Another wildcat is scheduled to be drilled in Briscoe County, beginning about April 15.

Robert Keegan of Midland has leased 10,000 acres on the Cogdell ranch, and will begin drilling 10 miles northwest of Silverton in mid-April. That well will be a joint venture by Keegan and Paul Dowling of Midland.

D. M. and W. M. Cogdell have joined Tri-Ex Oil and Gas of Denver, Colorado and Bill Sojourner of Abilene to drill the two wells already started on the Cogdell ranch. The Tri-Ex well is six miles north and is down to about 4150 feet and the Sojourner well is nine miles northwest of Silverton and is down to 7350 feet.

Hanson Corporation of Midland has finished drilling on the J. K. Patrick place near Quitaque.

Drilling on the W. H. Brooks No. 1, another Tri-Ex Oil and Gas well, is down to 6700 feet this week.

Swabbing is continuing on the Pascal Garrison No. 1, confirmation well to the discovery well on the G. Mayfield ranch, northwest of Silverton.

BLN started a new wildcat on the Saul ranch 8.3 miles southeast of Silverton Sunday. Work is to continue on BLN's other wildcat on the Saul ranch as soon as a workover rig is available.

The contract has been signed, and work is scheduled to begin after the application for permit has been processed for a wildcat on the Joe Montague place. This location is commonly referred to as "the sand hill."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Sarchet, Attending the funeral of Grady Martin caused many memories to surface.

Having coached in five high schools in Texas and New Mexico, I am often asked to name an all-star team or to name the greatest players I coached. I have never named these groups as I might be unfair to some. That best would include several All-Americans, All-State and College and University team captains—five captains at The University of Texas. Two of these captains led the Longhorns to National Championships. Numbered among these five captains was Fred Sarchet, whom I consider the finest all-around quarterback that I ever coached.

If I should name these all-stars I would include several from Silverton High School, such as Grady Martin, O. C. Rampley, Hank Brown, Fred Brannon, and others.

Grady Martin was a fine boy—a super individual. I consider Grady the greatest end that I ever coached—and, the greatest basketball player. He was on the list to be named All-American at SMU when a crippling injury cut his career short. During the coaching school at Beaumont in 1949, Coach Maffey Bell of SMU told me—in the presence of Coach Rusty Russel and Doak Walker—that Grady was the last athlete at SMU to be a regular in both football and basketball. He also stated that Grady was the best all-around athlete to ever play for SMU. Those present nodded agreement.

Regardless of the location, my heart has always been with those fine boys and athletes I had at Silverton High School. It is hard for me to accept the fact that many of them have departed this life on earth. They were all known as hitters. I am sure that you still have the same type at Silverton High School.

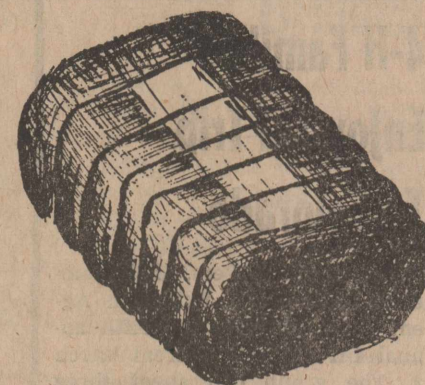
Livestock Judging Team Going To Pampa

Bank To Co-Sponsor TV Documentary On Ag Experts

First State Bank, through its membership in the American Bankers Association (ABA), will support American Agriculture Week by co-sponsoring a television film documentary which is scheduled to be aired on March 18—the day President Reagan has designated American Agriculture Day.

"Prosperity in the Balance," a half-hour show hosted by veteran actor Rex Allen and produced by Elanco Products Company, will be shown on KFSA-TV, channel 10 - CBS, at 6:30 p.m. on March 18. The program takes an in-depth look at the role of American agricultural exports in the international balance of trade, and how several U. S. commodity groups have developed foreign markets for American exports.

"It's appropriate that First State Bank participates in sponsoring this show since banks supplied nearly 39 percent of the total \$174.63 billion in American agriculture loans that were outstanding last year," said William J. Strange, President of First State Bank. There are 14,500 commercial banks in the nation. First State Bank is one of 5,000 which have been identified by the ABA as an agricultural bank, having \$7.5 million

or more in farm loans (or 90% or more of the total loans in support of agriculture).

Highlights of the show, which was shot on location, include segments on how several commodity groups have successfully developed foreign markets:

In Korea, the U. S. Feed Grains Council (USFGC) has increased pork consumption with the help of the president of the Korea Food Institute, who appears several times a month on Korean television to promote positive attitudes toward pork.

In Germany, the American Soybean Association (ASA), through in-store cooking demonstrations and a communications program that targeted food editors, helped increase soybean oil consumption by 50 percent.

In China, where the commercial baking industry is almost non-existent, U. S. Wheat Associates, Inc. (USWA) promoted the consumption of bread and noodles with a demonstration bakery near Beijing, where bakers were trained using modern baking equipment.

In Italy, Cotton Incorporated (CI) engineers toured the textile mills of a large manufacturer, examined fibers and machinery, and offered expertise to reduce costly production down-time by using more American cotton in the fiber mix.

"Prosperity in the Balance" also examines the Reagan administration's position on exports, and it looks at the American consumer's point of view.

"Agricultural exports are the best way to re-establish a favorable balance of trade, and banks, by supporting agriculture, are helping to make those exports possible," Strange said. "Exports help pay for the Japanese televisions, German cars and Middle East oil we've grown accustomed to having."

The American Bankers Association is the national professional and trade association for America's Full Service Banks. More than 90 percent of the nation's 14,500 commercial banks are its members, including more small banks than any other financial association.

Absentee Voting Begins Monday

Absentee voting for the April 3 City of Silverton Officers Election and the Silverton ISD Trustee Election open here Monday.

Absentee voting for the city election will be done at the City Hall, and absentee ballots for the school election will be cast at the office of Verlin B. Towe.

Three are to be elected to the Silverton City Council to fill the vacancies created by the expiring terms of Councilmen Donnie Martin and David Tipton, and by the death of Ted Strange. Martin and Tipton have agreed to place their names on the ballot as candidates for re-election, and Helen Strange and John Bowman also have filed for places on the ballot as candidates for Council members.

ACCIDENT WITHOUT

Dead Animals Being Dumped Illegally

It has been brought to the attention of the Briscoe County sheriff's department that dead animals are being disposed of improperly in the county. The State Health Department has advised that Texas Civil Law makes specific provisions for the disposal of dead animals.

Vernon's Civil Statutes specify in article 66.74 that dead animals shall not be dumped along any public road. Article 44.77 states in essence that dead animals shall be disposed of by burial, covering the carcasses by a minimum of two (2) feet of packed earth. Where necessary the carcasses shall also be treated by sprinkling lime over them before covering them with dirt.

With spring winds blowing the odor of carcasses can be detected for several miles and becomes quite repulsive when it blows toward a residence. Therefore the cooperation of the public will be appreciated greatly. Failure to comply with the law regarding the disposal of carcasses will quite likely result in prosecution.

**HANDLE CREDIT HISTORY
 WITH CARE**

Operating on credit has become a way of life, so handle your credit history "with care"—investigate it and keep it up to date.

This is especially important if you're planning to apply for new credit or have been turned down for credit unexpectedly.

Start with nearby credit reporting agencies, such as the credit bureau. These agencies keep a record of how consumers use credit or misuse it. Our nearest credit bureau is in Plainview.

If you've ever used credit, that credit bureau may have a file on you. This file is the major source of your credit history. Your credit bureau is important because most potential creditors do not send separate inquiries to each creditor—they merely request information from the credit bureau.

You have a right to know what is in your file. If you have been denied credit within the last 30 days, this service is free. If it has been longer, a fee will be charged for the report. Fee amounts vary from bureau to bureau.

Understanding the credit bureau's job is important. They are privately owned agencies who do not determine your credit worthiness. That is the job of the creditor—only the creditor decides to grant or deny credit. Credit bureaus simply provide the facts in your file—and they charge the potential creditor for the services.

If you have no credit history, some creditors may interpret the lack of credit history almost as negatively as they would poor credit use. So it's a good idea to establish credit and be sure the record is on file with the bureau and that the record is correct.

To learn your credit rights regarding your credit file, pick up a copy of the free FDIC brochure, "Fair Credit Reporting Act," from the local bank display area.

I also have available an excellent, up-to-date credit letter series which includes information on credit rights, credit protection, cost of credit, and the privilege of credit. Call my office, 823-2343, and I will send it to you at no cost.

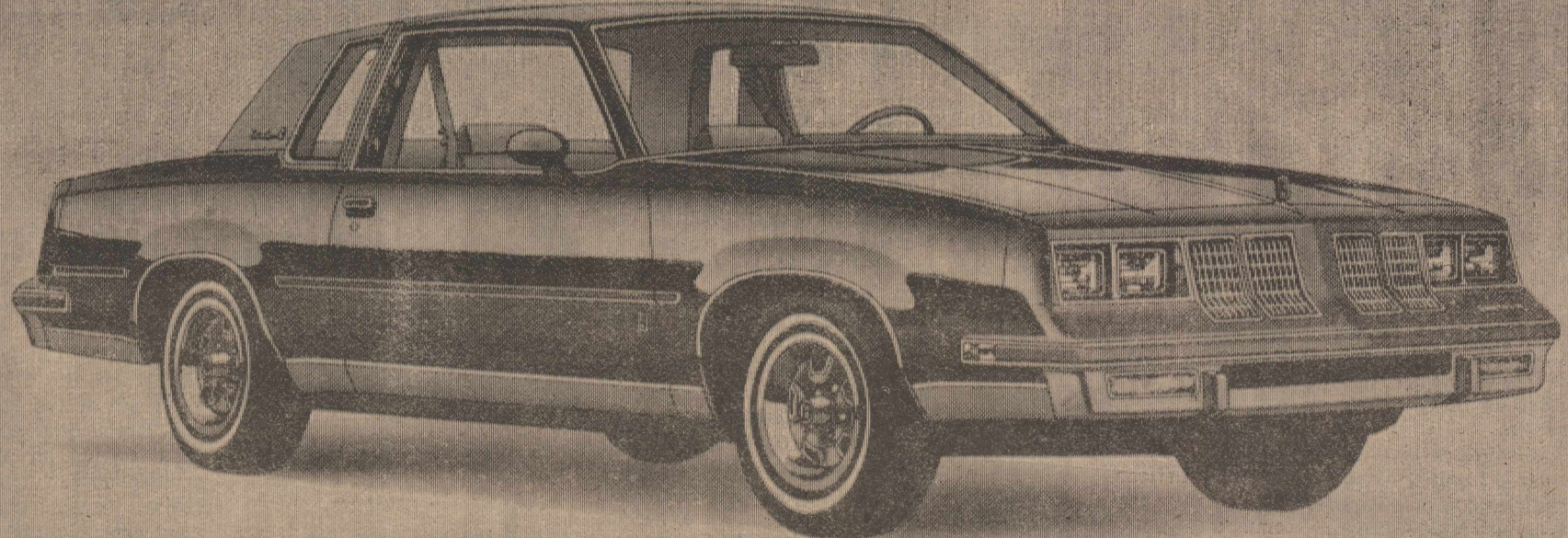

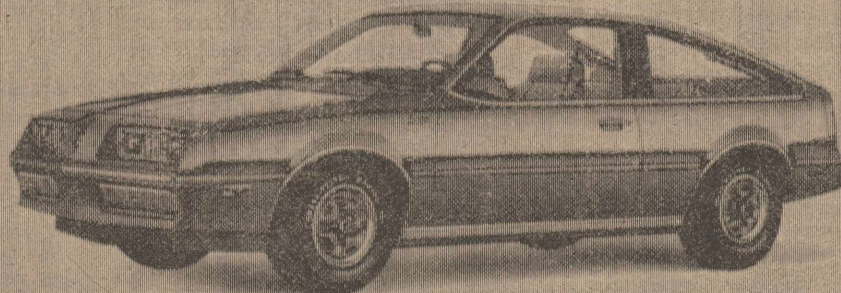

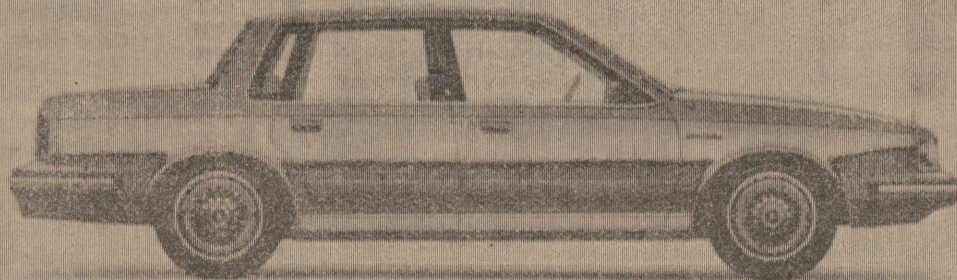
