Mrs. Newman To Be Honored as Pioneer For The Day

The Briscoe County Historical Committee has named Mrs. Blanche Newman as the 1982 Briscoe County Pioneer for the Day. Mrs. Newman will be honored at the Briscoe County Birthday Celebration today.

Mrs. Newman was born to Mack and Della Watters June 30, 1900 at Haskell, and moved with her family to Briscoe County in November of 1900 at the age of five months. They settled in the Lakeview Community, and she started school there. In 1908 the family moved to the Haylake Community east of Silverton and Blanche continued her education at the Haylake School.

She married Ennis Walker in 1920 and two sons were born to this union. They were Alton and Roy Mack. Ennis died in 1930 and she married Eual Newman in 1933. The two boys served in the Army during World War II. Alton was killed in 1943 in combat over the coast of the Netherlands. He was with the 8th Air Force and had been stationed in England. Roy Mack received his discharge in 1945 and married Lois Arnold in 1946. Roy Mack and Lois Walker have made their home in Silverton since their marriage. Eual Newman passed away in 1971. Soon after, Mrs. Newman moved into Silverton where she now resides.

Her days are filled with church work, working in her yard, visiting the sick, and her family, especially her grandchildren and their mates—Cliff, Sandy, Jim, Karen, Cindy and John—and her five great-grandchildren—Sunny and Jaime Walker, Billy Mack and Danny Walker and Jon-Mac Edwards.

Mrs. Newman still drives her car and enjoys visiting those in rest homes, taking goodies to them. She is also noted for driving the sick to the doctor.

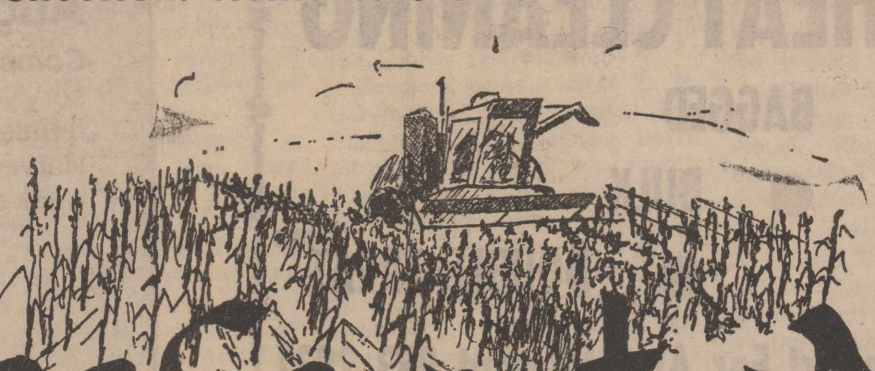

Celebration Opens In Silverton Today

Briscoe County's 90th birthday will be celebrated this weekend in Silverton. There will be something of interest for each and every member of the family, regardless of age.

Activities open today with an arts and crafts fair to be set up on the courthouse lawn. Booths will be selling their wares all day. Many unusual items will be offered for sale, so no matter what your interests, there will be something for you.

Silverton Senior Citizens will auction off two quilts during the birthday celebration.

There will be tricycle races in front of the First State Bank for kids two to five years old. Each youngster needs to bring his own tricycle and meet with the L. O. A. Junior Study Club mem-

bers in front of the bank at 3:30 p.m.

A western parade through downtown Silverton will begin at 4:00 p.m. There will be prizes for the best floats and riding clubs.

A section of the parade will be devoted to the Kid's Bicycle Parade. This is sponsored by the Briscoe County News, and cash prizes will be \$10.00 for first place, \$5.00 for second and \$2.50 for third place. Entrants will need to pick up an identification number from the Briscoe County News before parade time. This will be used to identify the winners, because the judges may not know the contestants' names. Numbers are to be placed on the backs of the contestants or their bicycles. Numbers will be avail-

able from the sponsor at the corner of Main and Seventh Streets (at the old hotel) where the bicyclists are to gather at 3:45 p.m.

Following the parade, everyone is invited to gather on the courthouse square where a huge tent will be erected, for a meal of barbecue and all the trimmings.

To help defray the cost of the barbecue, tickets will be sold for \$2.50 per plate. The price will not cover the cost of the barbecue, and donations are very much needed. They may be left at the First State Bank.

Free tickets will be given to all citizens 65 years of age or older who have lived in Briscoe County 40 years or longer. A booth will be provided under the big tent where senior citizens can register and receive their tickets, and where tickets can be purchased.

Donations are also being solicited to defray the cost of renting the tent to shade the south side of the courthouse lawn.

The Young Farmers would like to thank everyone who has helped in the past with their donations of time, labor and money. With your support, it is hoped that this annual event will continue.

Starting Thursday, there will be three performances of the Silverton Young Farmers Rodeo at Wood Memorial Arena with participants from all over the area testing their rodeo skills beginning at 8:00 o'clock night-

There will be a calf scramble for those 11 years of age and younger and steer riding for the 12-13-14 year olds. A special event for Briscoe County residents only will be seven steers, six ropers and six muggers. This alone might be worth the price of admission.

The other rodeo events are tie down calf roping, heading and heeling, ladies barrel race (jackpot each night), bareback bronc riding, bull riding and saddle bronc riding. Stock will be furnished by the C Bar T Rodeo arena sports and his continued interest in this sport, together with his love of horses, led him to pursue learning the craft of saddle-making.

The saddle will be on display this week at The Coffee Shop.

**Lamb, Wool Producers To Vote
 On Promotion Program Extension**

Lamb and wool producers will have an opportunity during an August 16-27 referendum to vote on whether they want the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc. to continue its market promotion and improvement program on their behalf by entering a new agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

According to Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the agreement to be voted on is similar to one approved in 1978, except it would authorize larger deductions from producer incentive payments. By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to

four cents per pound on shorn wool and 20 cents per hundredweight on unshorn lambs marketed in 1982. Deduction rates from 1978 through 1981 were 2½ cents and 12½ cents respectively, he said.

Rank also said the new agreement would provide for USDA to withhold part of any wool incentive payments that might be made to producers on 1983-85 marketings to finance the council's promotion activities.

He said deductions would be used by the council to finance advertising and sales promotion programs for wool and lamb, and programs to develop and disseminate information on product quality, production management and marketing improvement for wool and sheep.

County offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to sheep producers in early August. Producers may cast their ballots by mailing or delivering them in person to county ASCS

offices before the close of the referendum, Rank said.

Anyone may vote who has owned sheep six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1981. Votes may be cast by individuals or by cooperatives. Members of cooperatives which

cast votes would not be eligible to vote separately in the referendum. The agreement requires approval by two-thirds of the total volume of producers, or two-third of the total volume of production represented in the referendum. The National Wool Act of 1954 provides the authority for deductions and for promotion activities. Sheep producers have approved the program in each of the seven referendums held since 1954. In the most recent referendum of 1978, 75% of the producers approved the program.

More than 350 students who will enter WTSU as freshman students for the fall semester which begins with registration on Wednesday, August 25, have been designated as Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars.

The Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship program has

grown since 1979 with five gifts each of \$200,000. The Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo added the fifth gift in June to bring the scholarship fund total to \$1 million.

Of the 328 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars in 1981-82, 87% will return for this year and 51% of those who will return have maintained a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale to be eligible for a scholarship the second year, said Keith Winter, director of development.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars who score a 28 of a possible 36 on the American College Test and 1,220 of a possible 1,600 points on the Scholastic Aptitude Test college entrance examinations also are designated as President's Honor Scholars and receive an addition-

Members present were L. B. Garvin, jr., Ray Teeple, Don Burson and Stan Fogerson. Board member Joe Mercer was absent. Also in attendance was Carlye Hill, chief appraiser.

The meeting was called to order by Board president L. B. Garvin, jr. Secretary Ray Teeple read the minutes of the previous meeting, and the minutes were approved.

Mrs. Hill reported on the finances and tax collections. The Board reviewed the financial statement and also the individual tax collection reports for

each entity.
