Mrs. Kate Price Buried Monday

Mrs. Kate Ross Price, 95, died at noon Friday at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. Floyd (Billie) Ehresman, in Plainview where she had been residing.

Services were conducted at 11:00 a.m. Monday at Wood-Dunning Colonial Chapel. Officiating were Dean Brookshire, minister of the Ninth and Columbia Church of Christ in Plainview and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ.

Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park, with arrangements directed by Wood - Dunning Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were nephews, Carl Bomar, Wayne McMurtry, Mikel D. Griffin, Jack Sutton, Bobby Crass and Stanley Burleson.

Born Kate Burleson on February 15, 1887, in Llano County, she moved to Briscoe County at the age of six in a covered wagon with her parents. She was reared in Briscoe County and married W. C. Price in Silverton on March 6, 1907.

After her marriage, Mrs. Price lived in Tullia, where Mr. Price helped build the Tullia Hotel. Two years later, they moved to Lubbock where they lived about a year before returning to Briscoe County.

Mrs. Price moved to Floyd County in 1945 and to Plainview in 1954.

Mr. Price died October 19, 1967.

Mrs. Price was a member of the Ninth and Columbia Church of Christ.

Survivors include two brothers, Edwin Crass of Plainview and Jim Burleson of Ruidoso, New Mexico; her granddaughter; four great-granddaughters, Mrs. Mary Kjellstrom of Atlanta, Georgia, Mrs. Rebecca Eable of Houston, Mrs. Anita Wright of Tulsa, Oklahoma and Mitzi Ehresman of Plainview; three great-grandsons, Willie Nelson of Houston, Bert and Roy Ehresman of Plainview; six great-grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Price was a sister of the late Dorn McMurtry. She was the aunt of Roberta Griffin, Dorothy Bomar and Teresa Sutton, all of Silverton.

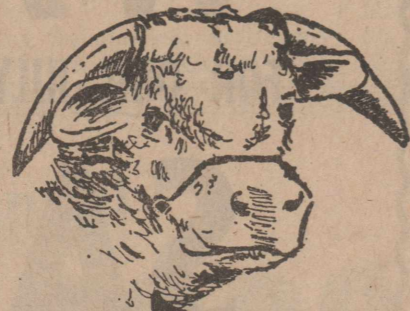
Burial arrangements were directed by Wallace Funeral Home of Tullia.

Weather Inflicts Further Damage on County's Crops

The weather has continued to inflict heavy damage on crops, which were already in trouble in the Plains area of Briscoe County due to having had to be replanted and being late, the heavy rains and cool temperatures.

Corn, which can normally recover from having its leaves split, was shattered and broken last week in the area near the Briscoe Co-op Gin.

It has been too wet and too cool for growing cotton, and much of the cotton that wasn't destroyed by hail has turned yellow and died in the fields. It is doubtful that the cotton that has missed the hail can reach a very successful harvest in the fall, because many observers believe that there will be an early frost and most of the crops are late.

As one farmer put it, "Briscoe County won't be adding to the cotton surplus this year."

Fields of wheat, which had looked pretty good, were either flattened by the hail or were left standing in water. One farmer reported beginning cutting his wheat at 3:00 in the afternoon and cutting until 8:00 that night, and not filling the truck.

Many have lost their vegetable gardens.

Briscoe County is not alone, because there have been terrible damaging hails in Abernathy, Slaton, Hockley County and other places on the South Plains. In Abernathy it looks like everyone is reroofing at the present time.

The City of Silverton has missed the damaging hail, so has been spared that property loss.

A very damaging hailstorm slashed across the northwest part of Briscoe County last Thursday night, doing a lot of property damage. Mrs. Pascal Garrison told the Briscoe County News that this would be the first year that they weren't able to cut enough wheat to get back their seed. They had windows knocked out at their house and are going to have to reroof, even though the hail that fell there wasn't the largest reported. Heavy rains have continued to fall there and in the area of the Moe Eddleman, Jerry Millhollon and Doug Forbes homes.

Rains had been very light on the north side of the Tule Canyon until the past two weeks. At the Eugene Malone farm-ranch, livestock water tanks hadn't been full until last week, when everything filled to overflowing. At the intersection of Highway 207 and FM 146 there is a lake on every side—filled to the brim.

Just over into Swisher County there are fields that are just slick, having had so much rain wash across them that no evidence of listing or crops remains. Others are simply under water.

At the Neil Taylor home at Lake Mackenzie, heavy damage was done by hailstones that were as large as softballs and left large dents in vehicles, tree bark and the ground, as well as just about everything else they hit. Windshields were smashed. All the windows on the north side of their house, garage and the Lake Mackenzie office were broken, and the roofs were damaged.

At Cactus Cove, the windows were broken on the north side and hailstones left holes in the roof of the mobile home in which Mr. and Mrs. Steve Cole live. One family visiting at the lake had all the windows broken in one side of the van in which they were camping, and glass was

scattered all over the inside of the van. Just about every home at Coronado Shores received broken windows and roof damage. Dwin Davis, who lives at the lake, said the storm came from the northeast.

Two and one-half inches of rain and funnel sightings accompanied Thursday night's storm. Another 1.20 inches of rain fell in the area of the lake Saturday and .30 Tuesday, and this has raised the lake depth to 104+ feet, the highest by a couple of feet that the water level has ever been.

Rainfall in Silverton has amounted to 7.15 inches so far during June, with 2.10 of that fall-

ing during the past week, according to the official records kept by Fred A. Strange. This brings the rainfall to date in 1982 to 15.68 inches. All kinds of storm warnings had been issued for the area Wednesday morning when this was being written.

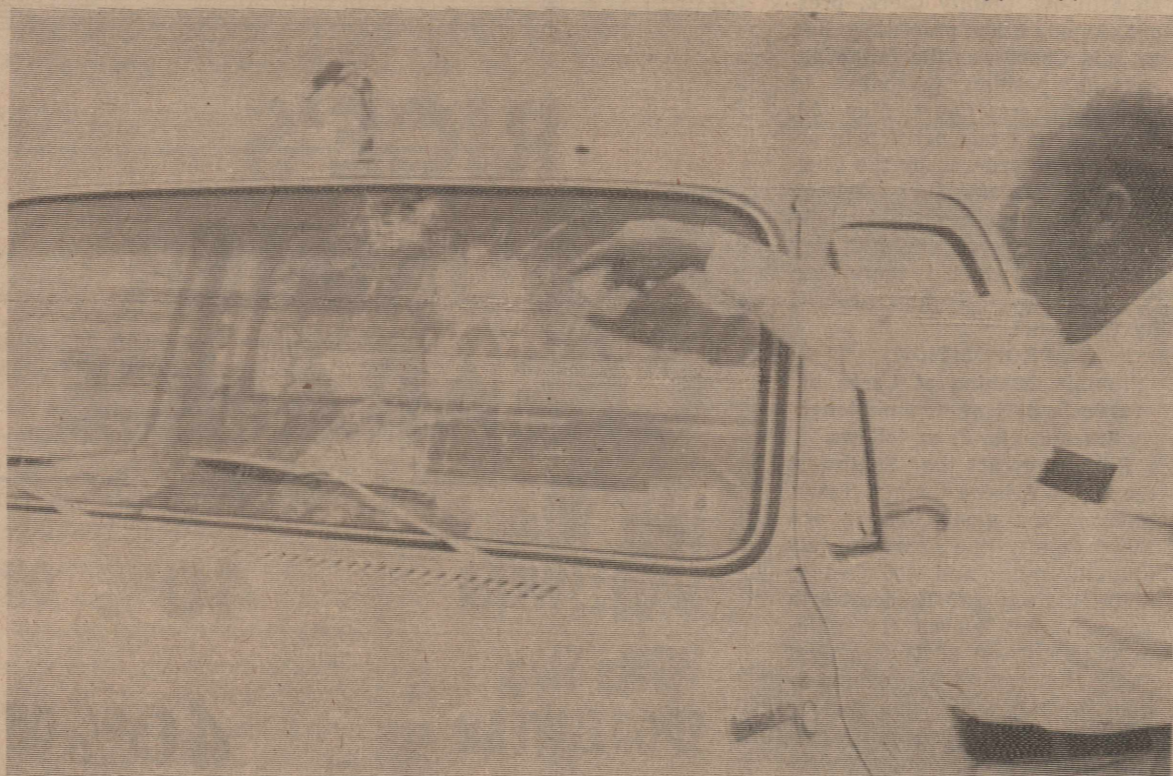
Warmer temperatures have prevailed this week along with the continuing threat of thunderstorms. Weather forecasters just don't seem to know when a general drying trend can be expected.

A team of government officials, including Congressman Kent Hance and the deputy secretary of agriculture have been spending this week visiting various

areas to survey crop conditions. It may be that a disaster program will be implemented to assist farmers.

In contrast to the woes of the row-crop farmers are the ranchers who can point with pride to their lush green pastures and brimming full stock tanks. Fat cows and calves are enjoying a leisurely life.

DPS Estimating Holiday Deaths

The Department of Public Safety today estimated that as many as 47 persons could die in traffic accidents during this July 4th weekend unless drivers are exceptionally careful.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the risk of traffic accidents will increase during the 78-hour holiday period as more drivers take to the streets and highways for the holiday.

"As in many weekend traffic accidents, alcohol, excessive speed, and failure to use seat belts are the major contributing factors in the traffic deaths," he said.

DPS statistics show that 63 persons were killed during the last Fourth of July holiday and 25 of those fatalities resulted from accidents in which driving while intoxicated was a factor. "We know that drinking may have been involved in more of the traffic deaths, but since state law does not require blood alcohol samples from traffic victims, we are uncertain how many more of the deaths may have involved drivers impaired by alcohol," Adams noted. "Additionally, 59 persons were seriously injured during the last holiday in traffic accidents."

The DPS director said additional troopers would be assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic are expected.

"Our troopers are working during this holiday period to assist travelers and to watch closely for drivers who may have had too much to drink or who insist upon exceeding the speed limits," he said.

The DPS says many municipal police and county sheriffs' offices will also work local traffic safety programs during the holiday period.

The DPS Operation Motorcade counting period begins at 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 2, and continues through midnight Monday, July 5. The Department will tabulate city and highway traffic fatalities and release totals three times daily at 10:00 a.m., 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. The first report will be made at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, July 3.

Six - Hour Graduate Level Program Offered

The Political Science Department at West Texas State University has received a grant from the Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding to conduct a special summer program which will deal with the free enterprise system.


This six-hour, graduate level program, designed mainly for social studies teachers, will be offered during the 1982 second summer term. There are approximately 30 scholarships to be awarded. Those receiving the scholarships will be able to enroll for six graduate hours, with the scholarship providing free tuition, fees, books, and, in some cases, free university housing.

The two courses making up this program are expected to be stimulating and beneficial. "Political Systems and Capitalism" (POSC55912-1) and "American Government and the Free Enterprise System" (POSC55991-1) will both be offered in the afternoon, with the latter beginning at 1:00. For the convenience of participating teachers, the courses will be offered on an accelerated basis. The entire program will last only about three and a half weeks. The program will begin on July 9 and ends August 4.

To apply for a scholarship, write Dr. Roy E. Thoman, director, TEBEU Summer Scholarship Program, c/o Political Science Department, Old Main Building, West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas 79016. You should arrange to have an official transcript of your college credits sent to Dr. Thoman also. The deadline for making application is July 8. Although it is preferred that students take both courses, some three-hour scholarships will be awarded.

Those awarded six-hour scholarships will be required to send a \$25 registration fee, and those awarded three-hour scholarships will be required to send a \$15 registration fee. (Checks are to be made to WTSU-POSC: Free Enterprise.)

PETITION FOR SPECIAL ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS BRISCOE COUNTY

On this the 10th day of May 1982 the Commissioners Court of Briscoe convened in regular session in the Courthouse in Silverton, Texas with the following members present: Fred W. Mercer, County Judge; Shafe Weaver, Commissioner, Precinct 1; Beryl Long, Commissioner, Precinct 3; Bryant Eddleman, Commissioner, Precinct 4; Jack Chandler, Commissioner, Precinct 2, was absent. Bess McWilliams, County Clerk, being present. Among other proceedings had by said Court was the following: Heretofore, to-wit, on the 10th day of May 1982 a petition was presented to the Commissioners Court of Briscoe County, Texas duly signed by 15 freeholders and qualified voters residing in a portion of election Precinct No. 3, for the purpose to prohibit the running at large of cattle in part of Commissioners Precinct No. 3, Briscoe County, Texas.

In compliance with Section 143.002 Vernons Texas Codes Annotated (Volume No. 2 Agriculture) action on petition will take place at the next Regular Session of the Commissioners Court.

ORDER FOR SPECIAL ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS BRISCOE COUNTY

On the 14th day of June 1982, the Commissioners Court of Briscoe County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof at the Courthouse in Silverton, Texas with the following members of the Court, to-wit: Fred W. Beginning at the Southwest Corner of Briscoe County, Texas, Thence East along Briscoe and Floyd County line approximately nine (9) miles and 400 feet to State Highway 207 Thence North approximately eleven (11) miles to State Highway 86 Thence West along Highway 86 approximately nine (9) miles and 400 feet to the Briscoe and Swisher County line Thence South along the Briscoe - Swisher County line approximately eleven and one-third (11 1/3) miles to the point of beginning; this includes all land within above described boundaries. Said election shall be held at the office of the Briscoe County Co-op Gin located in Commissioners Precinct No. 3. Judge for said election shall be C. L. Sutton, appointed by the Court.

Absentee Voting for said election shall be conducted by County Clerk and said County Clerk shall conduct absentee voting and keep her office open for absentee voting as follows:

Beginning the 4th day after the second publication of the order and continuing through the day immediately preceding the day of the election.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper published in said County. The dates of publication shall be June 24, 1982, July 1, 1982, July 8, 1982 and July 15, 1982. The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Therefore the question being called for the following members of the Court voted aye: Shafe Weaver, Jack Chandler, Beryl Long and Bryant Eddleman, and the following members voted no: none. Passed and adopted this the 14th day of June 1982. Fred W. 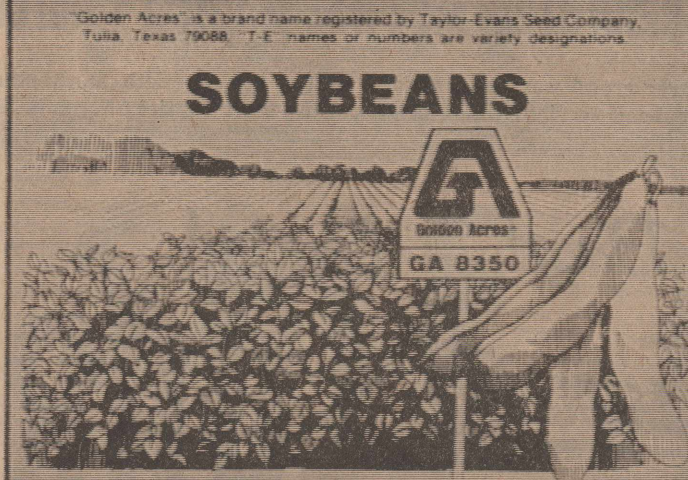
