Tuesday night the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service held its monthly meeting at City Hall. President Anthony Kingery opened the business meeting and discussed upcoming Emergency Medical Service events.

Plans were made for a group of Silverton emergency personnel to attend a one-day seminar in Amarillo to be educated in the use of MAST Trousers. Instruction in the use of this emergency appliance is another step in the ongoing training of emergency personnel to better serve in emergency situations.

The Second Annual EMS Olympics are to be held in Amarillo in conjunction with the State-wide EMS Week. The EMS Olympics provide EMTs and Paramedics the chance to compete with one another and sharpen their medical skills, as well as providing the public an opportunity to be educated in the actual processes of emergency practices. The upcoming EMT Renewal

Class and possible alternatives to the present State Certification Program were discussed. It is mandated by the state agency that every EMT as well as paramedic must recertify every two years, through a display of proficiency in certain medical skills, and by passing a written test to challenge the medical knowledge

that every attendant should possess. To prepare for the tests the requirements also include attendance at a 28-hour course for review.

of the Kendrick Extrication Device. The Silverton Ambulance Service recently acquired this new piece of equipment, to be used in spinal type injuries. 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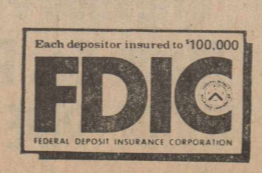
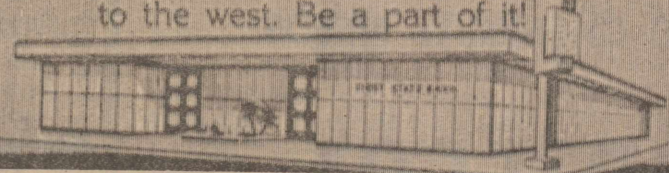
