Her mother will be remembered as the former Beverly Lisenby.

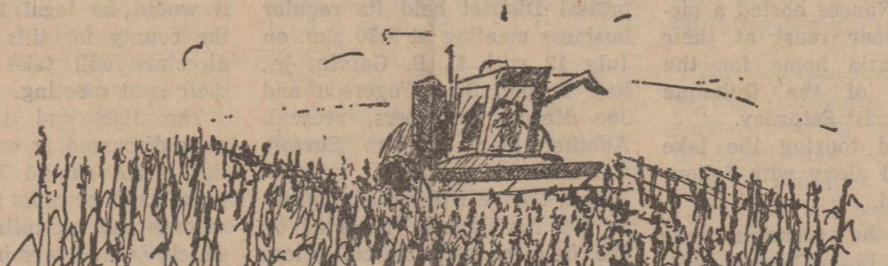

## Mrs. Arnold to Celebrate Birthday

Mrs. Charlsie B. Arnold will celebrate her ninetyeth birthday anniversary on Sunday, July 25. Her family requests that all of her friends and relatives come and help her celebrate this memorable occasion in the fellowship hall of the First Baptist Church from 3:00 until 4:30 in the afternoon. No invitations are being

sent, and it is requested that no gifts be sent.

The former Charlsie Myers, she was born July 24, 1892 on her father's ranch just west of the Briscoe - Swisher county line. The Mackenzie Battleground was near the family's home. Her father sold the ranch in 1898 and they moved to Tulla and then to

Hereford. After her mother's death, they moved to Elida, New Mexico where her father had purchased another ranch.

In 1906, Jim Bomar, a Silvertown cowboy, and several other cowboys drove a herd of horses from Silvertown to a ranch near Portales, New Mexico, and Charlsie was there visiting. They were introduced and began a correspondence which lasted a year. At the end of the year, Jim came and asked her father if they could be married, but her father said 14 was just too young. She found her father's cancelled checks and began practicing writing his signature and soon was good enough at the art of forgery to sign for permission for them to marry. They eloped in a buggy and were married in Elida in 1907.

Their first home was in Silvertown and had only one room. It was located about three blocks east of the railroad tracks near what is now Carl D. Bomar's farm. Their first daughter, Ruby, was born in March of 1908. They moved to the Matador Ranch near Matador and there their second daughter, Zollie, was born in February 1910. Charlsie was only 17 when she had her last child.

During the remaining years of Jim Bomar's life he was tax assessor, John Deere dealer and groceryman. He died in 1948.

Mrs. Bomar was a widow at 56, with very little education and needing a way to support herself, she enrolled in the Chicago School of Nursing and became a licensed vocational nurse about a year later. She nursed at the Silvertown Hospital during the next few years. Sometimes she would work all night Saturday night, but Sunday morning she was teaching a Sunday School class or singing in the choir.

A. D. Arnold, a retired carpenter, and Mrs. Bomar were married in Clovis, New Mexico in 1955. After 41 years of calling her "Mrs. Bomar," it was very hard for people to remember to call her "Mrs. Arnold." Many seemed a little embarrassed when they slipped and called her "Mrs. Bomar." Bess McWilliams figured out the solution to the problem—practice! Knowing she had to make a phone call to Mrs. Arnold, she practiced saying "Mrs. Arnold—Mrs. Arnold."

When the phone rang, Mr. Arnold answered and Bess asked, "Mr. Bomar, is Mrs. Arnold there?"

The family Charlsie gained when she married Doug Arnold treated her like she was their own mother, even though they were grown and had families of their own. Her step-children were Marie Garrison, Gerald Arnold and Gene Arnold, all of whom are deceased. Doug Arnold died in 1975.

Charlsie's life has been built around her church and her family. She has been blessed with good health and attributes her longevity to working hard and

## Hightower Supporting Balanced Budget Amendment, Attends Rally

Saying it is "clearly time to force the Executive and Legislative branches of government to face fiscal realities," Congressman Jack Hightower told reporters that he is one of a growing group in Congress cosponsoring a balanced budget amendment to the U. S. Constitution. Hightower's comments came during a midday rally on the Capitol steps designed to generate national congressional support for such an amendment. President Reagan and Vice-President Bush both spoke at the rally, flanked by members of the House and Senate, including Hightower, who are supporting the amendment.

"While I have always advocated a balanced budget approach, I think this procedural amendment could make it easier for Congress to do what it must to restore fiscal responsibility," Hightower said. "An amendment would make it harder to deficit-spend and the bias would be where it belongs—in favor of a sensible budget policy. Although I have generally favored amending the Constitution as a last resort, the budget process of the last two years has convinced me that stricter measures are required."

The bill would require a balanced federal budget where spending levels matched revenue, and spending over the budget could only be approved by a two-thirds vote of both houses of Congress.

Hightower noted that he had hoped the budget could be brought into balance this year, but acknowledged it was harder to do than many budget experts had anticipated. "Although we cut spending tremendously last year and this year, we'll still have a 1983 budget deficit over \$100 billion. That's absolutely got to be reduced further, and I expect it will be," Hightower

said.

Thus far 31 states have passed resolutions urging adoption of a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution. If Congress passes such an amendment, approval of 37 states would be required for ratification, Congress would still have to pass spending and tax measures and approve a budget, but spending more than was raised in revenue would be technically illegal.

The 4-H'ers and Extension agents would like to thank everyone who helped with the Playday and send a special thank you to Wayne Stephens for the use of his heifers.

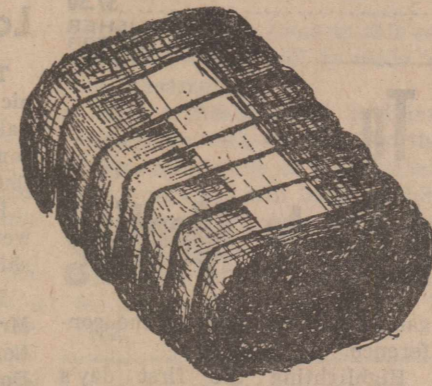

## HIGHTOWER WASHINGTON HIGHLIGHTS

from Congressman Jack Hightower

### HIGHTOWER PLEADED WITH DISASTER AID APPROVAL

Commenting that he was "extremely pleased that Secretary Block and the President have finally acted on our original June 23 request for disaster aid," Congressman Jack Hightower said he felt the bipartisan effort had been productive. Last Thursday, Agriculture Department officials and Governor Bill Clements made the official announcement of aid to farmers in West Texas whose important crops were recently devastated by intense rain and hailstorms. On June 23, Hightower, Rep. Kent Hance and Rep. Charles Stenholm had sent a letter to Block officially requesting the aid and inviting USDA officials to inspect the damage in Texas. This was the first formal request of any kind and the trio followed that up after the inspection with another letter of July 12 reaffirming the need for aid. The July 12 letter spelled out what steps Agriculture Secretary Block should take.

"I felt that some kind of help was absolutely essential for many people in West Texas although it may not save others who will go under due to the general farm depression," Hightower commented. "I hope that the amount of assistance the USDA has decided on will prove meaningful assistance and be of real economic help. If the Administration and Secretary Block had supported our Farm Crisis Bill, perhaps farmers would have been better able to handle these natural disasters as well as being better off generally," High-



tower said. Of the 33 counties in the 13th Congressional District, 32 are covered in the USDA announcement. Also included are Baylor, Kent, Knox and Floyd counties which will become part of the 13th District in January 1983 due to Texas redistricting. Special disaster payments will be made primarily to cotton, wheat and feed grain producers to help them survive the high crop losses.

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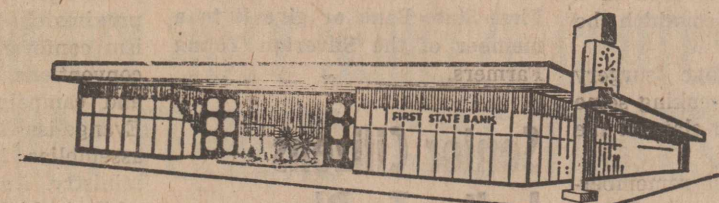
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## Martin To Attend Inservice Workshop For Ag Teachers

The hearings are being held in five area towns to acquaint citizens with the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging's operating plans for 1983. The budget year for the agency begins October 1 of this year and runs through September 30, 1983.

The hearings are required by the Texas Department on Aging so that private citizens can comment on the Panhandle agency's three-year plan, now entering its third year. The agency receives \$762,487 from the state aging department. Over \$578 thousand of that goes directly into services in the region. The remainder is used to finance administration of the programs.

These types of programs are funded in conjunction with senior citizen centers; transportation, information and referral, homemaker services, emergency response system, adult day care, legal services and congregate and home-delivered nutrition services.

Like all other state and federally-funded programs, the aging appropriations are being cut for the upcoming year. This year's \$762,487 is off \$25,000 from last year's appropriation. There are

## did you know?



The first unit of Roy Tolk Station, Southwestern Public Service Company's new coal-fired generating plant near Muleshoe, Texas, will begin manufacturing electricity this month. The unit has the capacity to generate 561,000 kilowatts of electric power—it's Southwestern's largest. A second unit, the same size as the first, is being built next to the one which will be fired up this month. The units cost more than \$200 million apiece. They can each provide enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

Ben Green, Plant Manager, Muleshoe.

Tolk Station will burn coal — ground as fine as talcum powder — to produce electricity. The coal SPS uses comes from mines near Gillette, Wyoming. It is a low-sulfur coal. Tolk Station Unit No. 1 will burn approximately 315 tons of coal per hour. That's about 7,560 tons per day. The coal is delivered by 110-car trains directly from the Wyoming mines. Coal-fired plants are significantly more economical to operate than natural gas-fired plants.

Morris Davis, Administration Manager, Amarillo.

The "stack" at Tolk Station is 400 feet high. The "smoke" it emits, however, is "smokeless." Although burning coal naturally produces "smoke" (flue gas and fly ash), our state-of-the-art environmental protection equipment cleans up the emissions long before they get into the air. The protection system, called a baghouse, contains 13,000 fiberglass bags. They filter the boiler's emissions and remove the ash residues, making the coal "smokeless."
