

All Around the Town

A new intention to drill was filed with the Railroad Commission last week, and this was for a wildcat to be drilled by BLN, Inc. which will be the No. 1 Saul-Schott (640 acres) 2283' from South and 1210' from West line, Section 11, B-1, BS&F, 3.3 miles southeast of Silverton. The permit was shown to 4000 feet, but we understand this is being amended to permit drilling to 6000 feet.

BLN also is expected to bring in a workover rig for the purpose of acidizing and further trying to develop the wildcat already drilled on the Saul Ranch.

The Hanson Corporation is drilling at 7500 feet in the lower Pennsylvanian formation on the J. K. Patrick No. 1 near Quitaque. Permitted depth is 8000 feet.

The wildcat being drilled by Sojourner on the Cogdell Ranch northwest of Silverton is down to 6880 feet this week, and the wildcat being drilled by Tri-Ex on the Cogdell Ranch north of Silverton is down to 2800 feet.

There was a very interesting article in the Amarillo Sunday News, in which Donald O. Acrey of Amarillo, a semi-retired geophysicist who lived in Silverton while doing oil exploration in this area several years ago, was quoted as saying that he expects at least two dozen wells to be drilled in Briscoe County by the end of the year.

He went on to say, "I have never seen anywhere in this basin the massive saltbeds required to store nuclear waste." He describes the faults and various formations that others cite in explaining why the present "boom" was delayed until now.

The No. 1 W. H. Brooks well on Section 8, eight miles east of Silverton, reported earlier to have a show in the San Andreas formation below 3400 feet and then in the Pennsylvanian, last week was said to show oil in the Wolfcamp and Canyon reef formations. Drilling was down to 6000 feet this week.

The Pascal Garrison offset to the discovery well northwest of Silverton had three perforations last week and was still being swabbed this week.

We don't usually refer to unsigned letters to the editor, but we are going to share this one that we received last week:

"I keep reading in your paper that the 'Christmas tree' is in place on such and such a well. For the benefit of us non-oil people, what the heck is a Christmas tree?"

It was signed "Out of town puzzled reader."

We would like to clarify one thing for puzzled: we are non-oil people, too, and it is really tough trying to keep up with this blossoming giant in Briscoe County.

When we mention the "Christmas tree," we are referring to the apparatus that is placed on the well when they are getting ready to pump. You don't associate it with a dry hole or a plugged hole. It is my symbol that something promising has been found.

Larry Comer recently called our hand when we said the rig was being "torn down" and moved to another location. He says it isn't "torn down," it is "rigged down."

And now we are going to leave the real world, and go out of the world into the ridiculous.

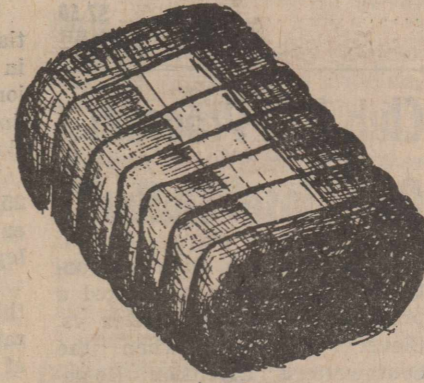
The first "wild tall tale" I heard about Marathon began drilling the G. Mayfield No. 1 was that the gophers in Briscoe County were coming up oily.

Grady Martin Buried At Collinsville

Funeral services for Grady Earl Martin, 58, were conducted Sunday at 2:20 p.m. at the Farmers Branch Church of Christ with Richard Seymour and O. C. Rample officiating. Burial was in Collinsville Cemetery at Collinsville, with services directed by Rhoton-Weiland-Merritt of Carrollton.

Mr. Martin died Friday. Born May 4, 1923 to Nollie and Walter Martin at Itasca, he moved to Silverton at the age of five. He was graduated from Silverton High School where he had played basketball and football and received a scholarship in both sports at Southern Methodist University. He received his degree at SMU in 1949.

He entered the Marine Corps in 1942 and went to Officer Candidate School at Paris Island, North Carolina. He spent a year removed several years ago, and the railroad had sold the depot building before then.)

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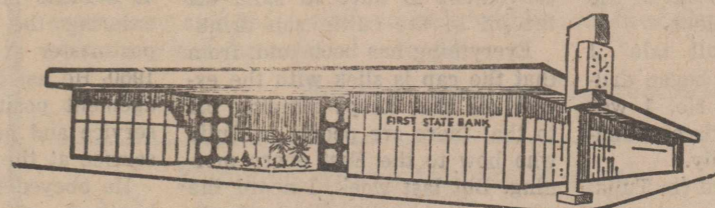

Former Silverton Resident Is Brooke Soldier Of The Year

Army Specialist Five Moses D. Thompson has been selected as Soldier of the Year at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio.

He is the son of Moses D. Thompson of Yelm, Washington and Dorothy A. Cusic of Anchorage, Alaska. He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Brookshier of Silverton.

Specialist Thompson is an optical laboratory specialist with the optical fabrication branch of Brooke's Logistics Division.

Thompson attended Silverton High School for two years then

transferred to Highlands High School in San Antonio from where he graduated. He also has taken some courses at Regis College in Denver, Colorado, and at St. Phillip's College in San Antonio.

He first competed with other outstanding soldiers assigned to Brooke, the Fort Sam Houston Dental Activity, the Area Dental Laboratory and the U. S. Army Institute of Surgical Research to win the Soldier of the Month award last June.

He was selected for that honor, and later for the April-May-June

Soldier of the Quarter award, by a board of senior noncommissioned officers. A similar board selected Thompson out of four Soldiers of the Quarter for the annual award.

The optical laboratory where he works fabricates eyeglasses for all active duty and retired military personnel of all the uniformed services in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana. That includes all the basic trainees at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio who need eyeglasses. The lab fabricated 96,000 eyeglasses in 1981.

Thompson entered the Army in November 1979 and was assigned to Fitzsimons Army Medical Center in Aurora, Colorado before going to Brooke. He wears the Expert Field Medical, Expert Rifle, and Sharpshooter (grenade) Badges.

He is married to the former Gracie Del Bosque, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Del Bosque of Beeville.

Brooke is the second largest of the eight medical centers operated by the U. S. Army Health Services Command. It is a tertiary health care center offering the most sophisticated level of clinical care.

Brooke operates 692 beds in three hospitals for the care of medical, surgical and psychiatric patients. It also provides outpatient care for eligible personnel in more than 100 specialty clinics. Activities at Brooke cover almost every phase of patient care, medical training, postgraduate medical education and medical research.
