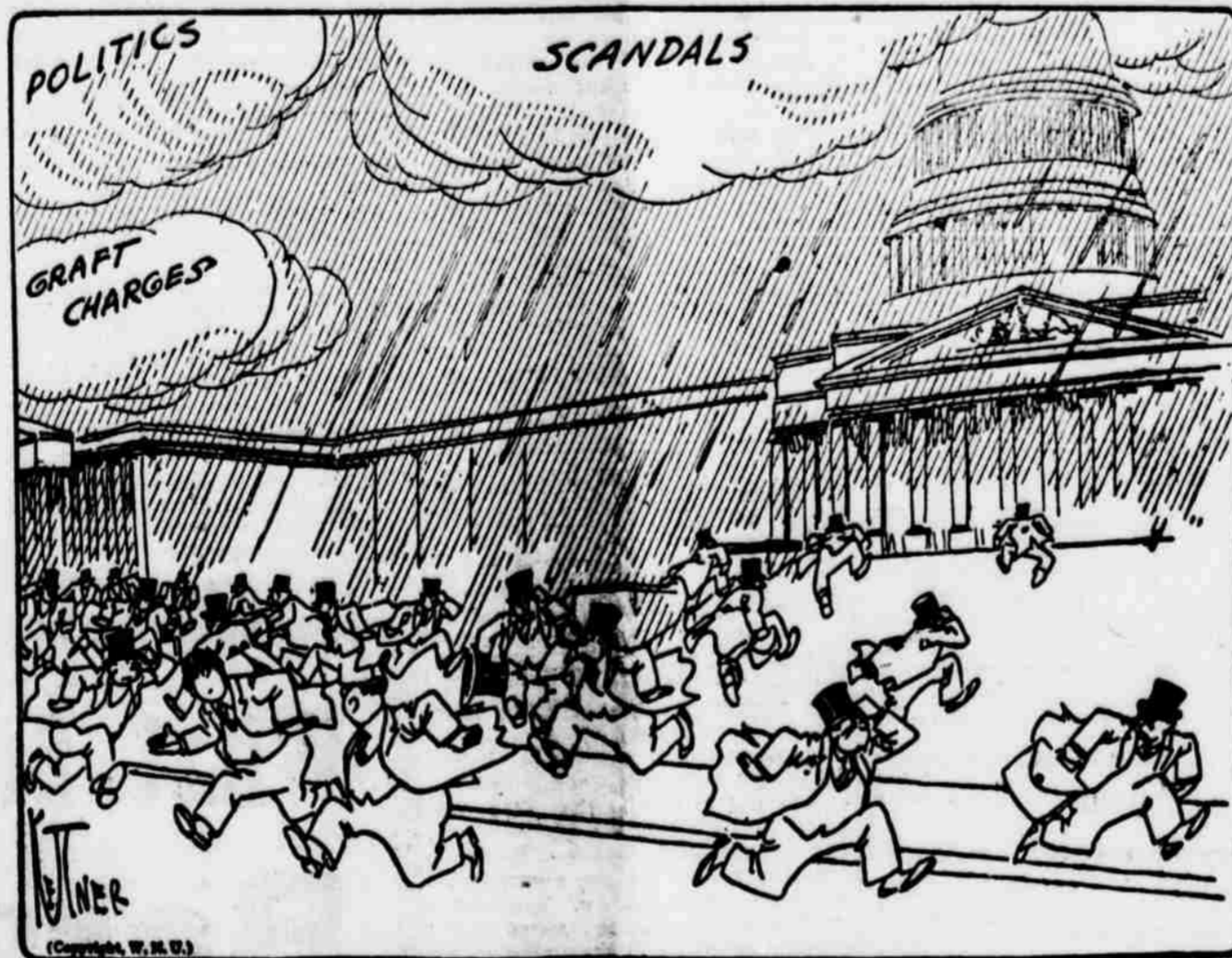
M. O. FIELD WILL SING FOR MEETING AT TUSCOLA

The city was filled with cars, the tags and numbers gave evidence that most of them were from neighboring towns and adjoining counties. HASKELL COUNTY INCLUDED IN DRILLING PERMITS

Haskell County is included in the drilling permits with other counties of the state to drill for huge potash beds that is believed to lie under the soil of West Texas lands. Below is a clipping from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram which fully explains the proposition.

Many West Texas land owners have responded with commendable promptness to Senator Sheppard's request for drilling permits in a proposed hunt by the United States Geological Service for the huge potash beds that are believed to exist under a great portion of the western part of the State. Permission to drill in Andrews, Crane, Culberson, Haskell, Ector, and Glasscock counties have been filed with the federal authorities in Washington, which, with others, will make possible a wide range of drilling operations and consequently a thorough test of the possibilities of the potash deposits.

Geologists have advanced the possibility that a bed of potash exists at a depth of several hundred feet beneath an immense stretch of territory extending from Kansas into Mexico, and extending entirely through the Western part of Texas. The tests proposed under a resolution recently introduced in the Senate by Mr. Sheppard are for the purpose of determining if such a mammoth deposit exists, and, if true, the commercial availability of the beds. It requires but a thought of the importance of potash in the world's affairs to realize the potentialities of the project. The two most indispensable articles of commerce are potash and nitrates. The famous Stassfurt beds in Germany constitute the world's sole considerable supply of the former, and the nitrate beds of Chile occupy a similar position with regard to the latter. We have discovered a means for fixing nitrates from the air, thereby releasing ourselves from the foreign monopoly in that commodity. If extensive potash beds can be found in America, we will have accomplished another important step toward economic independence. The United States always has been the chief user of potash and nitrates, and consequently the largest contributor to the fortunes of Germany and Chile.
