

Staci Mayfield Joins Wayland Flying Queens

Staci Mayfield, a three-time All-District basketball player and outstanding track athlete for Silverton High School, has been added to Coach Cathy Wilson's list of basketball recruits for 1981-82 at Wayland Baptist University.

The signing of Mayfield, a 5-9 forward, completes Wilson's recruiting efforts for the Flying Queens this year. She joins Gay Hemphill of Plainview, Sandi Huddleston of Texhoma, Oklahoma and Felicia Cotton of Amarillo as newcomers to this year's team.

A fine all-around athlete, Mayfield earned All-District 2-A honors in basketball as a sophomore, junior and senior, and was Silverton High School's Most Valuable Athlete all three years as well.

She was a state track meet participant in the mile as a sophomore and junior, a regional qualifier in cross country and the discus as a junior, and a regional qualifier in the mile and state qualifier in the discus as a senior. She won both the Basketball and Track Awards at SHS in 1980-81.

In addition to her athletic accomplishments, Mayfield was involved in Future Homemakers of America including two years as an officer; Future Business Leaders of America, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and student council, was a class officer and favorite two years, and was voted Most Likely to Succeed.

The Flying Queens, under Wilson's guidance for the third season, will launch their 1981-82 campaign November 14 against Colorado in the annual Queens Basketball Clinic game at Hutcherson Center.

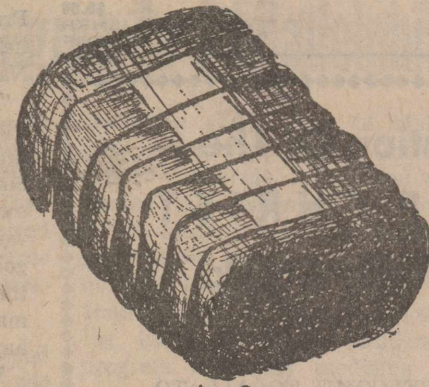
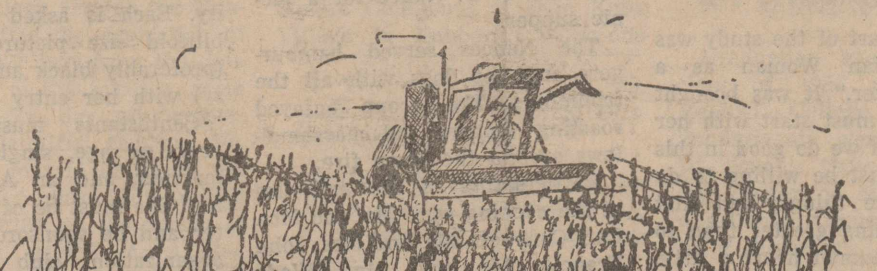

Owls Travel To Ralls Friday Night

Silverton's Owls travel to Ralls Friday night to take on the Jack-rabbits after dropping their season opener 20-6 to Claude. The Rabbits are also winless, having lost their opener to Lubbock Cooper, 7-6. Game time is 8:00 p.m.

A large crowd was on hand Friday night at Owl Field to see the Owls play a better game against the Mustangs than the score indicates. Silverton was stopped twice inside the 10-yard line in the third quarter, which greatly diminished the team's chances for a come-from-behind victory.

Claude turned a fumble recovery on the Silverton five-yard line into the game's first touchdown. Shane Reagan had stopped a Claude drive with a pass interception at the Owl 12, but the first offensive play following the pickoff gave the ball right back to the visitors.

Silverton came right back six minutes later when Reagan passed 36 yards to Casey Bean for six points. The PAT kick was blocked, leaving SHS trailing 7-6.

Claude extended its lead in the second quarter on a pass and run play.

The third quarter found Silverton twice inside the Mustang 10, but neither effort resulted in points. On the first possession of the second half, the Owls drove to the OHS four, but fumbled the ball away on first down. Shortly thereafter, Silverton took over at the Claude 35 after an errant punt snap. The Owls drove to the seven, but three plays later, after a penalty and a missed handoff, faced fourth and 23 and were unable to score.

Claude scored its final touchdown with 2:22 remaining in the fourth quarter on a four-yard run. Eric Patton blocked the PAT kick.

"We've got a good crew in the line but we didn't execute too well offensively in some critical situations," commented Coach Joe Stubblefield. "And we've got a long way to go on defense."

Reagan was the offensive leader for Silverton, rushing 16 times for 104 yards and passing for 67 yards more.

Jim Estes was the leading tackler with 18 to his credit.

When the film of the game was graded, Eric Patton was the highest grading lineman with 95%. Ernest Rodriguez was the highest grading back with 70%.

Rain Not Especially Welcomed By Farmers

Longtime residents of this area of Texas often have been quoted as saying, "You never turn down a good rain or a bull calf because you never seem to get enough of either one."

Despite the high cost of feed compared to less than exceptional prices for beef, the bovine part of that proverb still holds true. However, after one of the wettest Augusts in recent years, some farmers are rethinking the first half of that saying.

Rain is always beneficial, but it wasn't exactly timed as most farmers would like to see it. The pasture grass is in fantastic condition and is seeding well. Some of the later-planted dryland crops are doing very well, but the earlier-planted irrigated ones may be in trouble. The haygrazers planted recently seem to be doing very well, and should provide a lot of bundles for winter feed. But it is time to harvest the corn, it is too wet to harvest, and the corn is beginning to go down.

The additional moisture helps maintain the subsurface moisture levels (which will be good for the winter wheat prospects), but the continued wet-cool weather carries a very real potential of seriously damaging the region's cotton crop by not allowing the cotton bolls to fully mature. On top of the August moisture, 3.38 inches, Silverton during the first week of September has received 1.50 inches more rain. This brings the rainfall figure for 1981 to 13.00 inches. These are the official rainfall figures as recorded for Silverton by Fred Strange.

According to the monthly summary by the National Weather Service, the weather across the Plains during the month of August was much wetter than normal with below average temperatures, and the Silverton area was no exception.

Throughout the region, temperatures have averaged two degrees below normal. Precipitation averaged almost five inches above normal at Tulla.

REPORT FROM LAKE MACKENZIE

The water level at Lake Mackenzie has risen approximately five feet, and the lake depth is now 98 feet, several feet lower than its 101 foot maximum depth reached three years ago. There are about 40 stock dams on the watershed, according to Mackenzie Lake Manager Neil Taylor, and these reduce the amount of runoff the lake catches.

Total rainfall at the lake over the weekend amounted to 1.20 inches. Most of the rain, with the exception of .60 of an inch which fell at the lake on Thursday night of last week.

Parking areas at both the boat ramps have been completed, with all-weather blacktop finishes on both. The ground has been leveled and roads built to the location of a group picnic pavillion which will be located near the public restrooms and the park on the south side of the lake. This will be a 24x48 covered area with barbecue grill and picnic tables. The pavillion will be lighted and water will be piped to the location. The prefabricated cover is expected to be received soon and will be installed by lake personnel.

Tulla and Lockney Rotary Clubs are planning to do some more work on the park at the lake, with playground equipment and picnic tables to be added. More trees also are to be planted.

The lake personnel soon will start building new picnic tables with barbecue grills at each.

More rock is to be placed on North Mackenzie Road and eventually the roads in Coronado Shores will be rocked. More work is planned on the lake entrance.

Engineers are busy on specifications, and the Authority soon will be ready to advertise for bids on the construction of the treatment plant and water lines. Surveyors will be at work on completion of the project and preliminary drawings are expected to be presented to the Mackenzie board of directors soon.

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA
Resolución Conjunta No. 8 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que permita a la legislación autorizar a ciudades, pueblos y otras entidades fiscales conceder exenciones de impuestos por avalúo en una área no productiva, subdesarrollada o deteriorada para estimular su desarrollo. La enmienda también permitiría a la legislación autorizar a una ciudad o a un pueblo emitir bonos o vales para financiar este desarrollo y empujar futuros aumentos en los ingresos de impuestos por avalúo sobre la propiedad en dichas áreas para pagar estos bonos o vales.

PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA

La solicitud para el título se tiene que hacer dentro de cinco años a partir de la aprobación de la enmienda. El terreno tiene que ser terreno de las escuelas públicas, libres, medido, y no previamente titulado. La persona tiene que tener una escritura del terreno apropiadamente registrada, que adquirió sin saber del defecto de título y que él y sus antepasados interesados han tenido por lo menos durante 50 años. La persona y sus antepasados interesados tienen que haber reclamado el terreno continuamente y pagado los impuestos por lo menos durante 50 años.

Esta enmienda no se aplica a terreno de playa, a terreno sumergido ni a islas. Un solicitante no puede usar esta provisión.

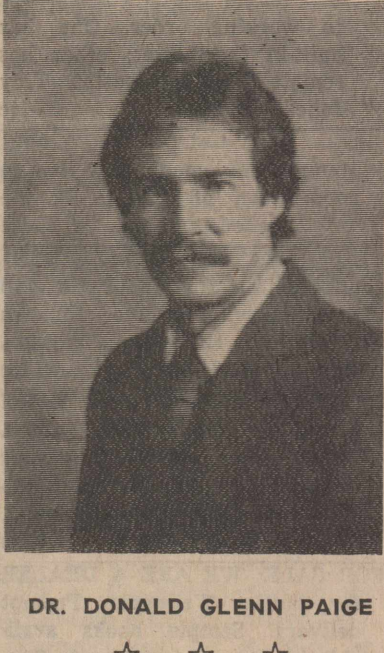

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSICION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment that would authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSICION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years. This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSICION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSICION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes. The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unused, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unused, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSICION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exemption is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt. The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSICION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

PROPOSICION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."
