Mrs. Blackwell Dies In Tulia Hospital

Blanche S. Blackwell, 90, long-time resident of Briscoe County and Silverton, died May 13 at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia after a short illness.

She was born in Falls County March 26, 1892, and moved to Kress in 1905. On November 17, 1915 she married Champ Clark Blackwell in Plainview, and they resided in the Silverton area for the next 25 years. Mr. Blackwell passed away in 1964.

Mrs. Blackwell finished high school in Tulia and went on to attend the Teachers College in Canyon where she was awarded a teaching certificate in 1913. She taught public school and Sunday school for many years. She wrote stories, poems and articles, some of which were published. She was a charter member of the Silverton 1925 Study Club.

Mrs. Blackwell began oil painting in her late seventies, a hobby she enjoyed until shortly before her death.

Survivors are two daughters, Delise Kronenberger of Green Valley, Arizona and Daphne McGavock of Silverton; a sister, Mattie Smith of Springfield, Missouri; three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Services for Mrs. Blackwell were conducted Saturday, May 15, in Tulia and she rests in Rose Hill Cemetery at Tulia beside her late husband.

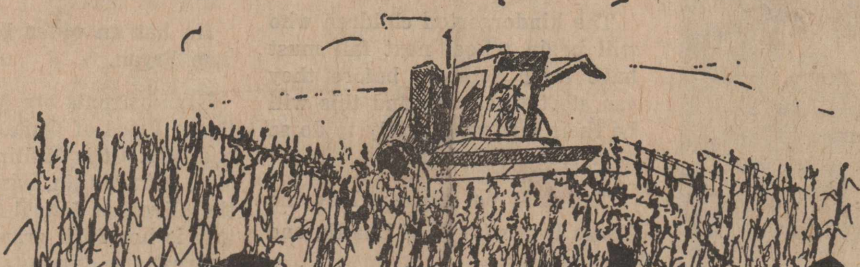
Mrs. Bradley, a former resident of Silverton, died Friday at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia.

Area Has Been "Under The Gun" Two Days This Week

The Silverton area has been "under the gun" two days this week, with tornadoes traveling on the ground and funnels dropping out of the clouds on Sunday and again on Monday.

Damage was reported at the Johnnie Burson ranch Sunday afternoon, when a tornado passed between the homes of Johnnie Burson and Jimmy Burson. Pasture fences were broken and a utility pole downed. All barns were damaged, and a fairly new metal barn was totaled and will have to be rebuilt.

Horse stalls were unroofed, all out-buildings were damaged, an apartment was unroofed, and a chicken house is gone. The TV antenna was blown down and part of the shingles were blown off the house.

Debris was scattered in the fields and will have to be removed before farming operations can continue.

Several hundred sacks of cake were located in one of the barns, and the first thing Monday morning the fences were repaired and work was begun to get the cake moved before it was ruined by the weather.

Tuesday of last week, the roof was blown off a shed and horse stall, and carpenters had been working on repairing the roof. The carpenters were amazed Monday morning when they came to work and found that they had to start all over again.

During the tornado activity at Burson's Sunday, only .15 of an inch of rain fell. It was accompanied by some golfball-size hail.

More hail fell there Monday night, along with 1.10 inches of rain.

Flash flood warnings were put out for Swisher County at mid-evening Monday, and water was reported to be over the roads in numerous places in the Love community and north of Tulia. Hail reportedly piled up so deep on Highway 87 north of Tulia that cars were hitting high-center on it. Hail also piled up in the area near the end of the Love road and out toward Lake Mackenzie where a tornado traveled on the ground for several minutes before raising back into the clouds and drifting in an almost horizontal position before disappearing. The tornado was said to have passed about 100 yards from the Doug Forbes home, and near the Moe Eddleman, Jerry Millhollon, Mikel Griffin and Pascal Garrison homes.

"We went to the cellar three times," said Mrs. Doug Forbes, who also told the News that 2½ inches of rain accompanied the storm Monday and another three inches fell at their place Tuesday of last week. "Cattle in the pasture were just being blown aside by the tornado," Mrs. Forbes added. "They appeared to be running alongside it."

The tornado, which apparently was first noticed by weather observers with the Silverton Fire Department as a swirl of dust on the ground in the area of Mrs. Coleman Garrison's pasture, was seen from Silverton as a pencil-slim funnel when it first came out of the cloud, but when it began traveling on the ground the size of the funnel tripled or quadrupled. Mrs. Forbes said it appeared "very large" to her family.

The tornado proceeded northwest from the Forbes place, past the Pascal Garrison's and toward Lake Mackenzie where only .30 of an inch of rain fell. Lake Manager Neil Taylor said that when he first began watching it, it appeared to be right over the Forbes' house, and that it came within about a mile of the lake.

"We didn't ever see that tornado," said Mrs. Pascal Garrison, "because we were watching one to the east." The one they saw was apparently near the Shafe Weaver home northeast of Silverton.

"I had been out in the yard watching," said Mrs. Shafe Weaver. "When it started raining and hailing I went inside. Then Dean Burson called and told me she could see a funnel right over our house." Mrs. Weaver said she saw funnels, but didn't see any of them touch the ground. Pea to marble-size hail accompanied .80 of an inch of rain there. "The hail was mushy or crumbly," Mrs. Weaver added, saying that it didn't seem to damage anything in her yard.

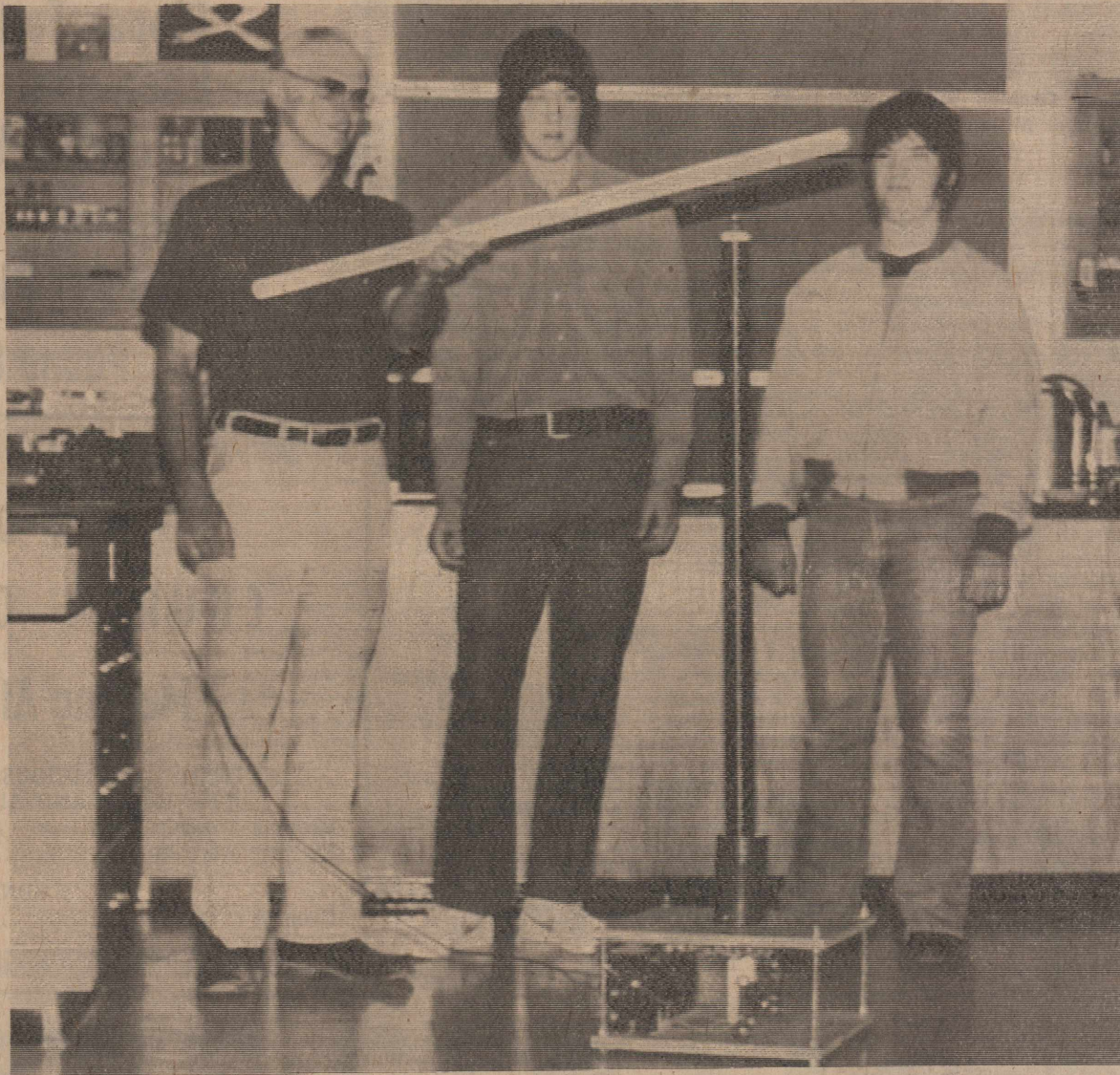
The first funnel was spotted at about 7:30 p.m. It was a large white one located north of Silverton, and went back into the clouds without ever touching the ground.

Another funnel was sighted southwest of Silverton near the Bennie Reagan home, but it is not known whether this one ever touched the ground.

Another front was expected to move through the area at mid-week, and it could bring renewed severe thunderstorm activity.

Rainfall in Silverton was .65 of an inch Monday with some hail.

State Park Opened For Oil And Gas Exploration Leasing

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission recently voted to authorize the leasing of Caprock Canyons State Park in Briscoe County for oil and gas exploration.

The commission's action cleared the way for the General Land Office to accept sealed bids on leasing the 14,000-acre park.

Under a recommendation by the Parks and Wildlife Department staff, any company that intends to drill for oil or gas under the park land must locate its drilling rig outside the park boundaries and "slant drill" under the property.

No drilling rigs would be located in the park itself, said a Parks and Wildlife spokesman.

The land could be included in the next lease sale of the land office.

Mayfield Sets New Missouri Valley Discus Record

Record setting performances by Dayne Mayfield and Earl Wilson sparked West Texas State University to a solid third-place finish at the Missouri Valley Conference outdoor track and field championships which ended in Wichita, Kansas last Saturday.

Mayfield, a fifth-year senior from Silverton, threw the discus 193'8" to smash the nine-year-old meet record of 181'9½" set by Tyler Higgins of Memphis State.

His winning effort set a West Texas State school discus record (breaking the former mark of 183'2" set in 1973 by Dennis Briggs) and qualified him for the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships scheduled June 1-5 in Provo, Utah. Mayfield needed 188'6" to reach the NCAA qualifying mark and did it with several feet to spare.

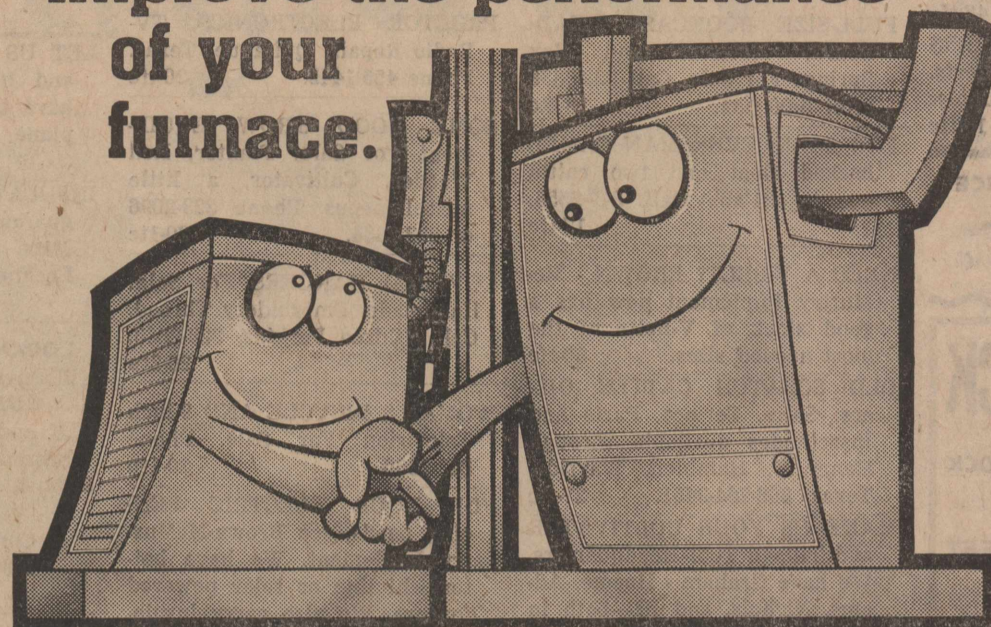

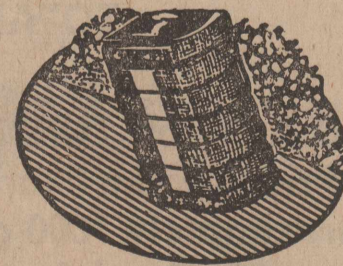
