted the Association's National Chairman, Jerry Lewis. "They're part of the MDA team, devoting their energies, great talents, and love to 'my kids' throughout the year." Among them are MDA Corporate Members Chad Everett and Virginia Capers; and Vice Presidents David Hartman, Pearl Bailey, Mel Torme, Larry Gatlin, Julius LaRosa and Ed McMahon.

This year's Telethon set is designed to create a night club ambience, using red as the predominant color, with highlights of blue and gold. According to Mr. Considine, the sophisticated look complements this year's up-beat performances.

## Cotton Producers To Pay Fee For Classing

The U. S. Department of Agriculture proposes to institute a users' fee for classing of producers' cotton and increase fees for other services. USDA is proposing to make the new fees and increases effective October 1, 1981. The producer users' fees will be 60 cents per bale for the classing service. Previously, this service was provided free by USDA under provisions of the Smith - Doney Act. The users' fee is required under the recently enacted Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981.

Changes in the fees for some of the most widely used services include:

The fee for classing cotton under the Cotton Standards Act would be increased from 90 cents to \$1.00 per sample.

The fee for rewriting classification memoranda would be increased from \$1.50 to \$1.80 per sheet.

The fee for a combination classification for cotton futures would be increased from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per sample.

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**NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK OWNERS**

BEGINNING August 31, 1981 and continuing for six months, all livestock owners must re-register their brands and marks in the office of the County Clerk. Article 6890, V.T.C.S., requires owners of various livestock to have distinct marks and brands and to record them with the clerk of the county in which their livestock are located. Article 6899j, V.T.C.S., provides that:

Section 1. (a) In all counties each owner of livestock shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the County Clerk of the county whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) After six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect.

Section 2: All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every ten (10) years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

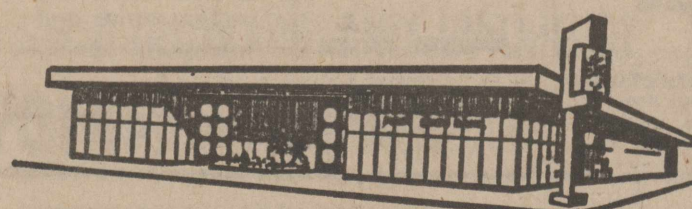

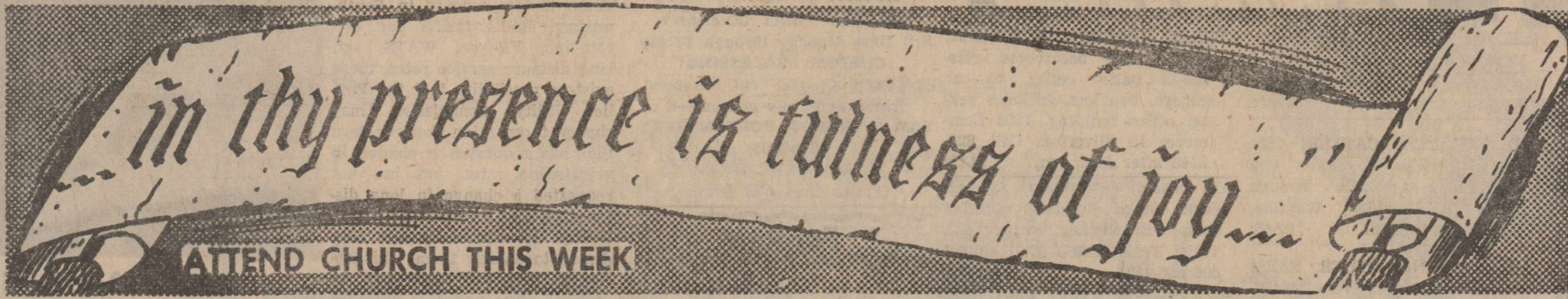

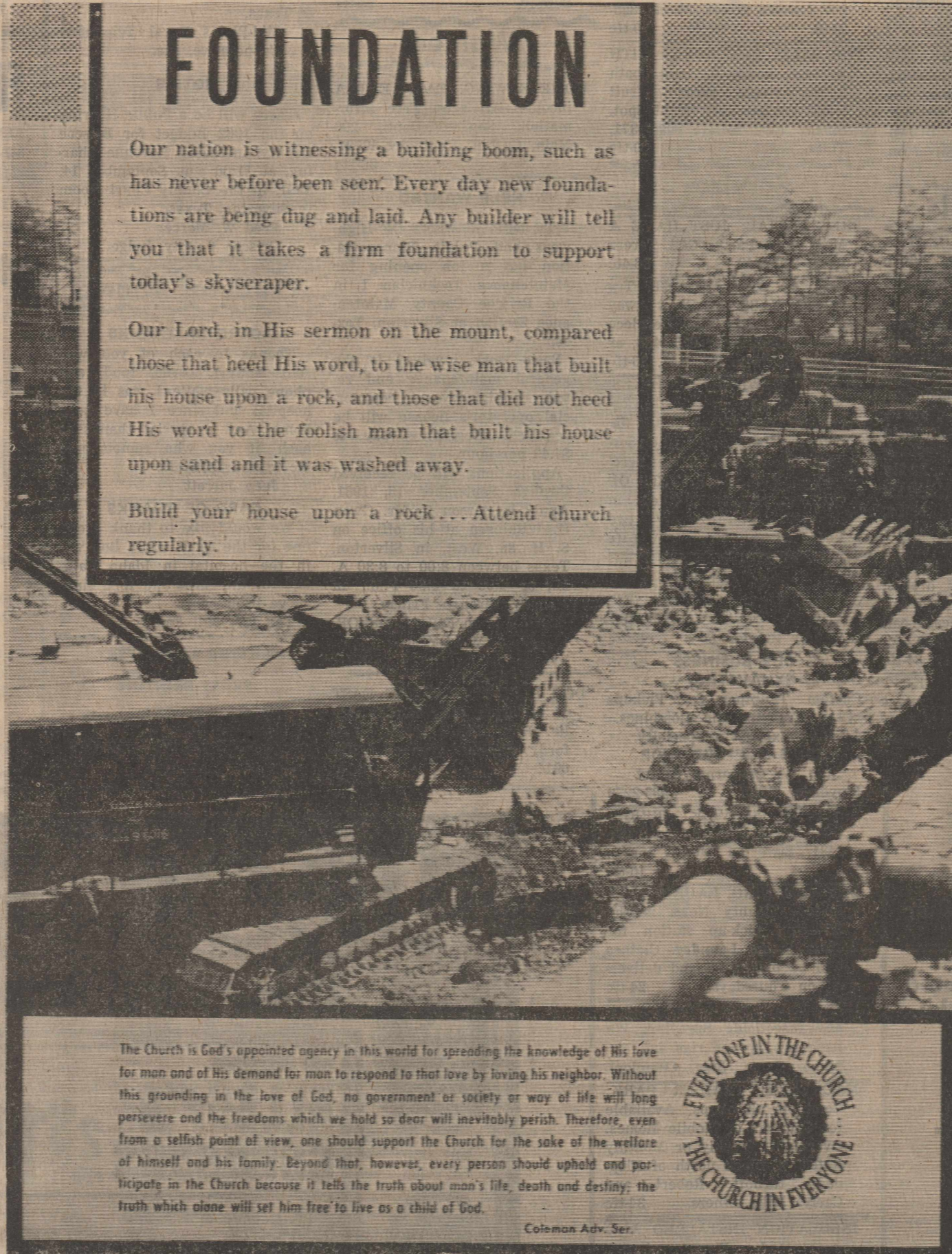
