Analyses showed that: -A reserve program might lead to stringent acreage controls in the future.

—Despite acreage reduction, excessive supplies could still overhang the market. -When the U.S. government

acquired cotton supplies from programs in the 1960's, it ultimately had to sell cotton in direct competition with producers.

-Although a reserve might increase cotton prices for a short time, it would also increase production, expand stocks and lower domestic and export use.

"We are working hard to ex-

pand foreign markets for U.S. cotton, and a reserve program would jeopardize these efforts," said Block. "Because markets lost to foreign competition are hard to regain, the idea of a cotton reserve seems to have little support in most sectors of the cotton belt. In fact, the idea of a cotton reserve faces increasing opposition from farm organizations and the cotton industry."





SPS Announces **Feedlot Survey**

Sam Thomas, manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company, Amarillo, announced that fed cattle numbers were down significantly for 1981 in the Company service area.

Southwestern's 45,000 squaremile service area produced 4,045,004 fed cattle during 1981, which was 9% below 1980. This 1981 figure is the lowest number since 1975 when only 3.3 million were fed. Comparable to the 1981 count is the 4 million-plus produced in 1974.

Last year's 4,045,004 head represents a farm sale value exceeding 2.7 billion dollars. Area business benefitted by 9.7 billion dollars even though the equity loss to area feeders exceeded 121 million dollars, Thomas reported. Feed lots surveyed continue

"Behold, He restrains the waters, and they dry up; and He sends them out, and they inundate the earth" (Job 12:15, NASV). He "gives rains and fruitful seasons, filling . . hearts with food and gladness"

(Acts 14:17). He "calleth for the waters of the sea, and poureth them out upon the face of the earth" (Amos 4:8). " . . . he causeth the vapors to ascend from the ends of the earth; he maketh lightnings for the rain" (Jer. 10:13: Psa. 135:7).

Meterology is the human science that deals with the atmosphere and its phenomena, including weather and climate. It appears God can restrain, send out, and give fruitful seasons. He gives us the capability of "learning nature." Thus we can learn to adapt more intelligently to weather and other earth

to decline in number, as do the combined feedlot capacity, but the decline is not significant. The one-time feedlot capacity was 2,543,200 at the end of 1981, compared to 2,638,100 in 1980.

BRISCOE COUNTY NEWS

The combined number of cattle slaughtered by packing plants in the SPS service area in 1981 was 4,004,094, representing an increase of 20,000 head above 1980. Packing plant sales produced gross sales valued at 2.7 billion dollars. A further 10 billion dollars is contributed to the area economy once the economic multiplier is applied. Area business realized a total of 19 billion dollars when combining the input of the packing and feedlot industries, Thomas said.

At the time the survey was completed in January 1982, the number of cattle on feed was 59% of capacity. According to Thomas, this figure should be

much higher at this time. The SPS annual Fed Cattle Survey has been compiled since 1966. It is the oldest continuous record of cattle feeding in the multi-state area served by the


