We can't keep from wishing that someone had put some soundads on the islands so people could see them in a natural-type environment. So many never see them. It's been quite a while now since we've seen any of them. For a while we saw them often along the canyon rim in Tule Canyon, but as far as I can tell, they haven't come to that grazing place for the past two summers.

Stepson of Former Resident Dies Of Injuries

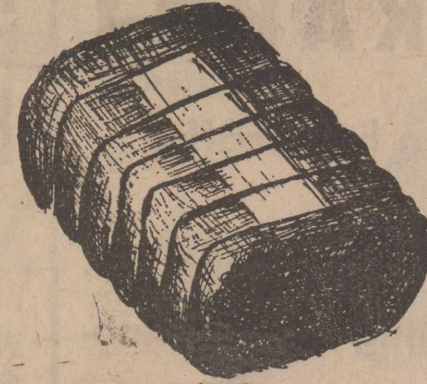

Stock Law Election To Be Held Saturday In Precinct 3

There will be a stock law election in Briscoe County Commissioner's Precinct 3 Saturday, July 17, which, if approved by the voters, will prohibit cattle from running at large in that portion of the county.

Absentee voting will continue through Friday in the office of Briscoe County Clerk Bess McWilliams.

According to County Judge Fred Mercer, this is probably the first stock law election for cattle ever held in Briscoe County. He recalls that in years past there

was an election concerning hogs. All of Briscoe County is presently open range.

Election judge will be Jack Sutton, and the polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the Briscoe Co-op Gin.

Those eligible to vote in this election are the property owners who are regularly qualified voters and who live in Briscoe County Precinct 3 west of Highway 207. Those residents of Commissioner's Precinct 3 who live inside the city limits of Silverton are not eligible to vote.

Low Prices Blocked Benefits From High Cotton Production in 1981

All time highs were set in 1981 for cotton acreage planted, acres harvested and bales produced in the 25 counties represented by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. But low prices blocked benefits that producers might otherwise have enjoyed.

In 1982 records of another kind are toppling. The largest acreage destroyed by a single hail-storm occurred on Friday, June 18, when something like 500,000 acres were battered almost beyond recognition and certainly beyond recovery. Losses before and after that debacle, the result of other hail storms, wind, disease and flooding, have now brought the area's total loss to another single-year record of perhaps 2.5 million acres or more. That's over 62% of the estimated four million acres planted, and the previous record acreage abandonment for an entire season on the Plains was 17.3% in 1974.

And without a drastic change in weather patterns and substantial outside financial help, at least two other records are in danger of falling this year.

The estimated 1.5 million cotton acres left standing will have to yield an average of almost 320 pounds per acre if the High Plains is to gin one million bales of cotton this fall, a figure the

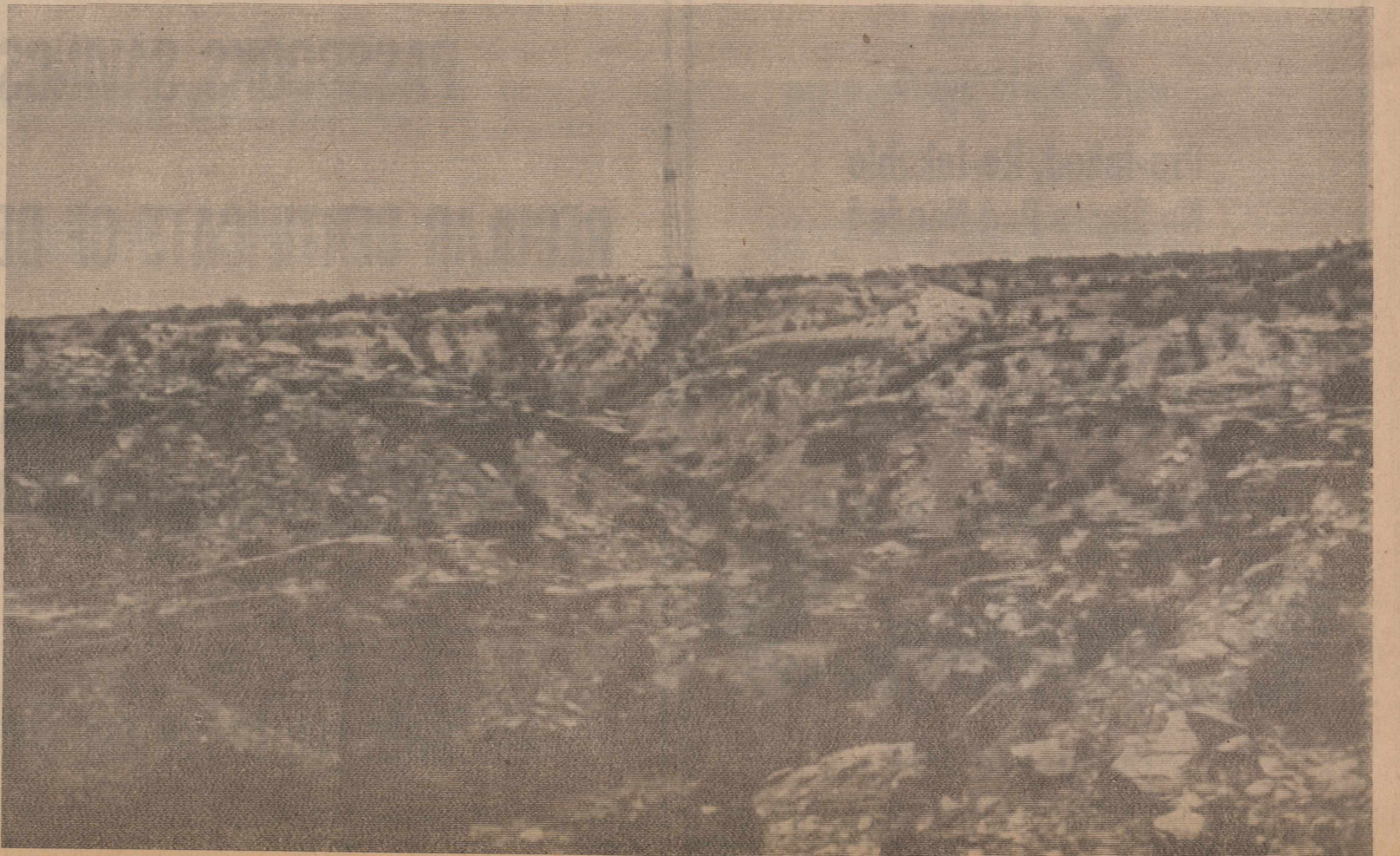

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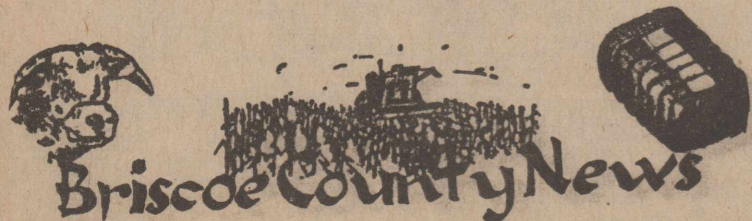
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BEEFaTHON Television Auction To Be Held For Multiple Sclerosis

Seeking Seriously Disabled Veterans

The Veterans Administration is seeking seriously disabled veterans in the Texas-Gulf States area and elsewhere to participate in a new program of independent-living services.

Special outreach efforts are underway in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi to explain the new benefit program. Independent living is designed to increase a severely disabled veteran's ability to function more independently in the family or community environment with a reduced level of services from others.

The pilot program will continue through fiscal 1985. For up to two years an eligible service-disabled veteran may receive a wide range of independent living services. They may include housing modification, personal care attendants, prosthetic devices, transport costs and training in independent living skills through coordination with other VA benefit programs.

Veterans needing more information about independent living services should contact the Vocational Rehabilitation and Counseling Officer at Waco, Houston, New Orleans or Jackson VA Regional Office.

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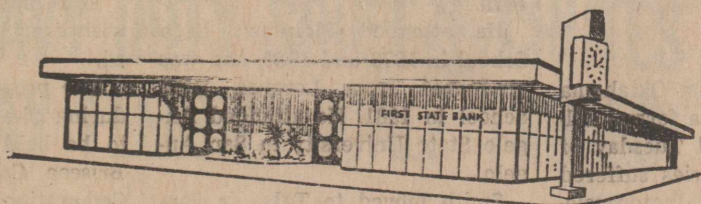
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Malone - Love Vows Exchanged At Tulia Church Recently

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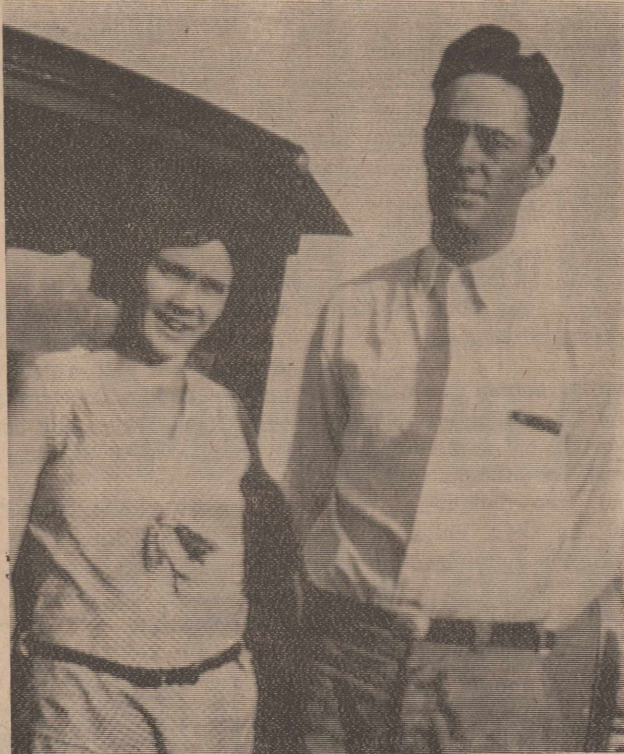

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Foreign Investment Report Criticized

The Governor's Task Force on Foreign Investments is playing with fire and ignoring the wishes of a vast majority of Texans in not calling for limitations on the purchase of agricultural land by nonresident aliens, according to Mike Moeller, president of the Texas Farmers Union. "This recent report is another example of how the governor, as Nero, is fiddling while the rest of the state is suffering from foreign investment which is spreading like a grass fire."

Moeller was critical of the task force which concluded that foreign investment in both agriculture and business properties was good for the state and should be encouraged. According to the task force chairman, Jack Lander, a Houston businessman, "foreign investment has been very good for the state." The TFU president said "the task force has failed to take into consideration the rapid increase of purchases during the past few years. At the very least, the report should have recommended stronger reporting of purchases which will give us an accurate appraisal of the situation."

"We do not believe that we should wait until foreign investment has reached a crisis stage," Moeller said. "While only a million acres are now reportedly owned by foreigners, most of those purchases have come within the past five years. And with the current laws covering registration, it is easy to avoid reporting purchases of land," he remarked.

Moeller said if the committee would have looked at the price of farmland in other countries versus the price in the U. S., they would understand why purchases have increased dramatically in recent years. Also, because of the stability of our government, many foreigners are going to be looking at the U. S. for a relatively safe investment. But, Moeller warned, they may not always have the best interest of the local people or this country in mind when they take control of the property.

According to the TFU, control of natural resources such as farmland should remain in the hands of residents who have a vested interest in seeing the land protected and carefully used for production. Also, the vast majority of Texans have agreed in recent polls that some limitation should be placed on foreign investors purchasing agricultural lands. "But since the committee was stacked with bankers, realtors and other businessmen who
