The Silverton area has been More hail fell there Monday

Flash flood warnings were put out for Swisher County at midevening Monday, and water was reported to be over the roads in numerous places in the Love community and north of Tulia. Hail reportedly piled up so deep on Highway 87 north of Tulia that cars were hitting high-center on it. Hail also piled up in the area near the end of the Love road and out toward Lake Mackenzie where a tornado traveled on the ground for several minutes before raising back into the clouds and drifting in an almosthorizontal position before disappearing. The tornado was said to have passed about 100 yards from the Doug Forbes home, and near the Moe Eddleman, Jerry Millhollon, Mikel Griffin and Pascal Garrison homes.

"We went to the cellar three times," said Mrs. Doug Forbes, who also told the News that 21/2 inches of rain accompanied the storm Monday and another three inches fell at their place Tuesday of last week. "Cattle in the pasture were just being blown aside by the tornado," Mrs. Forbes added. "They appeared to be running alongside it."

The tornado, which apparently was first noticed by weather observers with the Silverton Fire Department as a swirl of dust on the ground in the area of Mrs. Coleman Garrison's pasture, was from Silverton as a pencilslim funnel when it first came out of the cloud, but when it began traveling on the ground the size of the funnel tripled or quadrupled. Mrs. Forbes said it appeared "very large" to her family.

The tornado proceeded northwest from the Forbes place, past the Pascal Garrison's and toward Lake Mackenzie where only .30 of an inch of rain fell. Lake Manager Neil Taylor said that when he first began watching it, it appeared to be right over the Forbes' house, and that it came

within about a mile of the lake. "We didn't ever see that tornado," said Mrs. Pascal Garrison, "because we were watching one to the east." The one they saw was apparently near the Shafe Weaver home northeast of Silver-

"I had been out in the yard watching," said Mrs. Shafe Weaver. "When it started raining and hailing I went inside. Then Dean Burson called and told me she could see a funnel right over our house." Mrs. Weaver said she saw funnels, but didn't see any of them touch the ground. Peato marble-size hail accompanied .80 of an inch of rain there. "The hail was mushy or crumbly," Mrs. Weaver added, saying that it didn't seem to damage any-

thing in her yard. The first funnel was spotted at about 7:30 p.m. It was a large white one located north of Silverton, and went back into the clouds without ever touching the ground.

Another funnel was sighted southwest of Silverton near the Bennie Reagan home, but it is not known whether this one ever touched the ground.

Another front was expected to move through the area at midweek, and it could bring renewed severe thunderstorm activity.

Rainfall in Silverton was .65 of an inch Monday with some hail.

Mayfield, a fifth-year senior from Silverton, threw the discus 193'8" to smash the nine-year-old meet record of 181'91/2" set by Tyler Higgins of Memphis State.

His winning effort set a West Texas State school discus record (breaking the former mark of 183'2" set in 1973 by Dennis Briggs) and qualified him for the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships scheduled June 1-5 in Provo, Utah. This attitude is the reason that U.S. farmers outproduce farmers in other nations. They try to give the land the conservation treatment it needs. However, there is some erosion on each farm every year.

Erosion is measured in tons per acre. One ton of soil covering one square acre would be thinner than a dime. The Soil Conservation Service has developed a method of calculating the ments.

Nearly every successful farmer expected soil loss for each crop consideration. The crops grown, rainfall, tillage practices, soil types, and management practices are considered. SCS feels that wind and water erosion losses on most soils should be less than five tons per acre per year. This loss would be hard to see as it occurs at various times during the year.

SCS will help any farmer to check his expected erosion loss and to evaluate alternative treat-

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


